CHAP. 318.—Joint Resolution Authorizing the presentation of medals to [H. J. Res. 327.] the officers and men of the Byrd antarctic expedition. [Pub. Res., No. 75.]

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, empowered and directed to cause to be made at the United States mint such number of gold, silver, the Maxy, for presenta-and bronze medals as he may deem appropriate and necessary respectively to be presented to the officers and men of the Byrd presentation to appressive the high administion in which the antarctic expedition to express the high admiration in which the Congress and the American people hold their heroic and undaunted services in connection with the scientific investigations and extraor-dinary aerial explorations of the Antarctic Continent, under the personal direction of Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, said medals to be suitably inscribed.

SEC. 2. That such amount as may be necessary for the cost of said Amount authorized medals is hereby authorized to be appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

CHAP. 320.-An Act To establish and operate a National Institute of Health, to create a system of fellowships in said institute, and to authorize the Govern-ment to accept donations for use in ascertaining the cause, prevention, and cure of disease affecting human beings, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Hygienic Mealth. Laboratory of the Public Health Service shall hereafter be known Hygienic Laboratory, Public Health Service as the National Institute of Health, and all laws, authorizations, and transferred to. Ante, pp. 150, 152. Post, pp. 1228, 1586. be applicable for the operation and maintenance of the National Institute of Health. The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to utilize the site now occupied by the Hygienic Laboratory and the land adjacent thereto owned by the Government and available for this purpose, or when funds are available therefor, to acquire sites by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, in or near the District of Columbia, and to erect thereon and to furnish and equip suitable and adequate buildings for the use of such institute. In the admin- nel. Selection of personistration and operation of this institute the Surgeon General shall select persons who show unusual aptitude in science. There is for construction, hereby authorized to be appropriated, out of any money in the additional buildings. Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$750,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary for construction and equipment of additional buildings at the present Hygienic Laboratory of the Pub-

lic Health Service, Washington, District of Columbia. SEC. 2. The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to accept on Unconditional gifts behalf of the United States gifts made unconditionally by will or etc., of diseases of man. otherwise for study, investigation, and research in the fundamental problems of the diseases of man and matters pertaining thereto,
