H. Res. 5

Jan. 3, 1991

MR. GEPHARDT

Adopting the Rules of the House for the One Hundred Second Congress.

Jan. 3, 1991—Offered as a privileged resolution for immediate consideration.

Jan. 3, 1991—Agreed to by the House. (*242 yeas; 160 nays*).

Jan. 3, 1991—The House rejected a motion to commit H.Res. 5 to a select committee comprised of the Majority Leader and the Minority Leader with instructions to report it back to the House forthwith with amendments providing that the Committee on the Judiciary report (not later than June 30, 1991) a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution to provide for a balanced budget for the United States Government, providing that the Committee on Rules report an open rule providing for the consideration of a related joint resolution if the Committee on the Judiciary has not reported by said date, and providing for the consideration of such related joint resolution by the House if the Committee on Rules has not reported such open rule within 10 legislative days. (*160 yeas; 256 nays*).

H. Res. 453

May 7, 1992

MR. GLICKMAN

To express the sense of the House of Representatives regarding the need to increase budget authority for the reduction of violent crime, the rehabilitation of American youth, and the revitalization of American cities.

May 7, 1992—Referred jointly to the Committees on Armed Services; Foreign Affairs; Education and Labor; Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs; and the Judiciary.
