- Nov. 20, 1993—Mr. Derrick, Committee on Rules, favorably reported H.Res. 319, the rule providing for the consideration of H.R. 3. (H.Rept. 103-402) (House Calendar).
- Nov. 21, 1993—The House adopted the rule (H.Res. 319). (220 yeas; 207 nays).
- Nov. 22, 1993—Pursuant to the rule (H.Res. 319), the Committee amendment in the nature of a substitute was modified to delete language which would require certain tax-exempt organiza-

tions that engage in lobbying to report contributions, as political action committees are required to do.

Nov. 22, 1993—The House rejected a motion to recommit H.R. 3 to the Committee on House Administration. (190 yeas; 240 noes).

Nov. 22, 1993—Passed the House, amended. (255 yeas; 175 nays).

Nov. 22, 1993—Pursuant to the rule (H.Res. 319), the House passed S. 3 with an amendment substituting the language of H.R. 3 as passed by the House.
