

LEGISLATION VETOED BY THE PRESIDENT

- H.R. 4**—To restore the American family, reduce illegitimacy, control welfare spending and reduce welfare dependence. "*Personal Responsibility Act of 1995*". Vetoed by the President January 9, 1996 (veto message printed as House Document 104-164 and referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means).
- H.R. 956**—To establish legal standards and procedures for product liability litigation, and for other purposes. "*Common Sense Legal Standards Reform Act of 1995*". Vetoed by the President May 2, 1996 (veto message printed as House Document 104-207 and referred to the House Committee on the Judiciary). The House sustained the President's veto May 9, 1996, two-thirds not having voted in the affirmative (258 yeas; 163 nays).
- H.R. 1058**—To reform Federal securities litigation, and for other purposes. "*Securities Litigation Reform Act*". Vetoed by the President December 19, 1995 (veto message printed as House Document 104-150). Passed the House December 20, 1995, the objections of the President to the contrary notwithstanding, two-thirds having voted in the affirmative (319 yeas; 100 nays; 1 "present"). Passed the Senate December 22, 1995, the objections of the President to the contrary notwithstanding, two-thirds having voted in the affirmative (68 yeas; 30 nays; 1 "present"). Became law December 22, 1995, over the objections of the President—Public Law 104-67.
- H.R. 1530**—To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 1996 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense activities of the Department of Energy, to prescribe personnel strengths for such fiscal year for the Armed Forces, and for other purposes. "*National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1996*". Vetoed by the President December 28, 1995 (veto message printed as House Document 104-155 and referred to the House Committee on National Security). The House sustained the President's veto January 3, 1996, two-thirds not having voted in the affirmative (240 yeas; 156 nays).
- H.R. 1561**—To consolidate the foreign affairs agencies of the United States; to authorize appropriations for the Department of State and related agencies for fiscal years 1996 and 1997; to responsibly reduce the authorizations of appropriations for United States foreign assistance programs for fiscal years 1996 and 1997, and for other purposes. "*American Overseas Interests Act of 1995*". Vetoed by the President April 12, 1996 (veto message printed as House Document 104-197). The House sustained the President's veto April 30, 1996, two-thirds not having voted in the affirmative (234 yeas; 188 nays).
- H.R. 1833**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to ban partial-birth abortions. "*Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act of 1995*". Vetoed by the President April 10, 1996 (veto message printed as House Document 104-198 and referred to the House Committee on the Judiciary). Passed the House September 19, 1996, the objections of the President to the contrary notwithstanding, two-thirds having voted in the affirmative (285 yeas; 137 nays). The Senate sustained the President's veto September 26, 1996, two-thirds not having voted in the affirmative (57 yeas; 41 nays).
- H.R. 2491**—To provide for reconciliation pursuant to section 105 of the concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 1996. "*Seven-Year Balanced Budget Reconciliation Act of 1995*". Vetoed by the President December 6, 1995 (veto message printed as House Document 104-141 and referred to the House Committee on the Budget).
