

LEGISLATION PASSED BY THE HOUSE

- H.R. 1—To make certain laws applicable to the legislative branch of the Federal Government. “Congressional Accountability Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, January 5, 1995. (429 yeas; 0 nays). (*Committee discharged; S. 2 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 4—To restore the American family, reduce illegitimacy, control welfare spending and reduce welfare dependence. “Personal Responsibility Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 24, 1995. (234 yeas; 199 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 5—To curb the practice of imposing unfunded Federal mandates on States and local governments, to ensure that the Federal Government pays the costs incurred by those governments in complying with certain requirements under Federal statutes and regulations, and to provide information on the cost of Federal mandates on the private sector. “Unfunded Mandate Reform Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 1, 1995. (360 yeas; 74 nays). (*Committee discharged; S. 1 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 9—To create jobs, enhance wages, strengthen property rights, maintain certain economic liberties, decentralize and reduce the power of the Federal Government with respect to the States, localities, and citizens of the United States, and to increase the accountability of Federal officials. “Job Creation and Wage Enhancement Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 3, 1995. (277 yeas; 141 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 125—To repeal the ban on semiautomatic assault weapons and the ban on large capacity ammunition feeding devices. “Gun Ban Repeal Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 22, 1996. (239 yeas; 173 noes). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 234—To amend title 11 of the United States Code to make nondischargeable a debt for death or injury caused by the debtor’s operation of watercraft or aircraft while intoxicated. “Boating and Aviation Operation Safety Act of 1994”. Passed the House, amended, June 4, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 394—To amend title 4 of the United States Code to limit State taxation of certain pension income. Passed the House, amended, December 18, 1995, by voice vote.
- H.R. 450—To ensure economy and efficiency of Federal Government operations by establishing a moratorium on regulatory rulemaking actions, and for other purposes. “Regulatory Transition Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 24, 1995. (276 yeas; 146 noes). (*Committee discharged; S. 219 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 497—To create the National Gambling Impact and Policy Commission. “National Gambling Impact and Policy Commission Act”. Passed the House, amended, March 5, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 587—To amend title 35, United States Code, with respect to patents on biotechnological processes. Passed the House October 17, 1995, by voice vote. (*S. 1111 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 632—To enhance fairness in compensating owners of patents used by the United States. Passed the House, amended, December 12, 1995, by voice vote.
- H.R. 660—To amend the Fair Housing Act to modify the exemption from certain familial status discrimination prohibitions granted to housing for older persons. “Housing for Older Persons Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, April 6, 1995. (424 yeas; 5 nays).
- H.R. 665—To control crime by mandatory victim restitution. “Victim Restitution Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 7, 1995. (431 yeas; 0 nays).
- H.R. 666—To control crime by exclusionary rule reform. “Exclusionary Rule Reform Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 8, 1995. (289 yeas; 142 noes).
- H.R. 667—To control crime by incarcerating violent criminals. “Violent Criminal Incarceration Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 10, 1995. (265 yeas; 156 noes).

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- H.R. 668—To control crime by further streamlining deportation of criminal aliens. “Criminal Alien Deportation Improvements Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 10, 1995. (380 yeas; 20 nays).
- H.R. 728—To control crime by providing law enforcement block grants. “Local Government Law Enforcement Block Grants Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 14, 1995. (238 yeas; 192 noes).
- H.R. 729—To control crime by a more effective death penalty. “Effective Death Penalty Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, February 8, 1995. (297 yeas; 132 noes).
- H.R. 740—To confer jurisdiction on the United States Court of Federal Claims with respect to land claims of Pueblo of Isleta Indian Tribe. Passed the House July 29, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 782—To amend title 18 of the United States Code to allow members of employee associations to represent their views before the United States Government. Passed the House, amended, October 24, 1995, by voice vote.
- H.R. 925—To compensate owners of private property for the effect of certain regulatory restrictions. “Private Property Protection Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 3, 1995. (277 yeas; 148 nays).
- H.R. 926—To promote regulatory flexibility and enhance public participation in Federal agency rulemaking and for other purposes. “Regulatory Reform and Relief Act”. Passed the House, amended, March 1, 1995. (415 yeas; 15 nays).
- H.R. 927—To seek international sanctions against the Castro government in Cuba, to plan for support of a transition government leading to a democratically elected government in Cuba, and for other purposes. “Cuban Liberty and Democratic Solidarity (LIBERTAD) Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, September 21, 1995. (294 yeas; 130 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 956—To establish legal standards and procedures for product liability litigation, and for other purposes. “Common Sense Legal Standards Reform Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 10, 1995. (265 yeas; 161 noes).
- H.R. 962—To amend the Immigration Act of 1990 relating to the membership of the United States Commission on Immigration Reform. Passed the House, amended (technical), June 8, 1995, by voice vote.
- H.R. 988—To reform the Federal civil justice system. “Attorney Accountability Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 7, 1995. (232 yeas; 193 nays).
- H.R. 1058—To reform Federal securities litigation, and for other purposes. “Securities Litigation Reform Act”. Passed the House, amended, March 8, 1995. (325 yeas; 99 noes; 1 “present”).
- H.R. 1170—To provide that cases challenging the constitutionality of measures passed by State referendum be heard by a 3-judge court. Passed the House, amended, September 28, 1995. (266 yeas; 159 nays).
- H.R. 1240—To combat crime by enhancing the penalties for certain sexual crimes against children. “Sexual Crimes Against Children Prevention Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, April 4, 1995. (417 yeas; 0 nays).
- H.R. 1281—To amend title 5, United States Code, and the National Security Act of 1947 to require disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act of information regarding certain individuals who participated in Nazi war crimes during the period in which the United States was involved in World War II. “War Crimes Disclosure Act”. Passed the House, amended, September 24, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1295—To amend the Trademark Act of 1946 to make certain revisions relating to the protection of famous marks. “Federal Trademark Dilution Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, December 12, 1995, by voice vote.
- H.R. 1499—To improve criminal law relating to fraud against consumers. “Consumer Fraud Prevention Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, September 25, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1506—To amend title 17, United States Code, to provide an exclusive right to perform sound recordings publicly by means of digital transmissions, and for other purposes. “Digital Performance Right in Sound Recordings Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, October 17, 1995, by voice vote. (*S. 227 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 1530—To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 1996 for military activities of the Department of Defense, to prescribe military personnel strengths for fiscal year 1996, and for other purposes. Passed the House, amended, June 15, 1995. (300 yeas; 126 nays). (*Committee named to conference; S. 1124 passed in lieu following veto*).

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- H.R. 1533—To amend title 18, United States Code, to increase the penalty for escaping from a Federal prison. Passed the House December 12, 1995, by voice vote.
- H.R. 1555—To promote competition and reduce regulation in order to secure lower prices and higher quality services for American telecommunications consumers and encourage the rapid deployment of new telecommunications technologies. Passed the House, amended, August 4, 1995. (305 ayes; 117 noes). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1561—To consolidate the foreign affairs agencies of the United States; to authorize appropriations for the Department of State and related agencies for fiscal years 1996 and 1997; to responsibly reduce the authorizations of appropriations for United States foreign assistance programs for fiscal years 1996 and 1997, and for other purposes. “American Overseas Interests Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, June 8, 1995. (222 ayes; 192 noes). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1670—To revise and streamline the acquisition laws of the Federal Government, to reorganize the mechanisms for resolving Federal procurement disputes, and for other purposes. “Federal Acquisition Reform Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, September 14, 1995. (423 yeas; 0 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1734—To reauthorize the National Film Preservation Board, and for other purposes. Passed the House, amended, July 29, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 1833—To amend title 18, United States Code, to ban partial-birth abortions. “Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, November 1, 1995. (288 yeas; 139 nays; 1 “present”).
- H.R. 1861—To make technical corrections in the Satellite Home Viewer Act of 1994 and other provisions of title 17, United States Code. Passed the House, amended, June 4, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2064—To grant the consent of Congress to an amendment of the Historic Chattahoochee Compact between the States of Alabama and Georgia. Passed the House March 12, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2092—To expedite State reviews of criminal records of applicants for private security officer employment, and for other purposes. “Private Security Officer Quality Assurance Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, September 26, 1996. (415 yeas; 6 nays).
- H.R. 2137—To amend the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 to require the release of relevant information to protect the public from sexually violent offenders. “Megan’s Law”. Passed the House, amended, May 7, 1996. (418 yeas; 0 nays).
- H.R. 2202—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to improve deterrence of illegal immigration to the United States by increasing border patrol and investigative personnel, by increasing penalties for alien smuggling and for document fraud, by reforming exclusion and deportation law and procedures, by improving the verification system for eligibility for employment, and through other measures, to reform the legal immigration system and facilitate legal entries into the United States, and for other purposes. “Immigration in the National Interest Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 21, 1996. (333 yeas; 87 nays).
- H.R. 2259—To disapprove certain sentencing guideline amendments. Passed the House, amended, October 19, 1995. (332 yeas; 83 nays). (*S. 1254 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 2297—To codify without substantive change laws related to transportation and to improve the United States Code. Passed the House, amended, July 29, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2361—To amend the commencement dates of certain temporary Federal judgeships. Passed the House November 20, 1995, by voice vote. (*S. 1328 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 2418—To improve the capability to analyze deoxyribonucleic acid. “DNA Identification Grants Improvement Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, December 12, 1995. (407 yeas; 5 nays).
- H.R. 2425—To amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to preserve and reform the medicare program. “Medicare Preservation Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, October 19, 1995. (231 yeas; 201 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 2491—To provide for reconciliation pursuant to section 105 of the concurrent resolution on the budget. “Seven-Year Balanced Budget Reconciliation Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, October 26, 1995. (227 yeas; 203 nays). (*Committee named to conference*).
- H.R. 2511—To control and prevent commercial counterfeiting, and for other purposes. “Anticounterfeiting Consumer Protection Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, June 4, 1996, by voice vote. (*S. 1136 passed in lieu*).

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- H.R. 2525—To modify the operation of the antitrust laws, and of State laws similar to the antitrust laws, with respect to charitable gift annuities. “Charitable Gift Annuity Antitrust Relief Act of 1995”. Passed the House November 28, 1995. (427 yeas; 0 nays).
- H.R. 2538—To make clerical and technical amendments to title 18, United States Code, and other provisions of law relating to crime and criminal justice. “Criminal Law Technical Amendments Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, December 12, 1995, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2539—To abolish the Interstate Commerce Commission, to amend subtitle IV of title 49, United States Code, to reform economic regulation of transportation, and for other purposes. Passed the House, amended, November 14, 1995. (417 yeas; 8 noes). (*Committee named to conference*).
- H.R. 2564—To provide for the disclosure of lobbying activities to influence the Federal Government, and for other purposes. “Lobbying Disclosure Act of 1995”. Passed the House November 29, 1995. (421 yeas; 0 nays). (*S. 1060 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 2641—To amend title 28, United States Code, to provide for appointment of United States marshals by the Director of the United States Marshals Service. “United States Marshals Service Improvement Act of 1995”. Passed the House May 1, 1996. (351 yeas; 72 nays).
- H.R. 2650—To amend title 18, United States Code, to eliminate certain sentencing inequities for drug offenders. “Mandatory Federal Prison Drug Treatment Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, June 4, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2703—To combat terrorism. “Comprehensive Antiterrorism Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, March 14, 1996. (229 yeas; 191 nays). (*S. 735 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 2803—To amend the anti-car theft provisions of title 49, United States Code, to increase the utility of motor vehicle title information to State and Federal law enforcement officials, and for other purposes. “Anti-Car Theft Improvements Act of 1995”. Passed the House, amended, June 18, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2937—For the reimbursement of legal expenses and related fees incurred by former employees of the White House Travel Office with respect to the termination of their employment in that Office on May 19, 1993. Passed the House, amended, March 19, 1996. (350 yeas; 43 nays).
- H.R. 2940—To amend the Deepwater Port Act of 1974. “Deepwater Port Modernization Act”. Passed the House, amended, September 18, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 2974—To amend the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 to provide enhanced penalties for crimes against elderly and child victims. “Crimes Against Children and Elderly Persons Increased Punishment Act”. Passed the House, amended, May 7, 1996. (414 yeas; 4 nays).
- H.R. 2977—To reauthorize alternative means of dispute resolution in the Federal administrative process, and for other purposes. “Administrative Dispute Resolution Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, June 4, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2980—To amend title 18, United States Code, with respect to stalking. “Interstate Stalking Punishment and Prevention Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, May 7, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3103—To amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to improve portability and continuity of health insurance coverage in the group and individual markets, to combat waste, fraud, and abuse in health insurance and health care delivery, to promote the use of medical savings accounts, to improve access to long-term care services and coverage, to simplify the administration of health insurance, and for other purposes. “Health Coverage Availability and Affordability Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, March 28, 1996. (267 yeas; 151 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 3120—To amend title 18, United States Code, with respect to witness retaliation, witness tampering and jury tampering. Passed the House, amended, May 7, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3136—To provide for enactment of the Senior Citizens’ Right to Work Act of 1996, the Line Item Veto Act, and the Small Business Growth and Fairness Act of 1996, and to provide for a permanent increase in the public debt limit. “Contract with America Advancement Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, March 28, 1996. (328 yeas; 91 noes). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 3166—To amend title 18, United States Code, with respect to the crime of false statement in a Government matter. “Government Accountability Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, July 17, 1996. (417 yeas; 6 nays).
- H.R. 3215—To amend title 18, United States Code, to repeal the provision relating to Federal employees contracting or trading with Indians. Passed the House July 29, 1996, by voice vote.

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- H.R. 3230**—To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 1997 for military activities of the Department of Defense, to prescribe personnel strengths for fiscal year 1997, and for other purposes. “National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1997”. Passed the House, amended, May 15, 1996. (272 yeas; 153 nays). (*Committee named to conference*).
- H.R. 3235**—To amend the Ethics in Government Act of 1978, to extend the authorization of appropriations for the Office of Government Ethics for 3 years, and for other purposes. “Office of Government Ethics Authorization Act of 1996”. Passed the House June 4, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3396**—To define and protect the institution of marriage. “Defense of Marriage Act”. Passed the House July 12, 1996. (342 yeas; 67 nays; 2 “present”).
- H.R. 3435**—To make technical amendments to the Lobbying Disclosure Act of 1995. “Lobbying Disclosure Technical Amendments Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, July 29, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3452**—To make certain laws applicable to the Executive Office of the President, and for other purposes. “Presidential and Executive Office Accountability Act”. Passed the House, amended, September 24, 1996. (410 yeas; 5 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 3456**—To provide for the nationwide tracking of convicted sexual predators, and for other purposes. “Sexual Offender Tracking and Identification Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, September 26, 1996. (423 yeas; 1 nay). (*Committee discharged; S. 1675 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 3525**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to clarify the Federal jurisdiction over offenses relating to damage to religious property. “Church Arson Prevention Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, June 18, 1996. (422 yeas; 0 nays).
- H.R. 3676**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to clarify the intent of Congress with respect to the Federal carjacking prohibition. “Carjacking Correction Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, September 17, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3680**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to carry out the international obligations of the United States under the Geneva Conventions to provide criminal penalties for certain war crimes. “War Crimes Act of 1996”. Passed the House July 29, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3723**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to protect proprietary economic information, and for other purposes. “Economic Espionage Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, September 17, 1996. (399 yeas; 3 nays).
- H.R. 3852**—To prevent the illegal manufacturing and use of methamphetamine. “Comprehensive Methamphetamine Control Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, September 26, 1996. (386 yeas; 34 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 3953**—To combat terrorism. Passed the House August 2, 1996. (389 yeas; 22 noes).
- H.R. 3968**—To make improvements in the operation and administration of the Federal courts, and for other purposes. “Federal Courts Improvements Act of 1996”. Passed the House, amended, September 17, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.R. 4134**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to authorize States to deny public education benefits to aliens not lawfully present in the United States who are not enrolled in public schools during the period beginning September 1, 1996, and ending July 1, 1997. Passed the House September 25, 1996. (254 yeas; 175 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4137**—To combat drug-facilitated crimes of violence, including sexual assaults. “Drug-Induced Rape Prevention and Punishment Act of 1996”. Passed the House September 26, 1996. (421 yeas; 1 nay). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4164**—To provide for the extension of certain authority for the Marshal of the Supreme Court and the Supreme Court Police. Passed the House September 27, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged; S. 2100 passed in lieu*).
- H.R. 4165**—To provide for certain changes with respect to requirements for a Canadian boater landing permit pursuant to section 235 of the Immigration and Nationality Act. Passed the House September 28, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4194**—To reauthorize alternative means of dispute resolution in the Federal administrative process, and for other purposes. Passed the House September 27, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged; passed in lieu of 2977 above*).
- H.J.Res. 1**—Proposing a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Passed the House, amended, January 26, 1995. (300 yeas; 132 noes).
- H.J.Res. 78**—To grant the consent of the Congress to certain additional powers conferred upon the Bi-State Development Agency by the States of Missouri and Illinois. Passed the House March 12, 1996. (405 yeas; 0 noes).

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- H.J.Res. 79—Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States authorizing the Congress and the States to prohibit the physical desecration of the flag of the United States. Passed the House June 28, 1995. (312 yeas; 120 noes).
- H.J.Res. 113—Granting the consent of Congress to the compact to provide for joint natural resource management and enforcement of laws and regulations pertaining to natural resources and boating at the Jennings Randolph Lake Project lying in Garrett County, Maryland, and Mineral County, West Virginia, entered into between the States of West Virginia and Maryland. Passed the House July 29, 1996, by voice vote. (*S.J.Res. 20 passed in lieu*).
- H.J.Res. 129—Granting the consent of Congress to the Vermont-New Hampshire Interstate Public Water Supply Compact. Passed the House March 19, 1996, by voice vote. (*S.J.Res. 38 passed in lieu*).
- H.J.Res. 166—Granting the consent of Congress to the Mutual Aid Agreement between the City of Bristol, Virginia, and the City of Bristol, Tennessee. Passed the House July 29, 1996, by voice vote.
- H.J.Res. 191—To confer honorary citizenship of the United States on Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu, also known as Mother Teresa. Passed the House September 17, 1996. (405 yeas; 0 nays).
- H.J.Res. 193—Granting the consent of Congress to the Emergency Management Assistance Compact. Passed the House September 24, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.J.Res. 194—Granting the consent of the Congress to amendments made by Maryland, Virginia, and the District of Columbia to the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Regulation Compact. Passed the House, amended, September 24, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.Con.Res. 187—Expressing the sense of Congress with respect to recent church burnings. Passed the House June 13, 1996, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.Res. 135—Condemning the bombing in Oklahoma City. Passed the House May 2, 1995. (409 yeas; 0 nays; 3 “present”). (*Committee discharged*).

Passed the House October 17, 1995, by voice vote. (*Held at the desk; passed in lieu of H.R. 1506 above*).
- S. 257—To amend the charter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars to make eligible for membership those veterans that have served within the territorial limits of South Korea. Passed the House February 7, 1995, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- S. 457—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to update references in the classification of children for purposes of United States immigration laws. Passed the House October 30, 1995, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
