|               | A Proclamation  |
|               | Today, America pays tribute to Brigadier General Casimir Pulaski, a proud<br>Polish patriot who embraced our country's highest ideals. He fought for<br>freedom on two continents, earned the title, "Father of the American Cav-<br>alry," and guided his unit through some of the toughest tests of the Revolu-<br>tionary War, ultimately laying down his life for our nascent country. On<br>General Pulaski Memorial Day, we honor his memory and celebrate the<br>many contributions Polish Americans have made to America's culture and<br>history.  |
|               | As a young soldier, General Pulaski rose to defend his homeland against<br>foreign occupation. He fought valiantly for Poland's sovereignty but was<br>eventually forced into exile, and it was in Paris that he met Benjamin<br>Franklin. Franklin told him of America's aspirations, and Pulaski journeyed<br>across the Atlantic to join our struggle for freedom, equality, and justice.<br>Arriving in America in 1777, he served beside General George Washington,<br>who appreciated his military experience. He later formed an independent<br>corps of cavalry known as the Pulaski Legion, which battled bravely from<br>the New Jersey coast to the siege of Savannah, where he was mortally<br>wounded. |
|               | Pulaski's unit was a diverse collection of soldiers, composed of Americans,<br>Germans, Frenchmen, Irishmen, and Poles. Their differences were many,<br>but they were united by a basic longing for human liberty. This same<br>longing—which moved Pulaski to make the ultimate sacrifice—has come<br>to define America and reflect our lasting ties to the people of Poland.<br>Today, as we commemorate Casimir Pulaski's extraordinary life, we recognize<br>that his spirit lives on in all those who are driven to pursue a freer,<br>more just world.  |
|               | NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States<br>of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution<br>and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim October 11, 2011,<br>as General Pulaski Memorial Day. I encourage all Americans to commemorate<br>this occasion with appropriate programs and activities paying tribute to<br>Casimir Pulaski and honoring all those who defend the freedom of our<br>Nation.   |
