

LEGISLATION PASSED BY THE HOUSE

- H.R. 46**—To provide for a national medal for public safety officers who act with extraordinary valor above and beyond the call of duty. “Public Safety Officer Medal of Valor Act of 1999”. Passed the House April 13, 1999 (412 yeas; 2 nays).
- H.R. 209**—To improve the ability of Federal agencies to license federally owned inventions. “Technology Transfer Commercialization Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, May 11, 1999, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 238**—To amend section 274 of the Immigration and Nationality Act to impose mandatory minimum sentences, and increase certain sentences, for bringing in and harboring certain aliens and to amend title 18, United States Code, to provide enhanced penalties for persons committing such offenses while armed. Passed the House, amended, October 3, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 371**—To expedite the naturalization of aliens who served with specialguerrilla guerrilla units in Laos. “Hmong Veterans’ Naturalization Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, May 2, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 417**—To amend the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971 to reform the financing of campaigns for elections for Federal office, and for other purposes. “Bipartisan Campaign Finance Reform Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, September 14, 1999 (252 yeas; 177 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 436**—To reduce waste, fraud, and error in Government programs by making improvements with respect to Federal management and debt collection practices, Federal payment systems, Federal benefit programs, and for other purposes. “Government Waste, Fraud, and Error Reduction Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, February 24, 1999 (419 yeas; 1 nay). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 441**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act with respect to the requirements for the admission of nonimmigrant nurses who will practice in health professional shortage areas. “Nursing Relief for Disadvantaged Areas Act of 1999”. Passed the House May 24, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 462**—To clarify that governmental pension plans of the possessions of the United States shall be treated in the same manner as State pension plans for purposes of the limitation on the State income taxation of pension income. Passed the House October 18, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 534**—To amend chapter 1 of title 9 of the United States Code to permit each party to certain contracts to accept or reject arbitration as a means of settling disputes under the contracts. “Fairness and Voluntary Arbitration Act”. Passed the House, amended, October 3, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 576**—To amend title 4, United States Code, to add the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday to the list of days on which the flag should especially be displayed. Passed the House October 12, 1999, by voice vote. (*Superseded by S. 322 below*).
- H.R. 604**—To amend the charter of the AMVETS organization. Passed the House, amended, December 15, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 764**—To reduce the incidence of child abuse and neglect, and for other purposes. “Child Abuse Prevention and Enforcement Act”. Passed the House, amended, October 5, 1999 (425 yeas; 2 noes).
- H.R. 769**—To amend the Trademark Act of 1946 to provide for the registration and protection of trademarks used in commerce, in order to carry out provisions of certain international conventions, and for other purposes. “Madrid Protocol Implementation Act”. Passed the House April 13, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 775**—To establish certain procedures for civil actions brought for damages relating to the failure of any device or system to process or otherwise deal with the transition from the year 1999 to the year 2000, and for other purposes. “Year 2000 Readiness and Responsibility Act”. Passed the House, amended, May 12, 1999 (236 yeas; 190 noes).
- H.R. 808**—To extend for 3 additional months the period for which chapter 12 of title 11 of the United States Code is reenacted. Passed the House, amended, March 11, 1999 (418 yeas; 1 nay).

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- H.R. 833—To amend title 11, United States Code, and for other purposes. “Bankruptcy Reform Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, May 5, 1999 (313 yeas; 108 nays).
- H.R. 894—To encourage States to incarcerate individuals convicted of murder, rape, or child molestation. “No Second Chances for Murderers, Rapists, or Child Molesters Act of 1999” or “Aimee’s Law”. Passed the House, amended, July 11, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 916—To make technical amendments to section 10 of title 9, United States Code. Passed the House, amended, July 13, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 1042—To amend the Controlled Substances Act to provide civil liability for illegal manufacturers and distributors of controlled substances for the harm caused by the use of those controlled substances. “Drug Dealer Liability Act of 1999”. Passed the House October 10, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1161—To revise the banking and bankruptcy insolvency laws with respect to the termination and netting of financial contracts, and for other purposes. “Financial Contract Netting Improvement Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, October 24, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1189—To make technical corrections in title 17, United States Code, and other laws. Passed the House, amended, April 13, 1999, by voice vote. (*Superseded by S. 1260 below*).
- H.R. 1218—To amend title 18, United States Code, to prohibit taking minors across State lines in circumvention of laws requiring the involvement of parents in abortion decisions. “Child Custody Protection Act”. Passed the House June 30, 1999 (270 yeas; 159 noes).
- H.R. 1219—To amend the Office of Federal Procurement Policy Act and the Miller Act, relating to payment protections for persons providing labor and materials for Federal construction projects. “Construction Industry Payment Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, August 2, 1999 (416 yeas; 0 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1248—To prevent violence against women. “Violence Against Women Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, September 26, 2000 (415 yeas; 3 nays).
- H.R. 1304—To ensure and foster continued patient safety and quality of care by making the antitrust laws apply to negotiations between groups of health care professionals and health plans and health insurance issuers in the same manner as such laws apply to collective bargaining by labor organizations under the National Labor Relations Act. “Quality Health-Care Coalition Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, June 30 (legislative day of June 29), 2000 (276 yeas; 136 noes; 2 “present”).
- H.R. 1349—To amend title 18, United States Code, to combat the over-utilization of prison health care services and control rising prisoner health care costs. “Federal Prisoner Health Care Copayment Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, September 19, 2000, by voice vote. (*Superseded by S. 704 below*).
- H.R. 1501—To provide grants to ensure increased accountability for juvenile offenders. “Consequences for Juvenile Offenders Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, June 17, 1999 (287 yeas; 139 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1554—To amend the provisions of title 17, United States Code, and the Communications Act of 1934, relating to copyright licensing and carriage of broadcast signals by satellite. “Satellite Copyright, Competition, and Consumer Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, April 27, 1999 (422 yeas; 1 nay; 1 “present”). (*Committee discharged; passed the House in lieu of H.R. 850 and H.R. 1027*).
- H.R. 1658—To provide a more just and uniform procedure for Federal civil forfeitures, and for other purposes. “Civil Asset Forfeiture Reform Act”. Passed the House, amended, June 24, 1999 (375 yeas; 48 noes).
- H.R. 1691—To protect religious liberty. “Religious Liberty Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, July 15, 1999 (306 yeas; 118 nays).
- H.R. 1714—To facilitate the use of electronic records and signatures in interstate or foreign commerce. “Electronic Signatures in Global and National Commerce Act”. Passed the House, amended, November 8, 1999 (356 yeas; 66 nays). (*Superseded by S. 761 below*).
- H.R. 1752—To make improvements in the operation and administration of the Federal courts, and for other purposes. “Federal Courts Improvement Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, May 22, 2000, by voice vote.

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- H.R. 1761**—To amend provisions of title 17, United States Code. “Copyright Damages Improvement Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, August 2, 1999, by voice vote. (*Superseded by S. 1257 below*).
- H.R. 1791**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to provide penalties for harming animals used in Federal law enforcement. “Federal Law Enforcement Animal Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, October 12, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 1800**—To amend the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 to ensure that certain information regarding prisoners is reported to the Attorney General. Passed the House, amended, July 24, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 1801**—To make technical corrections to various antitrust laws and to references to such laws. “Antitrust Technical Corrections Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, November 2, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 1869**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to expand the prohibition on stalking, and for other purposes. “Stalking Prevention and Victim Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, November 10, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 1875**—To amend title 28, United States Code, to allow the application of the principles of Federal diversity jurisdiction to interstate class actions. “Interstate Class Action Jurisdiction Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, September 23, 1999 (222 yeas; 207 nays).
- H.R. 1887**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to punish the depiction of animal cruelty. Passed the House, amended, October 19, 1999 (372 yeas; 42 nays).
- H.R. 1907**—To amend title 35, United States Code, to provide enhanced protection for inventors and innovators, protect patent terms, reduce patent litigation, and for other purposes. “American Inventors Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, August 4, 1999 (376 yeas; 43 nays).
- H.R. 1915**—To provide grants to the States to improve the reporting of unidentified and mission persons. “Jennifer’s Law”. Passed the House June 7, 1999 (370 yeas; 4 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 2005**—To establish a statute of repose for durable goods used in a trade or business. “Workplace Goods Job Growth and Competitiveness Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, February 2, 2000 (222 yeas; 194 nays).
- H.R. 2014**—To prohibit a State from imposing a discriminatory commuter tax on nonresidents. Passed the House June 29, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2031**—To provide for injunctive relief in Federal district court to enforce State laws relating to the interstate transportation of intoxicating liquor. “Twenty-First Amendment Enforcement Act”. Passed the House, amended, August 3, 1999 (310 yeas; 112 nays).
- H.R. 2112**—To amend title 28, United States Code, to allow a judge to whom a case is transferred to retain jurisdiction over certain multidistrict litigation cases for trial, and to provide for Federal jurisdiction of certain multiparty, multiforum civil actions. “Multidistrict, Multiparty, Multiforum Trial Jurisdiction Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, September 13, 1999, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2130**—To amend the Controlled Substances Act to add gamma hydroxybutyric acid and ketamine to the schedules of control substances, to provide for a national awareness campaign, and for other purposes. “Hillary J. Farias Date-Rape Prevention Drug Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, October 12, 1999 (423 yeas; 1 nay).
- H.R. 2260**—To amend the Controlled Substances Act to promote pain management and palliative care without permitting assisted suicide and euthanasia, and for other purposes. “Pain Relief Promotion Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, October 27, 1999 (271 yeas; 156 nays).
- H.R. 2366**—To provide small businesses certain protections from litigation excesses and to limit the product liability of nonmanufacturer product sellers. “Small Business Liability Reform Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, February 16, 2000 (221 yeas; 193 nays).
- H.R. 2372**—To simplify and expedite access to the Federal courts for injured parties whose rights and privileges, secured by the United States Constitution, have been deprived by final actions of Federal agencies, or other government officials or entities acting under color of State law; to prevent Federal courts from abstaining from exercising Federal jurisdiction in actions where no State law claim is alleged; to permit certification of unsettled State law questions that are essential to resolving Federal claims arising under the Constitution; and to clarify when government action is sufficiently final to ripen certain Federal claims arising under the Constitution. “Private Property Rights Implementation Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, March 16, 2000 (226 yeas; 182 nays).

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- H.R. 2415**—To enhance security of United States missions and personnel overseas, to authorize appropriations for the Department of State for fiscal year 2000, and for other purposes. “American Embassy Security Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, July 21, 1999, by voice vote. (*Committee named to conference. Language of S. 3186, the Bankruptcy Reform Act of 2000, substituted for language committed to conference.*)
- H.R. 2436**—To amend title 18, United States Code, and the Uniform Code of Military Justice to protect unborn children from assault and murder, and for other purposes. “Unborn Victims of Violence Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, September 30, 1999 (254 yeas; 172 nays).
- H.R. 2442**—To provide for the preparation of a Government report detailing injustices suffered by Italian Americans during World War II, and a formal acknowledgment of such injustices by the President. “Wartime Violation of Italian American Civil Liberties Act”. Passed the House November 10, 1999, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 2634**—To amend the Controlled Substances Act with respect to registration requirements for practitioners who dispense narcotic drugs in schedule IV or V for maintenance treatment or detoxification treatment. “Drug Addiction Treatment Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, July 19, 2000 (412 yeas; 1 nay).
- H.R. 2780**—To authorize the Attorney General to provide grants for organizations to find missing adults. “Kristen’s Act”. Passed the House October 19, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 2816**—To establish a grant program to assist State and local law enforcement in deterring, investigating, and prosecuting computer crimes. “Computer Crime Enforcement Act”. Passed the House December 15, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 2883**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to confer United States citizenship automatically and retroactively on certain foreign-born children adopted by citizens of the United States. “Adopted Orphans Citizenship Act”. Passed the House, amended, September 19, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 2886**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide that an adopted alien who is less than 18 years of age may be considered a child under such Act if adopted with or after a sibling who is a child under such Act. Passed the House October 18, 1999 (404 yeas; 0 nays).
- H.R. 2904**—To amend the Ethics in Government Act of 1978 to reauthorize funding for the Office of Government Ethics. Passed the House, amended, November 8, 1999 (386 yeas; 1 nay). (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 2909**—To provide for implementation by the United States of the Hague Convention on Protection of Children and Cooperation in Respect of Intercountry Adoption, and for other purposes. “Intercountry Adoption Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, July 18, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 2942**—To extend for 6 additional months the period for which chapter 12 of title 11 of the United States Code is reenacted. Passed the House, amended, September 27, 1999, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 2961**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to authorize a 3-year pilot program under which the Attorney General may extend the period for voluntary departure in the case of certain nonimmigrant aliens who require medical treatment in the United States and were admitted under the Visa Waiver Pilot Program, and for other purposes. “International Patient Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, July 18, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3028**—To amend certain trademark laws to prevent the misappropriation of marks. “Trademark Cyberpiracy Prevention Act”. Passed the House, amended, October 26, 1999, by voice vote. (*Superseded by S. 1255 below.*)
- H.R. 3048**—To amend section 879 of title 18, United States Code, to provide clearer coverage over threats against former Presidents and members of their families, and for other purposes. “Presidential Threat Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, June 26, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3061**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to extend for an additional 2 years the period for admission of an alien as a nonimmigrant under section 101(a)(15)(S) of such Act, and to authorize appropriations for the refugee assistance program under chapter 2 of title IV of the Immigration and Nationality Act. Passed the House October 26, 1999, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 3088**—To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to provide additional protections to victims of rape. “Victims of Rape Health Protection Act”. Passed the House October 2, 2000 (380 yeas; 19 nays). (*Committee discharged.*)
- H.R. 3111**—To exempt certain reports from automatic elimination and sunset pursuant to the Federal Reports Elimination and Sunset Act of 1995. Passed the House, amended, October 25, 1999, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged.*)

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- H.R. 3164**—To provide for the imposition of economic sanctions on certain foreign persons engaging in, or otherwise involved in, international narcotics trafficking. “Foreign Narcotics Kingpin Designation Act”. Passed the House November 2, 1999 (385 yeas; 26 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 3235**—To improve academic and social outcomes for youth and reduce both juvenile crime and the risk that youth will become victims of crime by providing productive activities conducted by law enforcement personnel during non-school hours. “National Police Athletic League Youth Enrichment Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, October 2, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3244**—To combat trafficking of persons, especially into the sex trade, slavery, and slavery-like conditions in the United States and countries around the world through prevention, through prosecution and enforcement against traffickers, and through protection and assistance to victims of trafficking. “Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, May 9, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3312**—To clarify the Administrative Dispute Resolution Act of 1996 to authorize the Merit Systems Protection Board to establish under such Act a 3-year pilot program that will provide a voluntary early intervention alternative dispute resolution process to assist Federal agencies and employees in resolving certain personnel actions and disputes in administrative programs. “Merit Systems Protection Board Administrative Dispute Resolution Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, October 24, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3380**—To amend title 17, United States Code, to establish Federal jurisdiction over offenses committed outside the United States by persons employed by or accompanying the Armed Forces, or by members of the Armed Forces, or by members of the Armed Forces who were released or separated from active duty prior to being identified and prosecuted for the commission of such offenses, and for other purposes. “Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, July 25, 2000, by voice vote. (*Superseded by S. 768 below*).
- H.R. 3456**—To amend statutory damages provisions of title 17, United States Code. “Digital Theft Deterrence and Copyright Damages Improvement Act of 1999”. Passed the House November 18, 1999, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 3484**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to provide that certain sexual crimes against children are predicate crimes for the interception of communications, and for other purposes. “Child Sex Crimes Wiretapping Act of 1999”. Passed the House, amended, October 3, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3485**—To modify the enforcement of certain anti-terrorism judgments, and for other purposes. “Justice for Victims of Terrorism Act”. Passed the House, amended, July 25, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3615**—To amend the Rural Electrification Act of 1936 to ensure improved access to the signals of local television stations by multichannel video providers to all households which desire such service in unserved and underserved rural areas by December 31, 2006. “Rural Local Broadcast Signal Act” Passed the House, amended, April 13, 2000 (375 yeas; 37 nays).
- H.R. 3660**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to ban partial-birth abortions. “Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act of 2000”. Passed the House April 5, 2000 (287 yeas; 141 nays). (*Committee discharged; superseded by S. 1692 below*).
- H.R. 3709**—To make permanent the moratorium enacted by the Internet Tax Freedom Act as it applies to new, multiple, and discriminatory taxes on the Internet. “Internet Nondiscrimination Act”. Passed the House, amended, May 10, 2000 (352 yeas; 75 nays).
- H.R. 3767**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to make improvements to, and permanently authorize, the visa waiver pilot program under section 217 of such Act. “Visa Waiver Permanent Program Act”. Passed the House, amended, April 11, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 3879**—To support the Government of the Republic of Sierra Leone in its peace-building efforts, and for other purposes. “Sierra Leone Peace Support Act of 2000”. Passed the House, amended, May 3, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4033**—To amend the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to clarify the procedures and conditions for the award of matching grants for the purchase of armor vests. “Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant Act of 2000”. Passed the House, amended, July 26, 2000 (413 yeas; 3 nays).
- H.R. 4047**—To amend title 18 of the United States Code to provide life imprisonment for repeat offenders who commit sex offenses against children. “Two Strikes and You’re Out Child Protection Act”. Passed the House July 25, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).

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- H.R. 4051**—To establish a grant program that provides incentives for States to enact mandatory minimum sentences for certain firearms offenses, and for other purposes. “Project Exile: The Safe Streets and Neighborhoods Act of 2000”. Passed the House April 11, 2000 (358 yeas; 60 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4068**—To amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to extend for an additional 3 years the special immigrant religious worker program. “Religious Worker Act of 2000”. Passed the House September 19, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4147**—To amend title 18, United States Code, to increase the age of persons considered to be minors for the purposes of the prohibition on transporting obscene materials to minors. “Stop Material Unsuitable for Teens Act”. Passed the House October 2, 2000 (397 yeas; 2 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4205**—To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2001 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military construction, and for defense activities of the Department of Energy, to prescribe personnel strengths for such fiscal year for the Armed Forces, and for other purposes. “Floyd D. Spence National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2001”. Passed the House May 18, 2000 (353 yeas; 63 nays). (*Committee named to conference*).
- H.R. 4292**—To protect infants who are born alive. “Born-Alive Infant Protection Act of 2000”. Passed the House September 26, 2000 (318 yeas; 15 nays; 3 “present”).
- H.R. 4391**—To amend title 4 of the United States Code to establish nexus requirements for State and local taxation of mobile telecommunication services. “Mobile Telecommunications Sourcing Act”. Passed the House, amended, July 11, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 4489**—To amend section 110 of the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996, and for other purposes. Passed the House May 23, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4493**—To establish grants for drug treatment alternative to prison programs administered by State or local prosecutors. “Prosecution Drug Treatment Alternative to Prison Act of 2000”. Passed the House October 17, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4640**—To make grants to States for carrying out DNA analyses for use in the Combined DNA Index System of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, to provide for the collection and analysis of DNA samples from certain violent and sexual offenders for use in such system, and for other purposes. “DNA Analysis Backlog Elimination Act of 2000”. Passed the House, amended, October 2, 2000, by voice vote.
- H.R. 4678**—To provide more child support money to families leaving welfare, to simplify the rules governing the assignment and distribution of child support collected by States on behalf of children, to improve the collection of child support, to promote marriage, and for other purposes. “Child Support Distribution Act of 2000”. Passed the House, amended, September 7, 2000 (405 yeas; 18 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4681**—To provide for the adjustment of status of certain Syrian nationals. Passed the House, amended, July 11, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4700**—To grant the consent of the Congress to the Kansas and Missouri Metropolitan Culture District Compact. Passed the House July 24, 2000 (376 yeas; 1 nay).
- H.R. 4710**—To authorize appropriations for the prosecution of obscenity cases. “Illegal Pornography Prosecution Act of 2000”. Passed the House July 25, 2000 (412 yeas; 4 nays). (*Committee discharged*).
- H.R. 4718**—To extend for 3 additional months the period for which chapter 12 of title 11 of the United States Code is reenacted. Passed the House June 26, 2000, by voice vote. (*Committee discharged*).
