## Senate

### Chamber Action

*Routine Proceedings, pages S9941–S10025*

**Measures Introduced:** Five bills and one resolution were introduced, as follows: S. 1476–1480, and S. Res. 164. **Pages S9971–72**

#### Measures Reported:

S. 423, to amend the Act entitled “An Act to provide for the establishment of Fort Clatsop National Memorial in the State of Oregon”, with amendments. (S. Rept. No. 107–69)

S. 941, to revise the boundaries of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area in the State of California, to extend the term of the advisory commission for the recreation area, with amendments. (S. Rept. No. 107–70)

S. 1057, to authorize the addition of lands to Pu‘uhonua o Honaunau National Historical Park in the State of Hawaii. (S. Rept. No. 107–71)

S. 1097, to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to issue right-of-way permits for natural gas pipelines within the boundary of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. (S. Rept. No. 107–72)

S. 1105, to provide for the expeditious completion of the acquisition of State of Wyoming lands within the boundaries of Grand Teton National Park., with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. (S. Rept. No. 107–73)

H.R. 146, to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to study the suitability and feasibility of designating the Great Falls Historic District in Paterson, New Jersey, as a unit of the National Park System.

H.R. 182, to amend the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act to designate a segment of the Eight Mile River in the State of Connecticut for study for potential addition to the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System. (S. Rept. No. 107–75)

H.R. 1000, to adjust the boundary of the William Howard Taft National Historic Site in the State of Ohio, to authorize an exchange of land in connection with the historic site. (S. Rept. No. 107–76)

H.R. 1668, to authorize the Adams Memorial Foundation to establish a commemorative work on Federal land in the District of Columbia and its environs to honor former President John Adams and his legacy. (S. Rept. No. 107–77)

Report to accompany S. 703, to extend the effective period of the consent of Congress to the interstate compact relating to the restoration of Atlantic salmon to the Connecticut River Basin and creating the Connecticut River Atlantic Salmon Commission. (S. Rept. No. 107–78) **Page S9971**

**Department of Defense Authorization:** Senate resumed consideration of S. 1438, to authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2002 for military activities of the Department of Defense, for military constructions, and for defense activities of the Department of Energy, to prescribe personnel strengths for such fiscal year for the Armed Forces, taking action on the following amendments proposed thereto:

Dodd Amendment No. 1750, to extend firefighter assistance through fiscal year 2004. **Pages S9956–60**

Levin/Warner Amendment No. 1793, to authorize the appropriation of \$8,000,000 for military construction for the Air Force for airfield repairs at Masirah Island, Oman. **Pages S9960–65**

Warner/Levin Amendment No. 1794, to authorize the Secretary of the Navy to acquire land for the Harvey Point Defense Testing Activity in Hertford, North Carolina. **Pages S9960–65**

Levin (for Feingold) Amendment No. 1795, to provide for the conveyance of the excess Army Reserve Center in Kewaunee, Wisconsin. **Pages S9960–65**

Warner/Levin Amendment No. 1796, to increase by \$22,700,000 the amount for the Air Force for missile procurement for the nuclear detonation detection system program, and to provide an offset.

Levin (for Carnahan) Amendment No. 1797, make permanent the authority to provide transitional

health care for members of the Armed Forces who are involuntarily separated, and to extend eligibility for transitional health care under that authority to mobilized members of the reserve components.

Warner (for Stevens) Amendment No. 1798, to make available \$230,255,000 for Environmental Restoration, Formerly Used Defense Sites.

Levin (for Dorgan) Amendment No. 1799, to require a plan to ensure that the embarkation of civilian guests does not interfere with the operational readiness and safe operation of Navy vessels.

Warner (for Lott) Amendment No. 1800, to express the sense of the Senate on defense burdensharing by allies of the United States.

Levin (for Bingaman) Amendment No. 1801, to make available \$650,000 for the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center for an expanded Arabic language program.

**Pages S9960-65**

Warner (for Lott) Amendment No. 1802, to authorize \$3,000,000 for the replacement or refurbishment of air handlers and related control systems at Keesler AFB Medical Center.

**Pages S9960-65**

Levin (for Bingaman) Amendment No. 1803, to require an annual assessment and report on the vulnerability of Department of Energy facilities terrorist attack.

**Pages S9960-65**

Warner Amendment No. 1804, to eliminate a restriction on the use of certain vessels previously authorized to be sold.

**Pages S9960-65**

Levin (for Durbin) Amendment No. 1805, to authorize the Secretary of the Navy to fund Department of Veterans Affairs space renovations when the Secretary of Veterans Affairs makes additional land available to the Navy at Great Lakes Naval Training Center.

**Pages S9960-65**

Warner (for Bond/Byrd) Amendment No. 1806, to provide an amount for the training of active duty and reserve component personnel in the management of the consequences of an incident involving the use or threat of use of a weapon of mass destruction.

Levin (for Rockefeller) Amendment No. 1807, to authorize the acceptance of contributions for the repair of the damage to the Pentagon Reservation caused by the terrorist attack on September 11, 2001 or establishment of a memorial of the attack at the Pentagon Reservation.

Warner (for McCain) Amendment No. 1808, to authorize payment of career continuation bonuses for aviation officers and surface warfare officers for early commitments to remain on active duty.

Levin (for Bingaman/Domenici) Amendment No. 1809, to authorize, with an offset, an additional \$6,500,000 for research, development, test, and evaluation Defense-wide, with \$5,000,000 allocated for the Big Crow Program and \$1,500,000 allocated for the Defense Systems Evaluation program.

Warner (for Lott) Amendment No. 1810, to authorize \$2,500,000 for appropriations in section 201(1), in PE62303A214 for Enhanced Scramjet Mixing.

Levin (for Cleland/Miller) Amendment No. 1811, to authorize, with an offset, \$2,800,000 for the Special Operations Forces Command, Control, Communications, Computers, and Intelligence Systems Threat Warning and Situational Awareness (PRIVATEER) program.

Warner Amendment No. 1812, to set aside funds for the critical infrastructure protection initiative of the Navy.

Levin (for Conrad) Amendment No. 1813, to provide for a report and certain recommendations on options for providing the helicopter support missions for the ICBM wings at Minot AFB, North Dakota; Malmstrom AFB, Montana; and F.E. Warren AFB, Wyoming, for as long as these missions are required.

Warner (for Hutchison) Amendment No. 1814, to require a report on health and disability benefits for pre-accession training and education programs.

Levin (for Johnson) Amendment No. 1815, to express the sense of the Senate that the Secretary of the Treasury should immediately issue savings bonds, to be designated as "Unity Bonds", in response to the terrorist attacks against the United States on September 11, 2001.

Warner Amendment No. 1816, to provide for personnel pay and qualifications authority for Department of Defense Pentagon Reservation civilian law enforcement and security force.

Levin (for Kennedy) Amendment No. 1817, to further improve benefits under the TRICARE program.

**Pages S9965-68**

Warner Amendment No. 1818, to amend Title 5 of the United States Code to authorize payment of hostile fire pay to civilian employees of the federal government under certain conditions.

Levin (for Kennedy) Amendment No. 1819, to provide family support benefits for the families of members of the Armed Forces involved in national emergency operations of the Armed Forces.

Warner (for Collins) Amendment No. 1820, to authorize the Secretary of Transportation, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense, to waive, or

limit the application of, vehicle weight limits applicable to a route on the Interstate System in the State of Maine during a period of national emergency.
