

CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS AND SIMPLE RESOLUTIONS APPROVED

- H.Con.Res. 122**—Recognizing the United States Border Patrol's 75 years of service since its founding. Agreed to by the House November 10, 1999; agreed to by the Senate November 19, 1999.
- H.Con.Res. 141**—Celebrating One America. Agreed to by the House October 13, 1999; agreed to by the Senate November 19, 1999.
- H.Res. 10**—Appointing and authorizing managers for the impeachment trial of William Jefferson Clinton, President of the United States. Agreed to by the House January 6, 1999.
- H.Res. 165**—Acknowledging the dedication and sacrifice made by the men and women who have lost their lives while serving as law enforcement officers. Agreed to by the House May 11, 1999.
- H.Res. 176**—Recognizing the historical significance of the Supreme Court's unanimous decision in *Brown v. Board of Education*, repudiating segregation, and reaffirming the fundamental belief that we are all "one Nation under God, indivisible". Agreed to by the House May 18, 1999.
- H.Res. 226**—Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives condemning the acts of arson at three Sacramento, California, area synagogues on June 18, 1999, and affirming its opposition to such crimes. Agreed to by the House June 29, 1999.
- H.Res. 254**—Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives condemning recent hate crimes in Illinois and Indiana. Agreed to by the House November 18, 1999.
- H.Res. 494**—Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives that the Ohio State motto is constitutional and urging the courts to uphold its constitutionality. Agreed to by the House June 27, 2000.
- H.Res. 501**—Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives regarding the Nation's law enforcement officers. Agreed to by the House May 15, 2000.
- H.Res. 548**—Expressing the sense of Congress regarding the national motto for the government of a religious people. Agreed to by the House July 24, 2000.
- H.Res. 561**—Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives that the President should focus appropriate attention on the issue of neighborhood crime prevention, community policing and reduction of school crime by delivering speeches, convening meetings, and directing his Administration to make reducing crime an important priority. Agreed to by the House July 27, 2000.
- H.Res. 605**—Expressing the sense of the House of Representatives that communities should implement the Amber Plan to expedite the recovery of abducted children. Agreed to by the House October 24, 2000.
