

## LEGISLATION PENDING IN THE SENATE

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- H.R. 324—To require any person who is convicted of a State criminal offense against a victim who is a minor to register a current address with law enforcement officials of the State for 10 years after release from prison, parole, or supervision. “Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children Registration Act”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary November 23, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 454—To provide that a State court may not modify an order of another State court requiring the payment of child support unless the recipient of child support payments resides in the State in which the modification is sought or consents to seeking the modification in such other State court. “Full Faith and Credit for Child Support Orders Act”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary August 3, 1993.
- H.R. 546—To limit State taxation of certain pension income, and for other purposes. Referred to the Senate Committee on Finance October 8, 1994.
- H.R. 796—To amend title 18, United States Code, to assure freedom of access to reproductive services. “Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act of 1993”. Placed on the Senate Calendar November 19, 1993. (*Superseded by S. 636*).
- H.R. 829—To amend title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to authorize funds received by States and units of local government to be expended to improve the quality and availability of DNA records; to authorize the establishment of a DNA identification index; and for other purposes. “DNA Identification Act of 1993”. Received in the Senate March 30, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 897—To amend title 17, United States Code, to modify certain recordation requirements, and for other purposes. “Copyright Reform Act of 1993”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary November 23, 1993.
- H.R. 934—To amend title 28, United States Code, relating to jurisdictional immunities of foreign states, to grant jurisdiction to the courts of the United States in certain cases involving torture, extrajudicial killing, or genocide occurring in that state. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary October 8, 1994.
- H.R. 1102—To make permanent chapter 44 of title 28, United States Code, relating to arbitration. “Court Arbitration Authorization Act of 1993”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary October 13, 1993.
- H.R. 1133—To combat violence and crimes against women. “Violence Against Women Act of 1993”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary November 22, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 1152—To direct the United States Sentencing Commission to make sentencing guidelines for Federal criminal cases that provide sentencing enhancements for hate crimes. “Hate Crimes Sentencing Enhancement Act of 1993”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary September 22, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 1385—To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to allow formula grants to be used to prosecute persons driving while intoxicated. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary September 22, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 2129—To amend the Trademark Act of 1946 to provide for the registration and protection of trademarks used in commerce, in order to carry out provisions of certain international conventions, and for other purposes. “Madrid Protocol Implementation Act”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary October 8, 1994.
- H.R. 2814—To permit the taking of effect of certain proposed rules of civil procedure, with modifications. “Civil Rules Amendments Act of 1993”. Placed on the Senate Calendar November 4, 1993.
- H.R. 3098—To amend title 18, United States Code, to prohibit the possession of a handgun or handgun ammunition by, or the private transfer of a handgun or handgun ammunition to, a juvenile. “Youth Handgun Safety Act of 1993”. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary November 22, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).

## LEGISLATION PENDING IN THE SENATE

- H.R. 3221**—To provide for the adjudication of certain claims against the Government of Iraq. "Iraq Claims Act of 1993". Referred to the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations May 2, 1994.
- H.R. 3350**—To establish a program of residential substance abuse treatment within Federal prisons. Placed on the Senate Calendar November 4, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 3351**—To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to allow grants for the purpose of developing alternative methods of punishment for young offenders to traditional forms of incarceration and probation. Referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary November 20, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 3353**—To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to allow grants to develop more effective programs to reduce juvenile gang participation and juvenile drug trafficking. Placed on the Senate Calendar November 4, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 3354**—To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to allow grants for the purpose of developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs within State correctional facilities, as well as within local correctional facilities in which inmates are incarcerated for a period of time sufficient to permit substance abuse treatment. Placed on the Senate Calendar November 4, 1993. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 3392**—To amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to assure the safety of public water systems. "Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments of 1993". Placed on the Senate Calendar September 28, 1994.
- H.R. 3400**—To provide a more effective, efficient, and responsive government. "Government Reform and Savings Act of 1993". Referred to the Senate Committee on Governmental Affairs November 23, 1993.
- H.R. 3626**—To supersede the Modification of Final Judgment entered August 24, 1982, in the antitrust action styled *United States v. Western Electric*, Civil Action No. 82-0192, United States District Court for the District of Columbia; to amend the Communications Act of 1934 to regulate the manufacturing of Bell operating companies, and for other purposes. Reported to the Senate without recommendation by the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation September 19, 1994 (no written report).
- H.R. 4296**—To make unlawful the transfer or possession of assault weapons. "Public Safety and Recreational Firearms Use Protection Act". Placed on the Senate Calendar May 16, 1994. (*Superseded by H.R. 4092*).
- H.R. 4822**—To make certain laws applicable to the legislative branch of the Federal Government. "Congressional Accountability Act". Reported to the Senate, amended, by the Committee on Governmental Affairs October 3, 1994 (S.Rept. 103-397).
