By 68 yeas to 30 nays (Vote No. 162), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, having voted in the affirmative, Senate agreed to the motion to waive section 4(g)(3) of the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010, and all applicable sections of that Act and other budget related Acts and applicable budget resolutions, with respect to the bill and amendments. Subsequently, the point of order that the bill was in violation of section 4(g)(3) of the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010, was not sustained, and thus the point of order fell. **Page S5215**

By 67 yeas to 31 nays (Vote No. 164), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, having

voted in the affirmative, Senate agreed to the motion to close further debate on the committee-reported substitute amendment to the bill. **Page S5216**

A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that on Thursday, June 27, 2013, upon disposition of the nomination of Anthony Renard Foxx, of North Carolina, to be Secretary of Transportation, all post-cloture time be considered expired with respect to the committee-reported substitute amendment; that the pending amendments to the underlying bill be withdrawn; that the Majority Leader then be recognized for the purpose of raising points of order against the remaining pending amendments to the substitute amendment; that after the amendments fall, Senate vote on adoption of the committee-reported substitute amendment; that upon disposition of the committee-reported substitute amendment, Senate vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the bill, as amended; and that if cloture is invoked, it be considered as if cloture has been invoked at 7:00 a.m., on Thursday, June 27, 2013.
