1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Drug Trafficking Safe3 Harbor Elimination Act of 2011".

12 "(b) Whoever, within the United States, conspires 13 with one or more persons, or aids or abets one or more 14 persons, regardless of where such other persons are lo-15 cated, to engage in conduct at any place outside the 16 United States that would constitute a violation of this title 17 if committed within the United States, shall be subject to 18 the same penalties that would apply to such conduct if 19 it were to occur within the United States.".
