PENDING BUSINESS

MOTION TO PROCEED TO CONSIDER S.J. RES. 36 (ORDER NO. 361)

Motion to proceed to the consideration of S.J. Res. 36, a joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the National Labor Relations Board relating to representation election procedures. (*Apr. 23, 2012.*)

S. 1925 (ORDER NO. 312)

1.—*Ordered*, That at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, April 24, 2012, the Senate resume consideration of the motion to proceed to S. 1925, a bill to reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act of 1994.

Ordered further, That at 12:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 24, the Senate resume consideration of the motion to proceed to S. 1925.

Ordered further, That upon disposition of S. 1789, but no earlier than Wednesday, April 25, 2012, the Senate adopt the motion to proceed to S. 1925. (*Apr. 23, 2012.*)

S.J. RES. 36 (ORDER NO. 361)

2.—*Ordered*, That at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday, April 24, 2012, the Senate resume consideration of the motion to proceed to S.J. Res. 36, a joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the National Labor Relations Board relating to representation election procedures; provided, that there be two hours of debate, equally divided between the two Leaders, or their designees.

Ordered further, That at 2:15 p.m. on Tuesday, April 24, 2012, the Senate resume consideration of the motion to proceed and vote on the adoption of the motion; provided, that if the motion is successful, then the time for debate with respect to the joint resolution be equally divided between the two Leaders, or their designees; provided further, that upon the use or yielding back of time, the joint resolution be read a third time and the Senate proceed to vote on passage of the joint resolution; provided further, that all other provisions of the statute governing consideration of the joint resolution remain in effect. (*Apr. 19, 23, 2012.*)

Ordered further, That on Tuesday, April 24, 2012, at a time to be determined by the Majority Leader, after consultation with the Republican Leader, the Senate vote in relation to the amendments in the order listed; provided, that there be two minutes equally divided in the usual form prior to each vote; provided further, that all votes after the first vote be 10 minutes in duration; provided further, that the amendments be subject to a 60 vote affirmative threshold; provided further, that there be no amendments in order to the bill, the substitute, as modified, or the amendments listed; further, that there be no points of order or motions in order to any of the amendments listed, the substitute amendment, as modified, or the bill, other than budget points of order and the applicable motions to waive.

Ordered further, That upon disposition of the amendments, the substitute amendment, as modified and amended, if amended, be agreed to; provided further, the bill as amended, be read a third time and the Senate vote on passage of the bill, as amended; further, that the vote on passage of the bill be subject to a 60 affirmative vote threshold. (Apr. 19, 2012.)

S. 1813

4.—*Ordered,* That S. 1813, a bill to reauthorize Federal-aid highway and highway safety construction programs, and for other purposes, as amended and passed, be held at the desk.

Ordered further, That when the Senate receives from the House a companion to S. 1813 (as determined by the two Leaders), it be in order for the Majority Leader to proceed to its immediate consideration, that all after the enacting clause be stricken and the text of S. 1813, as passed by the Senate be inserted in lieu thereof; provided, that the House bill, as amended, be read a third time, a statutory PAYGO statement be read (if necessary), the bill, as amended, be passed, and the motions to reconsider be considered made and laid upon the table; provided further, that upon passage, the Senate insist on its amendment, request a conference with the House on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses, and the Chair be authorized to appoint conferees on the part of the Senate.
