¶46.8 PROVIDING FOR THE CONSIDERATION OF H. R. 3090

Ms. SLAUGHTER, by direction of the Committee on Rules, called up the following resolution (H. Res. 442):

*Resolved*, That at any time after the adoption of this resolution the Speaker may, pursuant to clause 1(b) of rule XXIII, declare the House resolved into the Committee of the Whole House on the State of the Union for the consideration of the bill (H.R. 3090) to amend the Public Health Service Act to revise and extend the program of assistance for family planning services, and the first reading of the bill shall be dispensed with. After general debate, which shall be confined to the bill and which shall not exceed one hour, to be equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Committee on Energy and Commerce, the bill shall be considered as having been read for amendment under the five-minute rule. No amendment to the bill shall be in order except the amendments printed in the report of the Committee on Rules accompanying this resolution. Said amendments shall be considered in the order and manner specified in the report and shall be considered as having been read. Said amendments shall be debatable for the period specified in the report, equally divided and controlled by the proponent and a member opposed thereto. Said amendments shall not be subject to amendment. It shall then be in order to consider en bloc the amendments offered by Representative Waxman of California, and said amendments en bloc shall not be subject to a demand for a division of the question in the House or in the Committee of the Whole. At the conclusion of the consideration of the bill for amendment, the Committee shall rise and report the bill to the House, and the previous question shall be considered as ordered on the bill and amendments thereto to final passage without intervening motion except one motion to recommit. After passage of H.R. 3090, it shall then be in order to take from the Speaker's table the bill S. 323 and to consider said bill in the House. It shall be in order to move to strike out all after the enacting clause of said Senate bill and to insert in lieu thereof the provisions of H.R. 3090 as passed by the House. All points of order against the motion for failure to comply with the provisions of clause 7 of rule XVI are hereby waived. It shall then be in order to move to insist on the House amendment to S. 323 and request a conference with the Senate.

When said resolution was considered. After debate,

On motion of Ms. SLAUGHTER, the previous question was ordered on the resolution to its adoption or rejection.

The question being put, viva voce,

Will the House agree to said resolution?

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MONTGOMERY, announced that the yeas had it.

Mr. QUILLEN objected to the vote on the ground that a quorum was not present and not voting.
