To reauthorize funding for the Office of Educational Research and Improvement, to provide for miscellaneous education improvement programs, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. REAUTHORIZATION.**

2 Paragraph (1) of subsection (e) of section 405 of the
 3 General Education Provisions Act (20 U.S.C.
 4 1221e(e)(1)) is amended by striking “1987” and inserting
 5 “1992”.

6 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF TITLES.**

7 (a) **SHORT TITLE.**—This Act may be cited as the
 8 “Office of Educational Research and Improvement Reau-
 9 thorization Act”.

15 **SEC. 101. OFFICE OF EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH AND IM-**
 16 **PROVEMENT.**

17 (a) **IN GENERAL.**—Section 405 of the General Edu-
 18 cation Provisions Act (20 U.S.C. 1221e et seq.) is amend-
 19 ed to read as follows:

1 **“SEC. 405. OFFICE OF EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH AND IM-**
2 **PROVEMENT.**

3 **“(a) PURPOSES; COMPOSITION; DEFINITIONS.—**

4 **“(1) PURPOSE.—**The purposes of the Office of
5 Educational Research and Improvement are to—

6 **“(A) assess, promote, and improve the**
7 **quality and equity of education in the United**
8 **States, so that all Americans have an equal op-**
9 **portunity to receive an education of the highest**
10 **quality;**

11 **“(B) provide new directions for the feder-**
12 **ally supported developmental and research ac-**
13 **tivities with a view toward reform in the Na-**
14 **tion’s school systems, achieving national edu-**
15 **cation goals and effecting national policy for**
16 **education;**

17 **“(C) provide leadership in the scientific in-**
18 **quiry into the educational process;**

19 **“(D) provide leadership in advancing the**
20 **practice of education as an art, science, and**
21 **profession;**

22 **“(E) collect, analyze, and disseminate sta-**
23 **tistics and other data related to education in**
24 **the United States and other nations; and**

25 **“(F) make available to the Congress and**
26 **the people of the United States the results of**

1 research and development activities in the field
2 of education in order to bring research directly
3 to the classroom to improve educational prac-
4 tice.

5 ~~“(2) COMPOSITION.—~~

6 ~~“(A) IN GENERAL.—~~The Office shall be
7 administered by the Assistant Secretary and
8 shall include—

9 ~~“(i) the Distinguished Board of Gov-~~
10 ~~ernors for Educational Research described~~
11 ~~in subparagraph (B);~~

12 ~~“(ii) the Directorates for Educational~~
13 ~~Research described in subsections (c)~~
14 ~~through (h);~~

15 ~~“(iii) the regional educational labora-~~
16 ~~tories described in subsection (k);~~

17 ~~“(iv) the Office of Educational Dis-~~
18 ~~semination described in subsection (m);~~

19 ~~“(v) the National Education Library~~
20 ~~described in subsection (o);~~

21 ~~“(vi) the Education Resources Infor-~~
22 ~~mation Clearinghouses described in sub-~~
23 ~~section (p);~~

1 “(vii) the National Center for Edu-
2 cation Statistics, including the National
3 Assessment of Educational Progress; and

4 “(viii) such other entities as the As-
5 sistant Secretary deems appropriate to
6 carry out the purposes of the Office.

7 “(B) DISTINGUISHED BOARD OF GOV-
8 ERNORS.—

9 “(i) DISTINGUISHED BOARD OF GOV-
10 ERNORS.—The Distinguished Board of
11 Governors shall consist of 9 members to be
12 appointed by the President, by and with
13 the advice and consent of the Senate, and
14 the Assistant Secretary ex officio.

15 “(ii) QUALIFICATIONS.—(I) The per-
16 sons nominated for appointment as mem-
17 bers of the Board shall be nominated solely
18 on the basis of—

19 “(aa) eminence in fields of basic
20 or applied research, or dissemination
21 of such research; or

22 “(bb) established records of dis-
23 tinguished service in educational re-
24 search and the education professions.

1 ~~“(II) In making nominations under~~
2 ~~this clause, the President is requested to~~
3 ~~give due consideration to equitable rep-~~
4 ~~resentation of educational researchers~~
5 ~~who—~~

6 ~~“(aa) are women;~~

11 ~~“(III) The President is requested in~~
12 ~~the making of nominations of persons for~~
13 ~~appointment as members, to give due con-~~
14 ~~sideration to any recommendations for~~
15 ~~nomination which may be submitted to the~~
16 ~~President by the National Academy of~~
17 ~~Education and the National Academy of~~
18 ~~Sciences.~~

19 ~~“(IV) A nominee for membership on~~
20 ~~the Board, if confirmed, may not serve on~~
21 ~~any other Department of Education advi-~~
22 ~~sory board, panel, including peer review~~
23 ~~panel, or task force, or as a paid consult-~~
24 ~~ant of such Department.~~

1 “(iii) TERM.—(I) The term of office
2 of each member of the Board shall be 6
3 years, except that any member appointed
4 to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the ex-
5 piration of the term for which the mem-
6 ber’s predecessor was appointed shall be
7 appointed for the remainder of such term.
8 Any person, other than the Assistant Sec-
9 retary, who has been a member of the
10 Board for 12 consecutive years shall there-
11 after be ineligible for appointment during
12 the 6-year period following the expiration
13 of such twelfth year.

14 “(II) The members of the Board shall
15 select a Chairperson from among such
16 members.

17 “(III) A majority of the appointed
18 members of the Board shall constitute a
19 quorum.

20 “(IV) From amounts appropriated
21 pursuant to the authority of subsection
22 (q), the Board shall appoint an Executive
23 Director, and may with the concurrence of
24 a majority of its members, permit the ap-
25 pointment of a staff consisting of not more

1 than 3 professional staff members and
2 clerical staff members as may be necessary
3 and selected by the Board. Such staff shall
4 be appointed by the Assistant Secretary
5 and assigned at the direction of the Board.
6 The professional members of such staff
7 may be appointed without regard to the
8 provisions of title 5, United States Code,
9 governing appointments in the competitive
10 services, and may be paid without regard
11 to the provisions of chapter 51 and sub-
12 chapter 53 of such title relating to classi-
13 fication and general schedule pay rates.

14 “(iv) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The Board
15 shall provide oversight of the Office, and
16 shall—

17 “(I) advise the Nation on the
18 Federal research and development ef-
19 fort;

20 “(II) recommend ways for
21 strengthening active partnerships
22 among researchers, educational practi-
23 tioners and policymakers;

24 “(III) recommend ways to
25 strengthen interaction and collabora-

1 tion between the various program of-
2 fices and components;

3 ~~“(IV) solicit advice and informa-~~
4 ~~tion from the educational field, to de-~~
5 ~~fine research needs and suggestions~~
6 ~~for research topics, and shall involve~~
7 ~~educational practitioners, particularly~~
8 ~~teachers, in this process;~~

9 ~~“(V) provide recommendations~~
10 ~~for translating research findings into~~
11 ~~workable, adaptable models for use in~~
12 ~~policy and in practice across different~~
13 ~~settings, and recommendations for~~
14 ~~other forms of dissemination;~~

15 ~~“(VI) provide recommendations~~
16 ~~for creating incentives to draw tal-~~
17 ~~ented young people into the field of~~
18 ~~educational research, including schol-~~
19 ~~ars from disadvantaged and minority~~
20 ~~groups;~~

21 ~~“(VII) provide recommendations~~
22 ~~for new studies to close gaps in the~~
23 ~~research base;~~

24 ~~“(VIII) advise the Assistant Sec-~~
25 ~~retary on standards and guidelines for~~

1 research programs and activities to
2 ensure that research is of high quality
3 and is free from undue partisan or po-
4 litical influence; and

5 “(IX) provide recommendations
6 for coordination and synthesis of re-
7 search among directorates.

8 “(v) MEETINGS AND REPORTS.—(I)
9 The Board is authorized to appoint from
10 among its members such committees as the
11 Board deems necessary, and to assign to
12 committees so appointed such survey and
13 advisory functions as the Board deems ap-
14 propriate to assist the Board in exercising
15 its powers and functions under this sec-
16 tion.

17 “(II) From amounts appropriated
18 pursuant to subsection (g), the Board shall
19 render to the President, for submission to
20 the Congress no later than January 15 of
21 each even-numbered year, a report on the
22 activities of the Office, and on education,
23 educational research, national indicators
24 and data gathering in general.

1 “(C) DEFINITION.—For the purposes of
2 this section—

3 “(i) the term ‘Office’, unless otherwise
4 specified, means the Office of Educational
5 Research and Improvement established by
6 section 209 of the Department of Edu-
7 cation Organization Act;

8 “(ii) the term ‘Assistant Secretary’
9 means the Assistant Secretary for Edu-
10 cational Research and Improvement estab-
11 lished by section 202 of the Department of
12 Education Organization Act;

13 “(iii) the term ‘Board’ means the Dis-
14 tinguished Board of Governors for Edu-
15 cational Research established under para-
16 graph (2)(B);

17 “(iv) the term ‘education research’ in-
18 cludes basic and applied research, inquiry
19 with the purpose of applying tested knowl-
20 edge gained to specific educational settings
21 and problems, development, planning, sur-
22 veys, assessments, evaluations, investiga-
23 tions, experiments and demonstrations in
24 the field of education and other fields re-
25 lating to education;

1 ~~“(v) the term ‘dissemination’ means~~
2 ~~the transfer of ideas and products devel-~~
3 ~~oped through research to educational sites~~
4 ~~where such ideas and products can be de-~~
5 ~~veloped, adapted, implemented and oper-~~
6 ~~ated for the purpose of improvement, com-~~
7 ~~munication techniques to spread informa-~~
8 ~~tion, and demonstrations of the utility and~~
9 ~~applicability of research; and~~

10 ~~“(vi) the term ‘technical assistance’~~
11 ~~means assistance in identifying, selecting~~
12 ~~or designing solutions based on research to~~
13 ~~address educational problems, planning~~
14 ~~and design that leads to adapting research~~
15 ~~knowledge to school practice, training to~~
16 ~~implement such solutions, and other assist-~~
17 ~~ance necessary to encourage adoption or~~
18 ~~application of research.~~

19 ~~“(b) AUTHORIZED ACTIVITIES.—~~

20 ~~“(1) OFFICE.—In fulfilling its purposes under~~
21 ~~this section, the Office is authorized to—~~

22 ~~“(A) conduct and support education-relat-~~
23 ~~ed research and activities, including basic and~~
24 ~~applied research, development, planning, sur-~~
25 ~~veys, assessments, evaluations, investigations,~~

1 experiments and demonstrations of national sig-
2 nificance;

3 “(B) disseminate the findings of education
4 research, and provide technical assistance to
5 apply such information to specific school prob-
6 lems at the school site;

7 “(C) collect, analyze and disseminate data
8 related to education;

9 “(D) promote the use of knowledge gained
10 from research and statistical findings in
11 schools, other educational institutions and com-
12 munities;

13 “(E) train individuals in education re-
14 search; and

15 “(F) promote the coordination of education
16 research and research support within the Fed-
17 eral Government, and otherwise assist and fos-
18 ter such research.

19 “(2) ASSISTANT SECRETARY.—

20 “(A) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out the
21 activities and programs of the Office, the As-
22 sistant Secretary shall—

23 “(i) ensure that there is broad and
24 regular public and professional involvement
25 from the educational field in the planning

1 and carrying out of the Office's activities,
2 including establishing teacher advisory
3 boards for any program office, program or
4 project of the Office as the Assistant Sec-
5 retary deems necessary;

6 “(ii) ensure that the selection of re-
7 search topics and the administration of the
8 program are free from undue partisan or
9 political influence;

10 “(iii) enter into a contract for the
11 conduct of an independent evaluation of
12 programs and activities carried out
13 through the Office to—

14 “(I) advise the President, the
15 Congress and the Nation on—

16 “(aa) the effectiveness of the
17 programs of the Office; and

18 “(bb) the implementation of
19 projects and programs funded
20 through the Office over time;

21 “(II) measure the success of edu-
22 cational information dissemination;

23 “(III) evaluate the impact of edu-
24 cational research on instruction at the
25 school level;

1 “(IV) assess the usefulness of re-
2 search and activities carried out by
3 the Office, including products dissemi-
4 nated by the Office;

5 “(V) evaluate the ability of the
6 Office to keep research funding free
7 from undue partisan or political inter-
8 ference; and

9 “(VI) provide recommendations
10 for improvement of the programs of
11 the Office;

12 “(iv) have direct authority to make
13 grants and contracts pursuant to the pro-
14 grams and activities of the Office;

15 “(v) develop directly, or through grant
16 or contract, standards and guidelines for
17 research, programs and activities carried
18 out through the Office;

19 “(vi) establish a long- and short-term
20 research agenda in consultation with the
21 Board; and

22 “(vii) review research priorities estab-
23 lished within each directorate and promote
24 research syntheses across the directorates.

1 “(B) INFORMATION AND TECHNICAL AS-
2 SISTANCE.—The Assistant Secretary, through
3 the directorates and regional educational lab-
4 oratories assisted under this section and other
5 appropriate entities, is authorized to offer infor-
6 mation and technical assistance to State and
7 local educational agencies, school boards and
8 schools to ensure that no student is—

9 “(i) denied access to the same rigor-
10 ous, challenging curriculum that such stu-
11 dent’s peers are offered; and

12 “(ii) grouped or otherwise labeled in
13 such a way that may impede such stu-
14 dent’s achievement.

15 “(C) LONG-TERM AGENDA.—One year
16 after the date of enactment of the Office of
17 Educational Research and Improvement Reau-
18 thorization Act, the Assistant Secretary shall
19 submit a report to the President and to the
20 Congress on a six-year long-term plan for the
21 educational research agenda for the Office.
22 Upon submission of such report and every 2
23 years thereafter, the Assistant Secretary shall
24 submit to the President and to the Congress a
25 progress report on the six-year plan, including

1 an assessment of the success or failure of meet-
2 ing the components of the six-year plan, pro-
3 posed modifications or changes to the six-year
4 plan, and additions to the six-year plan.

5 “(3) OPEN COMPETITION.—All grant contracts
6 and cooperative agreements awarded or entered into
7 pursuant to this section shall be awarded or entered
8 into through a process of open competition that shall
9 be announced in the Federal Register.

10 “(c) DIRECTORATES OF EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH.—

11 “(1) IN GENERAL.—(A) In carrying out the
12 functions of the Office, the Assistant Secretary shall
13 establish 5 directorates of educational research in
14 accordance with this section.

15 “(B) The Assistant Secretary shall appoint a
16 Director for each directorate. Each such Director
17 shall be a leading professional in the field relevant
18 to the mission of the directorate. Each such Director
19 shall be paid at the rate of pay payable for level IV
20 of the Executive Schedule.

21 “(C) The Assistant Secretary shall provide for
22 and promote research syntheses across the direc-
23 torates, and shall coordinate research plans, projects
24 and findings across the directorates. Each Director
25 shall report directly to the Assistant Secretary, re-

1 garding the activities of the directorate, and shall
2 work together to promote research syntheses across
3 the directorates.

4 ~~“(2) DUTIES.—~~Each such directorate shall—

5 ~~“(A) carry out its activities directly or~~
6 ~~through grants, contracts, and cooperative~~
7 ~~agreements with institutions of higher edu-~~
8 ~~cation, public and private organizations, institu-~~
9 ~~tions, agencies or individuals, or a consortia~~
10 ~~thereof;~~

11 ~~“(B) conduct the highest quality basic and~~
12 ~~applied research in early childhood, elementary~~
13 ~~and secondary, vocational and higher education~~
14 ~~which is relevant to the directorate;~~

15 ~~“(C) serve as a national database on model~~
16 ~~and demonstration programs which have par-~~
17 ~~ticular application to the activities of the direc-~~
18 ~~torate, particularly with respect to model pro-~~
19 ~~grams conducted by business, private and non-~~
20 ~~profit organizations and foundations, Essential~~
21 ~~Schools, Accelerated Schools, New American~~
22 ~~Schools, charter schools, Comer schools and~~
23 ~~Schools of the 21st Century;~~

24 ~~“(D) support, plan, implement and operate~~
25 ~~dissemination activities designed to bring the~~

1 most effective research directly into classroom
2 practice, school organization and management,
3 and teacher preparation and training, and to
4 the extent possible carry out dissemination ac-
5 tivities through the use of technology in accord-
6 ance with such directorate's technology agree-
7 ment described in section 405A(d)(1);

8 “(E) support and provide research infor-
9 mation that leads to policy formation for State
10 legislatures, State and local boards of education
11 and other policy and governing bodies, to assist
12 such entities in identifying and developing effec-
13 tive policies to promote student achievement
14 and school improvement; and

15 “(F) coordinate the directorate's activities
16 with the activities of the regional educational
17 laboratories established pursuant to subsection
18 (k) in designing the directorate's research agen-
19 da and projects in order to increase the respon-
20 siveness of such directorate to the needs of
21 teachers and the educational field and to bring
22 research findings directly into schools to ensure
23 greatest access at the local level to the latest re-
24 search developments.

1 “(3) RESERVATIONS.—(A) Each directorate
2 shall reserve in each fiscal year not less than 15 per-
3 cent of the amount available to such directorate to
4 conduct field-initiated research.

5 “(B) Each directorate shall reserve not less
6 than one-third of the amount available to such direc-
7 torate to award a grant or enter into a contract or
8 cooperative agreement with an institution of higher
9 education, a public agency or a private nonprofit or-
10 ganization for the support of one or two long-term
11 national research centers for educational research
12 and development in accordance with paragraph (4).

13 “(4) NATIONAL RESEARCH CENTERS.—

14 “(A) DURATION.—The grant, contract, or
15 cooperative agreements awarded or entered into
16 to establish a national research center described
17 in paragraph (3)(B) shall be awarded or en-
18 tered into for a period of 10 years.

19 “(B) LOCATION.—Each such center shall
20 be located at a single site with a majority of the
21 staff located at such site.

22 “(C) STAFF.—The Assistant Secretary
23 shall make available adequate funds for each
24 such center to support a long-term research
25 agenda of sufficient scope and allow a staff of

1 sufficient size and quality to be recruited and
2 hired to support such an agenda.

3 ~~“(5) REVIEW AND MONITORING.—The Board~~
4 shall evaluate and provide recommendations regard-
5 ing the quality of research conducted through each
6 directorate, the relevance of the research topics and
7 the effectiveness of the dissemination of each direc-
8 torate’s activities. The Board shall report such rec-
9 ommendations to the President and the Congress.

10 ~~“(6) PUBLICATION.—The Assistant Secretary~~
11 shall publish proposed research priorities developed
12 by each directorate in the Federal Register every 2
13 years, not later than October 1 of each year, and
14 shall allow a period of 60 days for public comments
15 and suggestions.

16 ~~“(7) COMPETITION.—Prior to awarding a grant~~
17 or entering into a contract for a research project or
18 center, the Assistant Secretary shall invite appli-
19 cants to compete for projects, centers or assistance
20 under this section through notice published in the
21 Federal Register.

22 ~~“(8) REPORTING AND COORDINATION.—Each~~
23 Director shall report directly to the Assistant Sec-
24 retary, regarding the activities of the directorate,

1 and shall work together to promote research syn-
2 theses across the directorates.

3 ~~“(d) NATIONAL DIRECTORATE ON CURRICULUM, IN-~~
4 ~~STRUCTION, AND ASSESSMENT.—~~The Assistant Secretary
5 shall establish and carry out the National Directorate on
6 Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment. The directorate
7 established under this subsection is authorized to conduct
8 research on—

9 ~~“(1) methods to improve student knowledge at~~
10 ~~all levels in English, mathematics, science, history,~~
11 ~~geography, civics and government, foreign lan-~~
12 ~~guages, arts and humanities, and economics;~~

13 ~~“(2) methods to improve the process of reading,~~
14 ~~the craft of writing and the growth of reasoning~~
15 ~~skills;~~

16 ~~“(3) enabling students to develop higher order~~
17 ~~thinking skills;~~

18 ~~“(4) methods to teach effectively all students in~~

5 amended—

6 (1) in paragraph (1)—

7 (A) in the first sentence, by inserting
8 “(hereafter in this subsection referred to as the
9 ‘National Assessment’)” after “Progress”; and

10 (B) in the second sentence, by striking “of
11 Educational Progress”; and

12 (2) by adding at the end the following new
13 paragraphs:

14 “(10) The Secretary of Education and the Sec-
15 retary of Defense may enter into an agreement, in-
16 cluding such terms as are mutually satisfactory, to
17 include in the National Assessment the defense de-
18 pendents education system established under the De-
19 fense Dependents’ Education Act of 1978.

20 “(11) The Secretary of Education and the Sec-
21 retary of the Interior may enter into an agreement,
22 including such terms as are mutually satisfactory, to
23 include in the National Assessment schools for In-
24 dian children operated or supported by the Bureau
25 of Indian Affairs.

1 “(12) For the purpose of this subsection the
 2 term ‘State’ means each of the 50 States, the Dis-
 3 trict of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto
 4 Rico, Guam, American Samoa, the Virgin Islands,
 5 the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Is-
 6 lands, the Republic of Palau, the Federated States
 7 of Micronesia, and the Republic of the Marshall
 8 Islands.”.

9 **SEC. 204. FIELD READERS.**

10 Section 402 of the Department of Education Organi-
 11 zation Act (20 U.S.C. 3462) is amended—

12 (1) by inserting “(a) IN GENERAL.—” before
 13 “The Secretary”; and

14 (2) by adding at the end the following new sub-
 15 section:

16 “(b) SPECIAL RULE.—

17 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding any other
 18 provision of law, the Secretary may use not more
 19 than 1 percent of the funds appropriated for any
 20 education program that awards such funds on a
 21 competitive basis to pay the expenses and fees of

24 “(2) APPLICABILITY.—The provisions of para-

5 **SEC. 205. OFFICE OF EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY.**

6 (a) AMENDMENT TO THE DEPARTMENT OF EDU-
 7 CATION ORGANIZATION ACT.—Title II of the Department
 8 of Education Organization Act (20 U.S.C. 3411 et seq.)
 9 is amended by adding at the end the following new section:

10 “OFFICE OF EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY

11 “SEC. 216. There shall be in the Office of Edu-
 12 cational Research and Improvement described in section
 13 209 an Office of Educational Technology, established in
 14 accordance with section 405A of the General Education
 15 Provisions Act.”.

16 (b) AMENDMENT TO THE GENERAL EDUCATION
 17 PROVISIONS ACT.—Part A of the General Education Pro-
 18 visions Act (20 U.S.C. 1221e et seq.) is amended by in-
 19 serting after section 405 the following new section:

20 **“SEC. 405A. OFFICE OF EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY.**

21 “(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—

22 “(1) OFFICE ESTABLISHED.—The Secretary
 23 shall establish within the Office of Educational Re-
 24 search and Improvement an Office of Educational
 25 Technology within 90 days of the date of enactment

1 of the Office of Educational Research and Improve-
2 ment Reauthorization Act.

3 “(2) DIRECTOR.—The Office of Educational
4 Technology (hereafter in this section referred to as
5 the ‘Office’) shall be headed by a Director, who shall
6 be appointed by the Secretary and shall have dem-
7 onstrated expertise and experience in the application
8 of a broad range of technologies for instruction and
9 educational management, and in planning and policy
10 formulation pertaining to technology application at
11 all levels in the education system. The Director shall
12 be compensated at the rate of pay payable for level
13 IV of the Executive Schedule.

14 “(b) TECHNOLOGY BOARD.—The Assistant Secretary
15 for Educational Research and Improvement shall appoint
16 a Technology Board consisting of 11 members, of which—

17 “(1) six such members shall have demonstrated
18 competencies or expertise in developing technology
19 systems;

20 “(2) five such members shall have past and on-
21 going experience with education at the State or local
22 school level; and

23 “(3) at least three such members shall be edu-
24 cators with experience in using technology in the
25 classroom.

1 “(c) PERSONNEL.—In order to carry out the provi-
2 sions of this section, the Director may appoint personnel
3 in accordance with title 5, United States Code, and may
4 compensate such personnel in accordance with the General
5 Schedule described in section 5332 of title 5, United
6 States Code.

7 “(d) FUNCTIONS OF THE OFFICE.—The Secretary,
8 through the Office, shall—

9 “(1) provide leadership for policy development
10 and coordinate technology related education activi-
11 ties within the Department of Education;

12 “(2) administer the Star Schools Program, the
13 activities of the Office of Training Technology
14 Transfer, and any other technology programs the
15 Assistant Secretary deems appropriate;

16 “(3) consult, cooperate, and coordinate edu-
17 cational technology programs with analogous pro-
18 grams of other Federal agencies and initiate inter-
19 agency agreements for joint funding of such pro-
20 grams;

21 “(4) make recommendations for wider applica-
22 tions of the use of technology in Federal education
23 programs;

24 “(5) develop agreements with each of the direc-
25 torates assisted under section 405 to ensure coordi-

1 nation of technology activities and policies and to
2 guide such directorates in the use of technology in
3 carrying out the duties of such directorates;

4 “(6) provide guidelines to establish a technology
5 education repository to house existing educational
6 technology, including programming designed for the
7 purpose of locating and disseminating information
8 requested by teachers, administrators and other
9 members of the public utilizing Federal data banks
10 in order to avoid duplication;

11 “(7) develop a proposal for a system to transfer
12 to local school districts, schools and classrooms na-
13 tionwide the information described in paragraph (6)
14 via computer systems, visual transmission systems,
15 including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable,
16 microwave, or satellite transmission; the use of video
17 cassettes, video discs, fiber optics, and other systems
18 or devices which produce visual images, and other
19 technological methods;

20 “(8) develop a proposal for—

21 “(A) developing a fair system for metering
22 the use of the repository information described
23 in paragraph (6) provided via an electronic net-
24 work to local classrooms; and

1 “(B) appropriately charging for copy-
2 righted materials and computer access time;
3 and

4 “(9) promote the use of technology to assist the
5 Office of Educational Research and Improvement in
6 carrying out the dissemination activities of the Of-
7 fice of Educational Research and Improvement.

8 “(e) TRANSFER OF THE OFFICE OF TRAINING TECH-
9 NOLOGY TRANSFER.—The Office of Training Technology
10 Transfer as established under section 6103 of the Train-
11 ing Technology Transfer Act of 1988 is transferred to the
12 Office.

13 “(f) STUDY ON IMPLEMENTATION OF A NATIONAL
14 TECHNOLOGY REPOSITORY AND TRANSFER SYSTEM.—

15 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Upon completion of the
16 guidelines for a technology education repository de-
17 scribed in subsection (d)(6) and the development of
18 a system to transfer such information to local school
19 districts, schools and classrooms in accordance with
20 subsection (d)(7), the Secretary shall provide for an
21 independent study to—

22 “(A) determine the estimated costs that
23 would be incurred in the implementation of
24 such repository and system; and

1 “(B) assess the availability of technology
2 at the local school district, school and classroom
3 level to access the educational technology to be
4 transmitted.

5 “(2) SPECIAL RULE.—In carrying out the study
6 described in paragraph (1), studies conducted by
7 other Federal agencies may be utilized, if applicable.

8 “(g) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
9 are authorized to be appropriated \$3,000,000 for the fis-
10 cal year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary for each
11 of the fiscal years 1994 through 1999 for salaries and
12 expenses of the Office.”.

13 **TITLE III—EDUCATIONAL** 14 **IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMS**

15 **PART A—INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAM**

16 **SEC. 311. INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAM.**

17 (a) PROGRAM ESTABLISHED.—The Secretary shall
18 carry out an International Education Program in accord-
19 ance with this section that shall provide for—

20 (1) international achievement comparisons;

21 (2) the study of international education pro-
22 grams and delivery systems; and

23 (3) an international education exchange pro-
24 gram.

1 (b) ASSESSMENT AND INFORMATION.—The Sec-
2 retary shall award grants for the study, evaluation and
3 analysis of education systems in other nations, particularly
4 Great Britain, France, Germany and Japan. Such studies
5 shall focus upon a comparative analysis of curriculum,
6 methodology and organizational structure, including the
7 length of the school year and school day. In addition, the
8 studies shall provide an analysis of successful strategies
9 employed by other nations to improve student achieve-
10 ment, with a specific focus upon application to schooling
11 in our Nation.

12 (c) ACHIEVEMENT COMPARISONS.—The Secretary
13 shall develop or identify a test or series of tests which may
14 be used to compare achievement levels in reading, mathe-
15 matics and science, history and geography, civics and gov-
16 ernment, economics, and foreign languages. In carrying
17 out the provisions of this section, the Secretary shall give
18 priority to applicants who have experience or expertise in
19 calibrating tests for purposes of comparison.

20 (d) INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION EXCHANGE.—

21 (1) IN GENERAL.—(A) The Secretary shall
22 carry out an International Education Exchange Pro-
23 gram that shall—

24 (i) make available to educators from eligi-
25 ble countries exemplary curriculum and teacher

1 training programs in civics and government
2 education and economic education developed in
3 the United States;

4 (ii) assist eligible countries in the adapta-
5 tion and implementation of such programs or
6 joint research concerning such programs;

7 (iii) create and implement educational pro-
8 grams for United States students which draw
9 upon the experiences of emerging constitutional
10 democracies;

11 (iv) provide a means for the exchange of
12 ideas and experiences in civics and government
13 education and economic education among lead-
14 ers of participating eligible countries; and

15 (v) provide support for—

16 (I) research and evaluation to deter-
17 mine the effects of educational programs
18 on students' development of the knowledge,
19 skills and traits of character essential for
20 the preservation and improvement of con-
21 stitutional democracy; and

22 (II) effective participation in and the
23 preservation and improvement of an effi-
24 cient market economy.

1 (B) In carrying out the program described in
2 subparagraph (A), the Secretary shall reserve in
3 each fiscal year—

4 (i) 50 percent of the amount available to
5 carry out this subsection for civics and govern-
6 ment education activities; and

7 (ii) 50 percent of such amount for eco-
8 nomic education activities.

9 (2) CONTRACT AUTHORIZED.—(A) The Sec-
10 retary is authorized to contract with independent
11 nonprofit educational organizations to carry out the
12 provisions of this subsection. The Secretary shall
13 enter into such contract through an open competi-
14 tion.

15 (B) The Secretary shall award at least 1 but
16 not more than 3 contracts described in subpara-
17 graph (A) in each of the areas described in
18 subclauses (I) and (II).

19 (C) The Secretary shall award contracts de-
20 scribed in subparagraph (A) so as to avoid duplica-
21 tion of activities in such contracts.

22 (D) Each organization with which the Secretary
23 enters into a contract pursuant to subparagraph (A)
24 shall—

25 (i) be experienced in—

1 (I) the development and national im-
2 plementation of curricular programs in
3 civics and government education and eco-
4 nomic education for students from grades
5 kindergarten through 12 in local, inter-
6 mediate, and State educational agencies
7 and in private schools throughout the Na-
8 tion with the cooperation and assistance of
9 national professional educational organiza-
10 tions, colleges and universities, and private
11 sector organizations;

12 (II) the development and implementa-
13 tion of cooperative university and school
14 based in-service training programs for
15 teachers of grades kindergarten through
16 12 using scholars from such relevant dis-
17 ciplines as political science, political philos-
18 ophy, history, law, and economics;

19 (III) the development of model cur-
20 ricular frameworks in civics and govern-
21 ment education and economic education;

22 (IV) the administration of inter-
23 national seminars on the goals and objec-
24 tives of civics and government education
25 and economic education in constitutional

1 democracies (including the sharing of cur-
2 ricular materials) for educational leaders,
3 teacher trainers, scholars in related dis-
4 ciplines, and educational policymakers; and

5 (V) the evaluation of civics and gov-
6 ernment education and economic education
7 programs; and

8 (ii) have the authority to subcontract with
9 other organizations to carry out the purposes of
10 this subsection.

11 (3) ACTIVITIES.—The international education
12 program described in this subsection shall—

13 (A) provide eligible countries with—

14 (i) seminars on the basic principles of
15 United States constitutional democracy
16 and economics, including seminars on the
17 major governmental and economic institu-
18 tions and systems in the United States,
19 and visits to such institutions;

20 (ii) visits to school systems, institu-
21 tions of higher learning, and nonprofit or-
22 ganizations conducting exemplary pro-
23 grams in civics and government education
24 and economic education in the United
25 States;

1 (iii) home stays in United States com-
2 munities;

3 (iv) translations and adaptations re-
4 garding United States civics and govern-
5 ment education and economic education
6 curricular programs for students and
7 teachers, and in the case of training pro-
8 grams for teachers translations and adap-
9 tations into forms useful in schools in eligi-
10 ble countries, and joint research projects in
11 such areas;

12 (v) translation of basic documents of
13 United States constitutional government
14 for use in eligible countries, such as The
15 Federalist, selected writings of Presidents
16 Adams and Jefferson and the Anti-Fed-
17 eralists, and more recent works on political
18 theory, constitutional law and economics;
19 and

20 (vi) research and evaluation assistance
21 to determine—

22 (I) the effects of educational pro-
23 grams on students' development of the
24 knowledge, skills and traits of char-
25 acter essential for the preservation

1 and improvement of constitutional de-
2 mocracy; and

3 (II) effective participation in and
4 the preservation and improvement of
5 an efficient market economy;

6 (B) provide United States participants
7 with—

8 (i) seminars on the histories, econom-
9 ics and governments of eligible countries;

10 (ii) visits to school systems, institu-
11 tions of higher learning, and organizations
12 conducting exemplary programs in civics
13 and government education and economic
14 education located in eligible countries;

15 (iii) home stays in eligible countries;

16 (iv) assistance from educators and
17 scholars in eligible countries in the devel-
18 opment of curricular materials on the his-
19 tory, government and economics of such
20 countries that are useful in United States
21 classrooms;

22 (v) opportunities to provide on-site
23 demonstrations of United States curricula
24 and pedagogy for educational leaders in el-
25 ible countries; and

1 (vi) research and evaluation assistance
2 to determine—

3 (I) the effects of educational pro-
4 grams on students' development of the
5 knowledge, skills and traits of char-
6 acter essential for the preservation
7 and improvement of constitutional de-
8 mocracy; and

9 (II) effective participation in and
10 improvement of an efficient market
11 economy; and

12 (C) assist participants from eligible coun-
13 tries and the United States in participating in
14 international conferences on civics and govern-
15 ment education and economic education for
16 educational leaders, teacher trainers, scholars in
17 related disciplines, and educational policy-
18 makers.

19 (4) PRINTED MATERIALS AND PROGRAMS.—All
20 printed materials and programs provided to foreign
21 nations under this subsection shall bear the logo and
22 text used by the Marshall Plan after World War II,
23 that is, clasped hands with the inscription “A gift
24 from the American people to the people of (insert
25 name of country)”.

1 (5) PARTICIPANTS.—The primary participants
2 in the international education program assisted
3 under this subsection shall be leading educators in
4 the areas of civics and government education and
5 economic education, including curriculum and teach-
6 er training specialists, scholars in relevant dis-
7 ciplines, and educational policymakers, from the
8 United States and eligible countries.

9 (6) PERSONNEL AND TECHNICAL EXPERTS.—
10 The Secretary is authorized to provide Department
11 of Education personnel and technical experts to as-
12 sist eligible countries establish and implement a
13 database or other effective methods to improve edu-
14 cational delivery systems, structure and organiza-
15 tion.

16 (7) DEFINITIONS.—For the purpose of this
17 subsection the term “eligible country” means a
18 Central European country, an Eastern European
19 country, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Georgia, the
20 Commonwealth of Independent States, and any
21 country that formerly was a republic of the Soviet
22 Union whose political independence is recognized in
23 the United States.

24 (c) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

1 (1) ASSESSMENT AND INFORMATION.—There
 2 are authorized to be appropriated \$2,500,000 for
 3 fiscal year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary
 4 for each of the fiscal years 1994 through 1999 to
 5 carry out subsection (b).

6 (2) ACHIEVEMENT COMPARISON.—There are
 7 authorized to be appropriated \$2,500,000 for fiscal
 8 year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary for
 9 each of the fiscal years 1994 through 1999 to carry
 10 out subsection (c).

11 (3) INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION EXCHANGE.—
 12 There are authorized to be appropriated
 13 \$30,000,000 for fiscal year 1993 and such sums as
 14 may be necessary for each of the fiscal years 1994
 15 through 1999 to carry out subsection (d).

16 **PART B—TRANSFER OF EDUCATION AND**

18 **SEC. 315. TRANSFER OF EDUCATION AND TRAINING SOFT-**
 19 **WARE.**

20 The Training Technology Transfer Act of 1988 (20
 21 U.S.C. 5091 et seq.) is amended by adding after section
 22 6107 the following new section:

23 **“SEC. 6108. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

24 “There are authorized to be appropriated \$3,000,000
 25 for fiscal year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary

2 out this chapter.”.

3 ~~(B)(i)~~ No member of the Council may serve on
4 the Council if such person directly or indirectly is
5 the recipient of any Federal funds for curriculum or
6 assessment planning, design, development, or imple-
7 mentation.

8 ~~(ii)~~ No member of the Council shall have any
9 financial interest in the development of tests or as-
10 sessments related to the standards described in sub-
11 section (e). Any person who served on the Council
12 shall report any subsequent proposals for Federal,
13 State, or local funding related to the standards or
14 assessments described in subsection (e) to the
15 National Goals Panel and to the Department of
16 Education.

17 ~~(4) DATE OF APPOINTMENT.~~—The initial mem-
18 bers shall be appointed, by the Panel, not later than
19 120 days after the date of enactment of this Act.

20 ~~(5) RETENTION.~~—In order to retain an ap-
21 pointment to the Council, a member must attend at
22 least two-thirds of the scheduled meetings of the
23 Council in any given year.

24 ~~(6) OFFICER SELECTION.~~—The members ap-
25 pointed under subsection (b)(2) shall select officers

1 of the Council from among the members of the
2 Council. The officers of the Council shall serve for
3 1-year terms.

4 (7) VACANCIES.—A vacancy on the Council
5 shall not affect the powers of the Council, but shall

9 shall be allowed travel expenses, including per diem
10 in lieu of subsistence, as authorized by section 5703

15 (9) INITIATION.—The Council may begin to
16 carry out the duties of the Council under this part
17 when—

22 (c) FUNCTIONS OF THE COUNCIL.—The Council
23 shall—

1 (1) be a coordinating body to establish national

4 (2) serve as a coordinating body to encourage
5 a voluntary system of assessments for individual stu-
6 dents consistent with the national standards;

7 (3) develop criteria for world-class content and
8 student performance standards and establish guide-
9 lines for standard setting and assessment develop-
10 ment, including guidelines for the development of a
11 variety of assessment measures;

12 (4) establish guidelines for assessments which
13 ensure technical merit through determining that as-
14 sessments are specifically valid, reliable, and unbi-
15 ased for any purpose for which the assessments may
16 be used;

17 (5) establish procedures and criteria for ensur-
18 ing that, to the extent possible and without sacrific-
19 ing the validity, reliability, directness, and fairness
20 of the assessments, assessments are comparable to
21 each other;

22 (6) issue certification of content and student
23 performance standards as world-class and transmit
24 such certification to the Panel for the Panel's certifi-
25 cation;

1 ~~(7)~~ issue criteria for assessments as world-class,
2 and procedures for certification of assessments
3 which meet such world-class content standards, and
4 transmit such criteria and procedures for certifi-
5 cation to the Panel for the Panel's certification, ex-
6 cept that no assessment may be certified prior to
7 certification of the appropriate content and student
8 performance standards; and

9 ~~(8)~~ establish guidelines for the use and design
10 of standards and assessments, and of data derived
11 from such assessments, so that—

12 ~~(A)~~ all students are provided with a rigor-
13 ous and challenging curriculum designed to
14 meet or exceed the standards;

15 ~~(B)~~ no student is placed in a curriculum
16 track or is otherwise labeled on the basis of
17 such student's performance on an assessment
18 certified pursuant to this section;

19 ~~(C)~~ student performance is reported in the
20 context of other relevant information about ag-
21 gregate student, school and system perform-
22 ance; and

23 ~~(D)~~ all students are provided multiple op-
24 portunities and methods to demonstrate that
25 they have met student performance standards.

1 (f) PERFORMANCE OF FUNCTIONS.—In carrying out
2 its responsibilities, the Council shall work with Federal
3 and non-Federal agencies and organizations which are
4 conducting research, studies or demonstration projects to
5 determine world-class education standards and assess-
6 ments based on such standards.

7 (g) PROCEDURES.—

8 (1) PUBLICATION.—The Council shall publish
9 in the Federal Register—

10 (A) proposed criteria for determining what
11 are world-class content and student perform-
12 ance standards;

13 (B) proposed guidelines for standards set-
14 ting;

15 (C) proposed procedures and criteria for
16 certifying content standards as world-class; and

17 (D) proposed procedures and criteria for
18 certifying assessments of world-class standards,
19 including an evaluation of the extent to which
20 individual student assessments incorporate such
21 final world-class standards.

22 (2) FINAL REGULATIONS.—Final regulations,
23 reflecting public comment, for the proposals devel-
24 oped in accordance with paragraph (1) shall be pub-

1 lished in the Federal Register prior to the implemen-
2 tation of such regulations.

3 ~~(h) DATA COLLECTION.~~—The Council shall make ar-
4 rangements with any appropriate entity to generate or col-
5 lect such data as may be necessary to carry out the Coun-

7 **SEC. 332. ANNUAL REPORTS.**

8 ~~(a) IN GENERAL.~~—Not later than 1 year after the
9 date the Council concludes its first meeting of members
10 and in each succeeding year, the Council shall prepare and
11 submit to the President, the appropriate committees of
12 Congress, and the Governor of each State a report on its
13 work. Such report shall—

14 (1) analyze the progress and obstacles, if any,
15 toward the development and certification of world-
16 class content and student performance standards;

17 (2) analyze the process and implementation of
18 procedures to develop criteria for assessments and
19 certifications that assessments reflect the world-class
20 standards; and

21 (3) analyze the progress and obstacles, if any,
22 to the adoption of certified content and student per-
23 formance standards by State and local educational
24 agencies.

1 (b) ~~SPECIAL RULE.~~—In carrying out paragraph (3)
2 of subsection (a), the Council shall collect information on
3 the implementation by State and local educational agen-
4 cies of certified content standards, including—

5 (1) adoption of curricula frameworks, including
6 instructional materials, assessments and teacher
7 training that incorporates or reflects world-class con-
8 tent standards;

9 (2) availability of school resources, including in-
10 structional materials and technology, necessary to
11 meet world-class standards;

12 (3) staff capacity;

13 (4) school governance systems; and

14 (5) barriers to implementation of world-class
15 standards.

16 **SEC. 333. POWERS OF THE COUNCIL.**

17 (a) ~~REGIONAL MEETINGS.~~—The Council shall con-
18 vene regional meetings, in urban and rural areas, to obtain
19 public involvement in the development of proposed regula-
20 tions implementing this part. Such meetings shall include
21 individuals and representatives of the groups involved in
22 the development of content and student performance
23 standards and assessments, including educators, adminis-
24 trators, students and parents, curriculum and assessment
25 experts, and organizations which have demonstrated expe-

1 rience in these areas. Such meetings shall provide for a
2 comprehensive discussion and exchange on information re-
3 garding the implementation of this part. The Council shall
4 take into account the information received in such meet-
5 ings in the development of regulations.

6 (b) INFORMATION.—The Council may secure directly
7 from any department or agency of the United States infor-
8 mation necessary to enable the Council to carry out this
9 part. Upon request of the Chairperson of the Council, the
10 head of a department or agency shall furnish such infor-
11 mation to the Council to the extent permitted by law.

12 (c) GIFTS.—The Council may accept, use, and dis-
13 pose of gifts or donations of services or property.

14 (d) POSTAL SERVICES.—The Council may use the
15 United States mail in the same manner and under the
16 same conditions as other departments and agencies of the
17 United States.

18 (e) ADMINISTRATIVE AND SUPPORTIVE SERVICES.—
19 The Secretary shall provide to the Council, on a reimburs-
20 able basis, administrative support services as the Council
21 may request.

22 **SEC. 334. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.**

23 (a) MEETINGS.—The Council shall meet on a regular
24 basis, as necessary, at the call of the Chairperson of the
25 Council or a majority of its members.

1 title 5, United States Code, governing appointments to the
2 competitive service. The staff of the Council may be paid
3 without regard to the provisions of chapter 51 and sub-

14 fied to assist the Council in administering the functions
15 described in section 331(e).

16 (d) STAFF OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—Upon the re-
17 quest of the Council, the head of any department or agen-
18 cy of the United States is authorized to detail, on a reim-
19 bursable basis, any of the personnel of that department
20 or agency to the Council to assist the Council in its duties
21 under this part.

22 (e) CONFLICT OF INTEREST.—No director, staff, ex-
23 pert, or consultant may serve the Council if such person
24 directly or indirectly has any financial interest in the de-
25 velopment of tests or assessments related to the standards

1 described in section 331(e). Any person who served the
2 Council in such capacity shall submit any subsequent pro-
3 posals for Federal, State, or local funding related to the
4 standards or assessments described in section 331(e) to
5 the National Goals Panel and to the Department of
6 Education.

7 **SEC. 336. EVALUATION.**

8 The Comptroller General of the General Accounting
9 Office shall conduct an evaluation of the work of the Coun-
10 cil, in order to evaluate the process by which world-class
11 content and student performance standards have been de-
12 veloped, the contents of such standards, the process by
13 which criteria for assessments of world-class standards
14 have been developed, and the process of determining
15 whether the assessments measure world-class standards.
16 Such evaluation shall include—

17 (1) an analysis of the technical expertise and
18 objectivity of the Council and the staff of the Coun-
19 cil; and

20 (2) an evaluation of whether—

21 (A) the standards developed by the Council
22 reflect world-class standards; and

23 (B) the assessments certified under the
24 procedures of the Council measure the world-
25 class standards.

1 **SEC. 337. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

2 There are authorized to be appropriated to the Coun-
3 cil \$2,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 1993 and 1994,
4 and such sums as may be necessary for each succeeding
5 fiscal year thereafter, to carry out this part.

6 **PART F—ELEMENTARY SCIENCE EQUIPMENT**
7 **PROGRAM**

8 **SEC. 341. SHORT TITLE.**

9 This part may be cited as the “Elementary Science
10 Equipment Act”.

11 **SEC. 342. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE.**

12 It is the purpose of this part to raise the quality of
13 instruction in mathematics and science in the Nation’s ele-
14 mentary schools by providing equipment and materials
15 necessary for hands-on instruction through assistance to
16 State and local educational agencies.

17 **SEC. 343. PROGRAM AUTHORIZED.**

18 The Secretary is authorized to make allotments to
19 State educational agencies under section 344 to enable
20 such agencies to award grants to local educational agen-
21 cies for the purpose of providing equipment and materials
22 to elementary schools to improve mathematics and science
23 education in such schools.

1 **SEC. 344. ALLOTMENTS OF FUNDS.**

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—From the amount appropriated
3 under section 350 for any fiscal year, the Secretary shall
4 reserve—

5 (1) not more than one-half of 1 percent for al-
6 lotment among Guam, American Samoa, the Virgin
7 Islands, the Northern Mariana Islands, the Republic
8 of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Mi-
9 cronesia, and the Republic of Palau according to
10 their respective needs for assistance under this part;
11 and

12 (2) one-half of 1 percent for programs for In-
13 dian students served by schools funded by the Sec-
14 retary of the Interior which are consistent with the
15 purposes of this part.

16 (b) ALLOTMENT.—The remainder of the amount so
17 appropriated (after meeting requirements in subsection
18 (a)) shall be allotted among State educational agencies so
19 that—

20 (1) one-half of such remainder shall be distrib-
21 uted among the State educational agencies by allot-
22 ting to each State educational agency an amount
23 which bears the same ratio to such one-half of such
24 remainder as the number of children aged 5 to 17,
25 inclusive, in the State bears to the number of such
26 children in all States; and

1 (2) one-half of such remainder shall be distrib-
2 uted among the State educational agencies according
3 to each State's share of allocations under chapter 1
4 of title I of the Elementary and Secondary Edu-
5 cation Act of 1965,

6 except that no State shall receive less than one-half of 1
7 percent of the amount available under this subsection in
8 any fiscal year or less than the amount allotted to such
9 State for fiscal year 1988 under title II of the Education
10 for Economic Security Act.

11 (c) DEFINITION.—For the purposes of this part the
12 term “State” means each of the 50 States, the District
13 of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

14 (d) DATA.—The number of children aged 5 to 17,
15 inclusive, in the State and in all States shall be determined
16 by the Secretary on the basis of the most recent satisfac-
17 tory data available to the Secretary.

18 **SEC. 345. STATE APPLICATION.**

19 (a) APPLICATION.—Each State educational agency
20 desiring to receive an allotment under this part shall file
21 an application with the Secretary which covers a period
22 of 5 fiscal years. Such application shall be filed at such
23 time, in such manner, and containing or accompanied by
24 such information as the Secretary may reasonably require.

1 (b) CONTENTS OF APPLICATION.—Each application
2 described in subsection (a) shall—

3 (1) provide assurances that—

4 (A) the State educational agency shall use
5 the allotment provided under this part to award
6 grants to local educational agencies within the
7 State to enable such local educational agencies
8 to provide assistance to schools served by such
9 agency to carry out the purpose of this part;

10 (B) the State educational agency will pro-
11 vide such fiscal control and funds accounting as
12 the Secretary may require;

13 (C) every public elementary school in the
14 State is eligible to receive assistance under this
15 part once over the 5-year duration of the pro-
16 gram assisted under this part;

17 (D) funds provided under this part will
18 supplement, not supplant, State and local funds
19 made available for activities authorized under
20 this part;

21 (E) during the 5-year period described in
22 the application, the State educational agency
23 will evaluate its standards and programs for
24 teacher preparation and inservice professional

1 development for elementary mathematics and
2 science;

3 (F) the State educational agency will take
4 into account the needs for greater access to and
5 participation in mathematics and science by
6 students and teachers from historically
7 underrepresented groups, including females, mi-
8 norities, individuals with limited English pro-
9 ficiency, the economically disadvantaged, and
10 individuals with disabilities; and

11 (G) that the needs of teachers and stu-
12 dents in areas with high concentrations of low-
13 income students and sparsely populated areas
14 will be given priority in awarding assistance
15 under this part;

16 (2) provide, if appropriate, a description of how
17 funds paid under this part will be coordinated with
18 State and local funds and other Federal resources,
19 particularly with respect to programs for the profes-
20 sional development and inservice training of elemen-
21 tary school teachers in science and mathematics; and

22 (3) describe procedures—

23 (A) for submitting applications for pro-
24 grams described in sections 346 and 347 for

1 distribution of assistance under this part within
2 the State; and

3 ~~(B) for approval of applications by the~~
4 ~~State educational agency, including appropriate~~
5 ~~procedures to assure that such agency will not~~
6 ~~disapprove an application without notice and~~
7 ~~opportunity for a hearing.~~

8 ~~(c) STATE ADMINISTRATION.—Not more than 5 per-~~
9 ~~cent of the funds allotted to each State educational agency~~
10 ~~under this part shall be used for the administrative costs~~
11 ~~of such agency associated with carrying out the program~~
12 ~~assisted under this part.~~

13 **SEC. 346. LOCAL APPLICATION.**

14 ~~(a) APPLICATION.—A local educational agency that~~
15 ~~desires to receive a grant under this part shall submit an~~
16 ~~application to the State educational agency. Each such ap-~~
17 ~~plication shall contain assurances that each school served~~
18 ~~by the local educational agency shall be eligible for assist-~~
19 ~~ance under this part only once.~~

20 ~~(b) CONTENTS OF APPLICATION.—Each application~~
21 ~~described in subsection (a) shall—~~

22 ~~(1) describe how the local educational agency~~
23 ~~plans to set priorities on the use and distribution~~
24 ~~among schools of grant funds received under this~~
25 ~~part to meet the purpose of this part;~~

1 (2) include assurances that the local edu-
2 cational agency has made every effort to match on
3 a dollar-for-dollar basis from private or public
4 sources the funds received under this part, except
5 that no such application shall be penalized or denied
6 assistance under this part based on failure to pro-
7 vide such matching funds;

8 (3) describe, if applicable, how funds under this
9 part will be coordinated with State, local, and other
10 Federal resources, especially with respect to pro-
11 grams for the professional development and inservice
12 training of elementary school teachers in science and
13 mathematics; and

14 (4) describe the process which will be used to
15 determine different levels of assistance to be award-
16 ed to schools with different needs.

17 (c) PRIORITY.—In awarding grants under this part,
18 the State educational agency shall give priority to applica-
19 tions that—

20 (1) assign highest priority to providing assist-
21 ance to schools which—

22 (A) are most seriously underequipped; or

23 (B) serve large concentrations or large
24 numbers of economically disadvantaged stu-
25 dents;

1 (2) are attentive to the needs of
2 underrepresented groups in science and mathe-
3 matics;

4 (3) demonstrate how science and mathematics
5 equipment will be part of a comprehensive plan of
6 curriculum planning or implementation and teacher
7 training supporting hands-on laboratory activities;
8 and

9 (4) include plans for dissemination of lessons
10 and activities using equipment and materials pur-
11 chased pursuant to assistance provided under this
12 part to teachers in schools not receiving such assist-
13 ance.

14 **SEC. 347. PARTICIPATION OF PRIVATE SCHOOLS.**

15 (a) PARTICIPATION OF PRIVATE SCHOOLS.—To the
16 extent consistent with the number of children in the State
17 or in the school district of each local educational agency
18 who are enrolled in private nonprofit elementary schools,
19 such State educational agency shall, after consultation
20 with appropriate private school representatives, make pro-
21 vision for including services and arrangements for the ben-
22 efit of such children as will assure the equitable participa-
23 tion of such children in the purposes and benefits of this
24 part.

1 (b) ~~WAIVER.~~—If by reason of any provision of State
2 law a local educational agency is prohibited from providing
3 for the participation of children or teachers from private
4 nonprofit schools as required by subsection (a), or if the
5 Secretary determines that a State or local educational
6 agency has substantially failed or is unwilling to provide
7 for such participation on an equitable basis, the Secretary
8 shall waive such requirements and shall arrange for the
9 provision of services to such children or teachers subject
10 to the requirement of this section. Such waivers shall be
11 subject to consultation, withholding, notice, and judicial
12 review requirements described in section 1017 of the Ele-
13 mentary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

14 **SEC. 348. PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS.**

15 (a) ~~COORDINATION.~~—Each State educational agency
16 receiving an allotment under this part shall—

17 (1) disseminate information to school districts
18 and schools, including private nonprofit elementary
19 schools, regarding the program assisted under this
20 part;

21 (2) evaluate applications of local educational
22 agencies;

23 (3) award grants to local educational agencies
24 based on the priorities described in section 346(c);
25 and

1 (4) evaluate local educational agencies' end-of-
2 year summaries and submit such evaluation to the
3 Secretary.

4 (b) LIMITATIONS ON USE OF FUNDS.—

5 (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para-
6 graph (2), grant funds and matching funds under
7 this part only shall be used to purchase science
8 equipment, science materials, or mathematical ma-
9 nipulative materials and shall not be used for com-
10 puters, computer peripherals, software, textbooks, or
11 staff development costs.

12 (2) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS.—Grant funds
13 under this part may not be used for capital improve-
14 ments. Not more than 50 percent of any matching
15 funds provided by the local educational agency may
16 be used for capital improvements of classroom
17 science facilities to support the hands-on instruction
18 that this part is intended to support, such as the in-
19 stallation of electrical outlets, plumbing, lab tables
20 or counters, or ventilation mechanisms.

21 **SEC. 349. FEDERAL ADMINISTRATION.**

22 (a) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND EVALUATION PRO-
23 CEDURES.—The Secretary shall provide technical assist-
24 ance and, in consultation with State and local representa-
25 tives of the program assisted under this part, shall develop

1 procedures for State and local evaluations of the programs
2 under this part.

3 (b) REPORT.—The Secretary shall report to the Con-
4 gress each year on the program assisted under this part.

5 **SEC. 350. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

6 There are authorized to be appropriated \$20,000,000
7 for fiscal year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary
8 for each of the fiscal years 1994 through 1997 to carry
9 out this part.

10 **PART G—PARENTS AS TEACHERS PROGRAMS**

11 **SEC. 351. FINDINGS.**

12 The Congress finds—

13 (1) increased parental involvement in the edu-
14 cation of their children appears to be the key to
15 long-term gains for youngsters;

16 (2) providing seed money is an appropriate role
17 for the Federal Government to play in education;

18 (3) children participating in the parents as
19 teachers pilot program in Missouri are found to have
20 increased cognitive or intellectual skills, language
21 ability, social skills and other predictors of school
22 success;

23 (4) most early childhood programs begin at age
24 3 or 4 when remediation may already be necessary;
25 and

1 (5) many children receive no health screening
2 between birth and the time they enter school, thus
3 such children miss the opportunity of having devel-
4 opmental delays detected early.

5 **SEC. 352. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE.**

6 It is the purpose of this part to encourage States to
7 develop and expand parent and early childhood education
8 programs in an effort to—

9 (1) increase parents' knowledge of and con-
10 fidence in child-rearing activities, such as teaching
11 and nurturing their young children;

12 (2) strengthen partnerships between parents
13 and schools; and

14 (3) enhance the developmental progress of par-
15 ticipating children.

16 **SEC. 353. DEFINITIONS.**

17 For the purposes of this part—

18 (1) the term “developmental screening” means
19 the process of measuring the progress of children to
20 determine if there are problems or potential prob-
21 lems or advanced abilities in the areas of under-
22 standing and use of language, perception through
23 sight, perception through hearing, motor develop-
24 ment and hand-eye coordination, health, and phys-
25 ical development;

1 (2) the term “eligible family” means any parent
2 with one or more children between birth and 3 years
3 of age;

4 (3) the term “lead agency” means the office,
5 agency, or other entity in a State designated by the
6 Governor to administer the parents as teachers pro-
7 gram authorized by this part or the entity in a State
8 operating a Parents As Teachers Program on the
9 date of enactment of this Act;

10 (4) the term “parent education” includes par-
11 ent support activities, the provision of resource ma-
12 terials on child development and parent-child learn-
13 ing activities, private and group educational guid-
14 ance, individual and group learning experiences for
15 the parent and child, and other activities that enable
16 the parent to improve learning in the home; and

17 (5) the term “parent educator” means a person
18 hired by the lead agency of a State or designated by
19 local entities who administers group meetings, home
20 visits and developmental screening for eligible fami-
21 lies, and is trained by the Parents As Teachers Na-
22 tional Center established under section 357.

23 **SEC. 354. PROGRAM ESTABLISHED.**

24 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary is authorized to
25 make grants to States to pay the Federal share of the

1 cost of establishing, expanding, or operating parents as
2 teachers programs.

3 (b) PRIORITY.—In making grants to States, the Sec-
4 retary shall establish a priority for applications describing
5 parents as teachers programs that target parents and chil-
6 dren at risk, including families on public assistance.

7 (c) SPECIAL RULE.—Grant funds awarded under this
8 section shall be used so as to supplement, and to the ex-
9 tent practicable, increase the level of funds that would,
10 in the absence of such Federal funds made available under
11 this section, be made available from non-Federal sources,
12 and in no case may such funds be used so as to supplant
13 funds from non-Federal sources.

14 **SEC. 355. PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS.**

15 (a) REQUIREMENTS.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Each State receiving a grant
17 pursuant to section 354 shall conduct a parents as
18 teachers program which—

19 (A) establishes and operates parent edu-
20 cation programs including programs of devel-
21 opmental screening of children; and

22 (B) designates a lead State agency which
23 shall—

1 (i) hire parent educators who have
2 had supervised experience in the care and
3 education of children;

4 (ii) establish the number of group
5 meetings and home visits required to be
6 provided each year for each participating
7 family, with a minimum of 2 group meet-
8 ings and 10 home visits for each partici-
9 pating family;

10 (iii) be responsible for administering
11 the periodic screening of participating chil-
12 dren's educational, hearing and visual de-
13 velopment, using the Denver Developmen-
14 tal Test, Zimmerman Preschool Language
15 Scale, or other approved screening instru-
16 ments; and

17 (iv) develop recruitment and retention
18 programs for hard-to-reach populations.

19 (2) LIMITATION.—Grant funds awarded under
20 this part shall only be used for parents as teachers
21 programs which serve families during the period of
22 time beginning with birth and ending when a child
23 attains the age of 3.

24 **SEC. 356. SPECIAL RULES.**

25 Notwithstanding any other provision of this section—

1 (1) no person, including home school parents,
2 public school parents, or private school parents, shall
3 be required to participate in any program of parent
4 education or developmental screening pursuant to
5 the provisions of this part;

6 (2) no parents as teachers program assisted
7 under this part shall take any action that infringes
8 in any manner on the right of parents to direct the
9 education of their children; and

10 (3) the provisions of section 438(c) of the Gen-
11 eral Education Provisions Act shall apply to eligible
12 entities awarded grants under this part.

13 **SEC. 357. PARENTS AS TEACHERS NATIONAL CENTER.**

14 The Secretary shall establish a Parents As Teachers
15 National Center to disseminate information to, and pro-
16 vide technical and training assistance to, States establish-
17 ing and operating parents as teachers programs.

18 **SEC. 358. EVALUATIONS.**

19 The Secretary shall complete an evaluation of the
20 State parents as teachers programs assisted under this
21 part within 4 years from the date of enactment of this
22 Act, including an assessment of such programs' impact on
23 at-risk children.

1 **SEC. 359. APPLICATION.**

2 Each State desiring a grant pursuant to the provi-
3 sions of this part shall submit an application to the Sec-
4 retary at such time, in such manner and accompanied by
5 such information as the Secretary may reasonably require.
6 Each such application shall describe the activities and
7 services for which assistance is sought.

8 **SEC. 360. PAYMENTS AND FEDERAL SHARE.**

9 (a) **PAYMENTS.**—The Secretary shall pay to each
10 State having an application approved under section 359
11 the Federal share of the cost of the activities described
12 in the application.

13 (b) **FEDERAL SHARE.**—

14 (1) **IN GENERAL.**—The Federal share—

15 (A) for the first year for which a State re-
16 ceives assistance under this part shall be 100
17 percent;

18 (B) for the second such year shall be 100
19 percent;

20 (C) for the third such year shall be 75 per-
21 cent;

22 (D) for the fourth such year shall be 50
23 percent; and

24 (E) for the fifth such year shall be 25 per-
25 cent.

1 (2) ~~NON-FEDERAL SHARE.~~—The non-Federal
2 share of payments under this part may be in cash
3 or in kind fairly evaluated, including planned equip-
4 ment or services.

5 **SEC. 360A. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

6 There are authorized to be appropriated \$10,000,000
7 for fiscal year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary
8 for each of the fiscal years 1994 through 1997 to carry
9 out this part.

10 **PART H—MEDIA INSTRUCTION**

11 **SEC. 361. MEDIA INSTRUCTION.**

12 (a) ~~GRANTS AUTHORIZED.~~—The Assistant Secretary
13 shall enter into a contract with an independent nonprofit
14 organization described in subsection (b) for the establish-
15 ment of a national multimedia television-based project di-
16 rected to homes, schools and after-school programs that
17 is designed to motivate and improve the reading com-
18 prehension and writing coherence of elementary school-age
19 children.

20 (b) ~~DEMONSTRATED EFFECTIVENESS.~~—The Assist-
21 ant Secretary shall award the contract described in sub-
22 section (a) to an independent nonprofit organization that
23 has demonstrated effectiveness in educational program-
24 ming and development on a nationwide basis.

1 (c) AUTHORIZATION AND APPROPRIATIONS.—There
 2 are authorized to be appropriated \$5,000,000 for fiscal
 3 year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary for fiscal
 4 year 1994 and fiscal year 1995 to carry out this section.

5 **PART I—MIGRANT EDUCATION**

6 **SEC. 365. MIGRANT EDUCATION.**

7 The first sentence of subsection (c) of section 1202
 8 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965
 9 (20 U.S.C. 2782(c)) is amended by inserting “; except
 10 that notwithstanding any other provision of law, the defi-
 11 nition of ‘currently migratory child’ shall be modified to
 12 include a child who resides in a school district of more
 13 than 15,000 square miles and who migrates at least 20
 14 miles to a temporary residence to enable the child, the
 15 child’s parent, or a member of the child’s immediate fam-
 16 ily to engage in fishing activity’”.

17 **PART J—HISTORY AND PRINCIPLES OF THE**
 18 **CONSTITUTION**

19 **SEC. 371. PROGRAM AUTHORIZED.**

20 (a) GENERAL AUTHORITY.—

21 (1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary shall
 22 carry out a program to educate students about the
 23 history and principles of the Constitution of the
 24 United States, including the Bill of Rights, and to
 25 foster civic competence and civic responsibility.

1 (2) EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES.—The program
2 required by paragraph (1) shall continue and expand
3 the educational activities of the Chief Justice War-
4 ren E. Burger National Historical Map Contest
5 sponsored by the Commission on the Bicentennial of
6 the United States Constitution.

7 (3) CONTRACT.—The Secretary is authorized,
8 through an open competition process, to contract
9 with an independent nonprofit educational organiza-
10 tion to carry out the program described in this sec-
11 tion. Such organization shall have demonstrated ex-
12 perience and effectiveness in educating students
13 about the history and principles of the Constitution
14 of the United States.

15 (b) PROGRAM CONTENT.—The program authorized
16 by this section shall provide—

17 (1) curricular materials required for students at
18 upper elementary, middle, and secondary school lev-
19 els to participate in the contest described in para-
20 graph (2) of subsection (a); and

21 (2) for the conduct of the contest described in
22 paragraph (2) of subsection (a) at upper elementary,
23 middle, and secondary school levels at the congres-
24 sional district, State, and national levels for schools
25 wishing to participate in such program.

1 (c) PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS.—The program author-
2 ized by this section shall be made available to public and
3 private elementary, middle, and secondary schools in the
4 435 congressional districts, the Commonwealth of Puerto
5 Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the
6 District of Columbia.

7 (d) REPORT.—The Secretary shall report on a bien-
8 nial basis, to the appropriate committees of the Congress
9 on the distribution and use of funds authorized pursuant
10 to the authority of subsection (c).

11 (e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
12 are authorized to be appropriated \$2,000,000 for the fis-
13 cal year 1993 and such sums as may be necessary for each
14 of the fiscal years 1994 through 1997 and to carry out
15 this section.

16 **PART K—CLASSROOMS FOR THE FUTURE**

17 **SEC. 375. SHORT TITLE.**

18 This part may be cited as the “Classrooms for the
19 Future Act of 1992”.

20 **SEC. 376. PURPOSE.**

21 It is the purpose of this part to establish a program
22 to develop and expand the use of high quality curriculum-
23 based learning resources using state-of-the-art tech-
24 nologies and techniques which are or can be designed to
25 increase the achievement levels of students in subject

1 areas including mathematics, science, geography, history
2 and English.

3 **SEC. 377. ACHIEVEMENT GRANTS.**

4 (a) **COMPETITIVE GRANTS.**—

5 (1) **IN GENERAL.**—The Secretary shall award
6 grants, on a competitive basis, to eligible consortia
7 to enable such eligible consortia to develop instruc-
8 tional programs and technology-based systems for
9 complete courses or units of study for a specific sub-
10 ject and grade level, if such programs and systems
11 are commercially unavailable in the local area served
12 by such eligible consortia.

13 (2) **ELIGIBLE CONSORTIUM.**—For the purpose
14 of this section the term “eligible consortium” means
15 a consortium consisting of—

16 (A) State or local educational agencies in
17 partnership with businesses; and

18 (B) institutions of higher education or
19 other public or private nonprofit organizations.

20 (b) **PRIORITY.**—In awarding grants under this sec-
21 tion, the Secretary shall give priority to applications de-
22 scribing programs that are developed—

23 (1) so that the program may be adapted and
24 applied nationally; and

1 (2) to raise the achievement levels of students,
2 particularly disadvantaged students who are not re-
3 alizing their potential.

4 (c) DURATION AND AMOUNT.—Each grant made
5 under this section shall be awarded for a period not to
6 exceed 3 years and in an amount not to exceed
7 \$3,000,000.

8 (d) APPLICATION.—

9 (1) IN GENERAL.—Each consortium desiring a
10 grant under this section shall submit an application
11 to the Secretary at such time, in such manner, and
12 accompanied by such information as the Secretary
13 may prescribe.

14 (2) CONTENTS.—Each application submitted
15 pursuant to paragraph (1) shall include—

16 (A) a description of how the program shall
17 improve the achievement levels of students; and

18 (B) an assurance that the program shall
19 effectively serve a large number or percentage
20 of economically disadvantaged students.

21 (e) CRITERIA FOR AWARDING GRANTS.—In awarding
22 grants under this section to develop programs, the Sec-
23 retary shall consider the appropriateness and quality of
24 the following elements of the programs:

1 (1) Identification of specific learning objectives
2 and strategies of the proposed course or unit of
3 study.

4 (2) Incorporation in creative ways of a variety
5 of technology-based learning resources such as com-
6 puter software, databases, films, transparencies,
7 video and audio discs, telecommunications (including
8 educational radio and television), and print mate-
9 rials.

10 (3) Design that allows tailoring of the program
11 to meet individual needs of students, particularly
12 students at greatest risk of not reaching their edu-
13 cational potential.

14 (4) Flexibility of use by teachers or local
15 schools.

16 (5) Methods for updating or revising informa-
17 tion and material.

18 (6) Programs or materials to train and guide
19 teachers.

20 (7) Coordination with teacher training pro-
21 grams.

22 (8) Explanatory materials for students and par-
23 ents.

24 (9) Field testing and evaluation in terms of
25 stated learning objectives.

1 (10) Plans for pricing technology-based mate-
2 rials that are affordable for public schools and
3 agencies.

4 (11) Plans for distribution that ensure access
5 for the poorest schools and school districts.

6 (12) Demonstration of cost-effectiveness in rela-
7 tion to existing programs and to achieving stated
8 learning objectives.

9 **SEC. 378. AUTHORIZATION OF FUNDS.**

10 There are authorized to be appropriated \$25,000,000
11 for the fiscal year 1993 and such sums as may be nec-
12 essary for each of the fiscal years 1994 through 1997 to
13 carry out this part.

14 **PART L—BUDDY SYSTEM COMPUTER EDUCATION**

15 **SEC. 381. SHORT TITLE.**

16 This part may be cited as the “Buddy System Com-
17 puter Education Act”.

18 **SEC. 382. PURPOSE.**

19 It is the purpose of this part to award demonstration
20 grants to develop and expand public-private partnership
21 programs which extend the learning experience, via com-
22 puters, beyond the classroom environment in order to—

23 (1) enhance learning by providing students with
24 the technological tools and guidance necessary to de-

1 develop skills critical to educational growth and suc-
2 cess in the workplace, including—

3 (A) mastery of fundamental computer
4 technology and applications;

5 (B) improved written and visual commu-
6 nication skills;

7 (C) improved critical thinking and problem
8 solving abilities; and

9 (D) improved ability to work in a collabo-
10 rative, teamwork-driven environment;

11 (2) encourage parental involvement in education
12 and total family use and understanding of computers
13 and telecommunications through at-home applica-
14 tions; and

15 (3) establish foundations for life-long learning
16 through improvement in education skills and student
17 motivation and attitudes.

18 **SEC. 383. GRANT AUTHORIZATION.**

19 (a) GRANT PROGRAM.—

20 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall conduct
21 a program of awarding a grant to each of 3 States
22 to enable such States to create a computer-based
23 education project for children in grades 4 through 6
24 in accordance with the requirements of section 384.

1 (2) ~~AWARD BASIS.~~—The Secretary shall award
2 grants under this part on a competitive basis.

3 (3) ~~PREFERENCE.~~—In awarding grants under
4 this part, the Secretary shall give preference to ap-
5 plications—

6 (A) from States that have a demonstrated
7 ability or commitment to computer-based tech-
8 nology education; and

9 (B) describing projects that serve school
10 districts which serve a large number or percent-
11 age of economically disadvantaged students.

12 (b) ~~SITE SELECTION AND PROJECT IMPLEMENTA-~~
13 ~~TION.~~—Site selection and implementation of the com-
14 puter-based education projects assisted under this part
15 shall take place not later than 9 months after funds are
16 appropriated to carry out this part pursuant to the au-
17 thority of section 389.

18 **SEC. 384. PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS.**

19 Each State receiving a grant to conduct a computer-
20 based education project under this part shall—

21 (1) provide a continuous 3-year computer-based
22 education project to 2 consecutive groups of 4th,
23 5th, and 6th grade elementary school students dur-
24 ing the period commencing with each such group's

1 entry into 4th grade and ending the summer follow-
2 ing each such group's completion of 6th grade;

3 (2) ensure that each student in each of the
4 classes participating in the project shall participate
5 in the project;

6 (3) conduct such project in not more than 7
7 public elementary schools within the State; and

8 (4) ensure that each student participating in
9 the project shall have access to a computer—

10 (A) at school during the school year; and

11 (B) at home during the school year and
12 summer.

13 **SEC. 385. APPLICATIONS.**

14 (a) APPLICATION REQUIRED.—In order to receive a
15 grant under this part, the chief State school officer of a
16 State shall submit an application to the Secretary in such
17 form and containing such information as the Secretary
18 may reasonably require. Such application shall include an
19 assurance from the State educational agency that the
20 State educational agency has made every effort to match
21 on a dollar-for-dollar basis from private or public sources
22 the funds received under this part, except that no such
23 application shall be penalized or denied assistance under
24 this part on the basis of the failure to provide such match-
25 ing funds.

1 (b) APPLICATION PERIOD.—States shall be eligible to
2 submit applications for assistance under this part during
3 a 3-month period determined by the Secretary.

4 **SEC. 386. USE OF FUNDS.**

5 Grant funds under this part shall be used to provide
6 hardware and software components to all sites, and train-
7 ing for classroom teachers as well as parents, administra-
8 tors and technical personnel.

9 **SEC. 387. EVALUATION.**

10 The Secretary shall evaluate the demonstration pro-
11 gram assisted under this part and shall report to the Con-
12 gress regarding the overall effectiveness of such program.

13 **SEC. 388. DEFINITIONS.**

14 For the purpose of this part, the term “State” means
15 each of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, the Com-
16 monwealth of Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Is-
17 lands, Guam, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the
18 Northern Mariana Islands, the Republic of the Marshall
19 Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, and the
20 Republic of Palau.

21 **SEC. 389. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

22 There are authorized to be appropriated \$5,000,000
23 for fiscal year 1993, and such sums as may be necessary
24 for each of the fiscal years 1994 through 1997 to carry
25 out this part.

1 **PART M—COMPENSATION**

2 **SEC. 391. COMPENSATION.**

3 (a) POSITIONS AT LEVEL IV.—Section 5315 of title
4 5, United States Code, is amended by striking “Assistant
5 Secretaries of Education (6)” and inserting in lieu thereof
6 “Assistant Secretaries of Education (10)”.

7 (b) POSITIONS AT LEVEL V.—Section 5316 of title
8 5, United States Code, is amended by striking “Additional
9 Officers, Department of Education (4)”.

10 (c) APPLICABILITY.—This section shall take effect on
11 the first day of the first pay period that begins on or after
12 the date of enactment of this Act.

15 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Office shall be ad-
16 ministered by the Assistant Secretary and shall
17 include—

18 (i) the Advisory Board of Educational
19 Research described in subparagraph (B);

20 (ii) the directorates for educational re-
21 search described in subsections (c) through
22 (h);

23 (iii) the regional educational labora-
24 tories described in subsection (k);

1 (iv) the Office of Dissemination and
2 Reform Assistance described in subsection
3 (m);

4 (v) the National Education Library
5 described in subsection (o);

6 (vi) the Education Resources Informa-
7 tion Clearinghouses described in subsection
8 (p);

9 (vii) the National Center for Edu-
10 cation Statistics, including the National As-
11 sessment of Educational Progress; and

12 (viii) such other entities as the Assist-
13 ant Secretary deems appropriate to carry
14 out the purposes of the Office.

15 (B) ADVISORY BOARD OF EDUCATIONAL RE-
16 SEARCH.—

17 (i) ADVISORY BOARD OF EDUCATIONAL
18 RESEARCH.—The Advisory Board of Edu-
19 cational Research shall consist of 9 members
20 to be appointed by the Secretary. The As-
21 sistant Secretary shall serve as an *ex officio*
22 member.

23 (ii) QUALIFICATIONS.—

24 (I) IN GENERAL.—The persons
25 appointed as members of the Advisory

1 *Board shall be appointed solely on the*
2 *basis of—*

3 *(aa) eminence in the fields of*
4 *basic or applied research, or dis-*
5 *semination of such research; or*

6 *(bb) established records of*
7 *distinguished service in edu-*
8 *cational research and the edu-*
9 *cation professions, including prac-*
10 *titioners.*

11 *(II) CONSIDERATION.—In making*
12 *appointments under this clause, the*
13 *Secretary shall give due consideration*
14 *to the equitable representation of edu-*
15 *cational researchers who—*

16 *(aa) are women;*

17 *(bb) represent minority*
18 *groups; or*

19 *(cc) are classroom teachers*
20 *with research experience.*

21 *(III) RECOMMENDATIONS.—In*
22 *making appointments under this*
23 *clause, the Secretary shall give due*
24 *consideration to any recommendations*
25 *for an appointment which may be sub-*

1 *mitted to the Secretary by a variety of*

3 *research and development, including*

6 *(IV) A member of the Advisory*

3 (II) *CHAIRPERSON.*—*The members of*
4 *the Advisory Board shall select a Chair-*
5 *person from among such members.*

6 (III) *QUORUM.*—*A majority of the ap-*
7 *pointed members of the Advisory Board*
8 *shall constitute a quorum.*

9 (IV) *STAFF.*—*From amounts appro-*
10 *priated pursuant to the authority of sub-*
11 *section (q)(1)(A), the Advisory Board, in*
12 *consultation with the Assistant Secretary,*
13 *shall recommend for appointment such staff*
14 *as may be necessary. Such staff shall be ap-*
15 *pointed by the Assistant Secretary and as-*
16 *signed at the direction of the Advisory*
17 *Board.*

18 (iv) *RESPONSIBILITIES.*—*The Advisory*
19 *Board shall provide oversight of the Office,*
20 *and shall—*

21 (I) *advise the Nation on the Fed-*
22 *eral research and development effort;*

23 (II) *recommend ways for strength-*
24 *ening active partnerships among re-*

1 *searchers, educational practitioners, li-*
2 *brarians, and policymakers;*

3 *(III) recommend ways to strength-*
4 *en interaction and collaboration be-*
5 *tween the various program offices and*
6 *components;*

7 *(IV) solicit advice and informa-*
8 *tion from the educational field, to de-*
9 *fine research needs and suggestions for*
10 *research topics, and shall involve edu-*
11 *cational practitioners, particularly*
12 *teachers, in this process;*

13 *(V) solicit advice from practition-*
14 *ers, policymakers, and researchers, and*
15 *recommend missions for the national*
16 *research centers assisted under this sec-*
17 *tion by identifying topics which re-*
18 *quire long-term, sustained, systematic,*
19 *programmatic, and integrated research*
20 *and dissemination efforts;*

21 *(VI) provide recommendations for*
22 *translating research findings into*
23 *workable, adaptable models for use in*
24 *policy and in practice across different*

1 *settings, and recommendations for*
2 *other forms of dissemination;*

3 *(VII) provide recommendations*
4 *for creating incentives to draw talented*
5 *young people into the field of edu-*
6 *cational research, including scholars*
7 *from disadvantaged and minority*
8 *groups;*

9 *(VIII) provide recommendations*
10 *for new studies to close gaps in the re-*
11 *search base;*

12 *(IX) evaluate and provide rec-*
13 *ommendations to the President and the*
14 *Congress regarding the quality of re-*
15 *search conducted through each direc-*
16 *torate and regional educational labora-*
17 *tory, the relevance of the research top-*
18 *ics, and the effectiveness of the dissemi-*
19 *nation of each directorate's and labora-*
20 *tory's activities;*

21 *(X) advise the Assistant Secretary*
22 *on standards and guidelines for re-*
23 *search programs and activities to en-*
24 *sure that research is of high quality*

1 *and free from partisan political influ-*
2 *ence; and*

3 *(XI) provide recommendations to*
4 *promote coordination and synthesis of*
5 *research among directorates.*

6 *(v) COMMITTEES AND REPORTS.—*

7 *(I) IN GENERAL.—The Advisory*
8 *Board is authorized to appoint from*
9 *among its members such committees as*
10 *the Advisory Board deems necessary,*
11 *and to assign to committees so ap-*
12 *pointed such survey and advisory func-*
13 *tions as the Advisory Board deems ap-*
14 *propriate to assist the Advisory Board*
15 *in exercising its powers and functions*
16 *under this section.*

17 *(II) From amounts appropriated*
18 *pursuant to subsection (q)(1), the Ad-*
19 *visory Board shall transmit to the*
20 *President, for submission to the Con-*
21 *gress not later than January 15 of*
22 *each even-numbered year, a report on*
23 *the activities of the Office, and on edu-*
24 *cation, educational research, national*

1 *indicators, and data-gathering in gen-*
2 *eral.*

3 (3) *DEFINITIONS.—For the purposes of this sec-*
4 *tion—*

5 (A) *the term “Advisory Board” means the*
6 *Advisory Board of Educational Research estab-*
7 *lished under paragraph (2)(B);*

8 (B) *the term “Assistant Secretary” means*
9 *the Assistant Secretary for Educational Research*
10 *and Improvement established by section 202 of*
11 *the Department of Education Organization Act;*

12 (C) *the term “development” means trans-*
13 *formation or adaptation of research results into*
14 *usable forms, in order to contribute to the im-*
15 *provement of educational practice;*

16 (D) *the term “dissemination” means the*
17 *communication and transfer of the results of re-*
18 *search and proven practice in forms that are un-*
19 *derstandable, easily accessible and usable or*
20 *adaptable for use in the improvement of edu-*
21 *cational practice by teachers, administrators, li-*
22 *brarians, other practitioners, researchers, policy-*
23 *makers, and the public;*

24 (E) *the term “education research” includes*
25 *basic and applied research, inquiry with the*

1 *purpose of applying tested knowledge gained to*
2 *specific educational settings and problems, devel-*
3 *opment, planning, surveys, assessments, evalua-*
4 *tions, investigations, experiments, and dem-*
5 *onstrations in the field of education and other*
6 *fields relating to education;*

7 *(F) the term “field-initiated research”*
8 *means education research in which topics and*
9 *methods of study are generated by investigators,*
10 *including teachers and other practitioners, not*
11 *by the source of funding;*

12 *(G) the term “Indian reservation” means a*
13 *reservation, as such term is defined in—*

14 *(i) section 3(d) of the Indian Financ-*
15 *ing Act of 1974 (25 U.S.C. 1452(d)); or*

16 *(ii) section 4(10) of the Indian Child*
17 *Welfare Act of 1978 (25 U.S.C. 1903(10));*

18 *(H) the term “Office”, unless otherwise*
19 *specified, means the Office of Educational Re-*
20 *search and Improvement established by section*
21 *209 of the Department of Education Organiza-*
22 *tion Act; and*

23 *(I) the term “technical assistance” means*
24 *assistance in identifying, selecting, or designing*
25 *solutions based on research to address edu-*

1 *cational problems, planning and design that*
2 *leads to adapting research knowledge to school*
3 *practice, training to implement such solutions,*
4 *and other assistance necessary to encourage*
5 *adoption or application of research.*

6 **(b) AUTHORIZED ACTIVITIES.—**

7 **(1) OFFICE.—***In fulfilling its purposes under*
8 *this section, the Office is authorized to—*

9 **(A)** *conduct and support education-related*
10 *research activities, including basic and applied*
11 *research, development, planning, surveys, assess-*
12 *ments, evaluations, investigations, experiments,*
13 *and demonstrations of national significance;*

14 **(B)** *disseminate the findings of education*
15 *research, and provide technical assistance to*
16 *apply such information to specific school prob-*
17 *lems at the school site;*

18 **(C)** *collect, analyze, and disseminate data*
19 *related to education, and to library and infor-*
20 *mation services;*

21 **(D)** *promote the use of knowledge gained*
22 *from research and statistical findings in schools,*
23 *other educational institutions, and communities;*

24 **(E)** *provide training in education research;*
25 *and*

1 (F) *promote the coordination of education*
2 *research and research support within the Federal*
3 *Government, and otherwise assist and foster such*
4 *research.*

5 (2) *OPEN COMPETITION.*—*All grants, contracts,*
6 *and cooperative agreements awarded or entered into*
7 *pursuant to this Act shall be awarded or entered into*
8 *through a process of open competition and peer re-*
9 *view that shall be announced in the Federal Register*
10 *or other publication that the Secretary determines ap-*
11 *propriate.*

12 (3) *ASSISTANT SECRETARY.*—

13 (A) *IN GENERAL.*—*In carrying out the ac-*
14 *tivities and programs of the Office, the Assistant*
15 *Secretary shall—*

16 (i) *ensure that there is broad and regu-*
17 *lar public and professional involvement*
18 *from the educational field in the planning*
19 *and carrying out of the Office's activities,*
20 *including establishing teacher advisory*
21 *boards for any program office, program or*
22 *project of the Office as the Assistant Sec-*
23 *retary deems necessary, and involving In-*
24 *dian and Alaska Native researchers and*
25 *educators in activities that relate to the*

1 *education of Indian and Alaska Native peo-*
2 *ple;*

3 (ii) *ensure that the selection of research*
4 *topics and the administration of the pro-*
5 *gram are free from partisan political influ-*
6 *ence;*

7 (iii) *develop directly, or through grant*
8 *or contract, standards and guidelines for re-*
9 *search, programs and activities carried out*
10 *through the Office;*

11 (iv) *establish a long- and short-term*
12 *research agenda in consultation with the*
13 *Advisory Board; and*

14 (v) *review research priorities estab-*
15 *lished within each directorate and promote*
16 *research syntheses across the directorates.*

17 (B) *INFORMATION AND TECHNICAL ASSIST-*
18 *ANCE.—The Assistant Secretary is authorized to*
19 *offer information and technical assistance to*
20 *State and local educational agencies, school*
21 *boards, and schools, including schools funded by*
22 *the Bureau of Indian Affairs, to ensure that no*
23 *student is—*

1 (i) denied access to the same rigorous,
2 challenging curriculum that such student's
3 peers are offered; or

4 (ii) grouped or otherwise labeled in
5 such a way that may impede such student's
6 achievement.

7 (C) *LONG-TERM AGENDA.*—One year after
8 the date of enactment of this Act, the Assistant
9 Secretary shall submit a report to the President
10 and to the Congress on a 6-year long-term plan
11 for the educational research agenda for the Of-
12 fice. Upon submission of such report and every
13 2 years thereafter, the Assistant Secretary shall
14 submit to the President and to the Congress a
15 progress report on the 6-year plan, including an
16 assessment of the success or failure of meeting the
17 components of the 6-year plan, proposed modi-
18 fications or changes to the 6-year plan, and ad-
19 ditions to the 6-year plan.

20 (4) *SECRETARY.*—The Secretary shall enter into
21 contracts for the conduct of independent evaluations
22 of the programs and activities carried out through the
23 Office in accordance with this Act, and transmit such
24 evaluations to the Congress, the President and the As-
25 sistant Secretary, in order to—

1 (A) evaluate—

2 (i) the effectiveness of the programs
3 and activities of the Office; and

4 (ii) the implementation of projects and
5 programs funded through the Office over
6 time;

7 (iii) the impact of educational research
8 on instruction at the school level; and

9 (iv) the ability of the Office to keep re-
10 search funding free from partisan political
11 interference;

12 (B) measure the success of educational in-
13 formation dissemination;

14 (C) assess the usefulness of research and ac-
15 tivities carried out by the Office, including prod-
16 ucts disseminated by the Office; and

17 (D) provide recommendations for improve-
18 ment of the programs of the Office.

19 (c) DIRECTORATES OF EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH.—

20 (1) REQUIREMENTS.—

21 (A) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out the
22 functions of the Office, the Assistant Secretary
23 shall establish 5 directorates of educational re-
24 search in accordance with this section.

1 (B) *DIRECTOR.*—*The Assistant Secretary*
2 *shall appoint a Director for each directorate.*
3 *Each such Director shall be a leading profes-*
4 *sional in the field relevant to the mission of the*
5 *directorate.*

6 (C) *RESEARCH SYNTHESSES.*—*The Assistant*
7 *Secretary shall provide for and promote research*
8 *syntheses across the directorates in early child-*
9 *hood, elementary, secondary, vocational, and*
10 *higher education, and shall coordinate research*
11 *plans, projects, and findings across the direc-*
12 *torates, placing a priority on synthesis and co-*
13 *ordination between the directorates described in*
14 *subsections (d) and (e). Each Director shall re-*
15 *port directly to the Assistant Secretary, regard-*
16 *ing the activities of the directorate, and shall*
17 *work together to promote research syntheses*
18 *across the directorates.*

19 (2) *DUTIES.*—*Each such directorate shall—*

20 (A) *carry out its activities directly or*
21 *through grants, contracts, and cooperative agree-*
22 *ments with institutions of higher education, pub-*
23 *lic and private organizations, institutions, agen-*
24 *cies or individuals, or a consortia thereof;*

1 (B) conduct and support the highest quality
2 basic and applied research in early childhood, el-
3 elementary and secondary, vocational and higher
4 education which is relevant to the directorate;

5 (C) serve as a national database on model
6 and demonstration programs which have par-
7 ticular application to the activities of the direc-
8 torate, particularly with respect to model pro-
9 grams conducted by businesses, private, and non-
10 profit organizations and foundations;

11 (D) support, plan, implement, and operate
12 dissemination activities designed to bring the
13 most effective research directly into classroom
14 practice, school organization and management,
15 teacher preparation and training, and libraries,
16 and to the extent possible, carry out dissemina-
17 tion activities through the use of technology;

18 (E) support and provide research informa-
19 tion that leads to policy formation for State leg-
20 islatures, State and local boards of education,
21 schools funded by the Bureau of Indian Affairs,
22 and other policy and governing bodies, to assist
23 such entities in identifying and developing effec-
24 tive policies to promote student achievement and
25 school improvement; and

1 (F) coordinate the directorate's activities
2 with the activities of the regional educational
3 laboratories established pursuant to subsection
4 (k) and with other educational service organiza-
5 tions in designing the directorate's research
6 agenda and projects in order to increase the re-
7 sponsiveness of such directorate to the needs of
8 teachers and the educational field and to bring
9 research findings directly into schools to ensure
10 the greatest access at the local level to the latest
11 research developments.

12 (3) RESERVATIONS.—

13 (A) FIELD-INITIATED RESEARCH.—Each di-
14 rectorate shall reserve in each fiscal year not less
15 than one-third of the amount available to such
16 directorate to conduct field-initiated research.

17 (B) NATIONAL RESEARCH CENTERS.—Each
18 directorate shall reserve in each fiscal year not
19 less than one-third of the amount available to
20 such directorate to award grants or enter into
21 contracts with institutions of higher education,
22 public agencies, or private nonprofit organiza-
23 tions, for the support of long-term national re-
24 search centers of sufficient size, scope, and qual-
25 ity for educational research and development in

1 *accordance with paragraph (4), except that no*
2 *such center shall receive such a grant or contract*
3 *for less than \$1,100,000 for such fiscal year.*
4 *Each such center shall engage in research, devel-*
5 *opment and dissemination involving topics rel-*
6 *evant to the mission of the directorate supporting*
7 *such center.*

8 (C) *SPECIAL RULE.*—*No research and devel-*
9 *opment center supported by the Office and oper-*
10 *ating on the day preceding the date of enactment*
11 *of this Act shall by reason of receipt of such sup-*
12 *port be ineligible to receive any other assistance*
13 *from the Office authorized by law.*

14 (4) *NATIONAL RESEARCH CENTERS.*—

15 (A) *DURATION.*—*The grants or contracts*
16 *awarded or entered into to support national re-*
17 *search centers described in paragraph (3)(B)*
18 *shall be awarded or entered into for a period of*
19 *at least 5 years, and may be renewed for addi-*
20 *tional periods of 5 years after periodic review by*
21 *the Assistant Secretary.*

22 (B) *REVIEW.*—*All applications to establish*
23 *a national research center shall be reviewed by*
24 *independent experts in accordance with stand-*
25 *ards and guidelines developed by the Office pur-*

1 suant to subsections (a)(2)(B)(iv)(X) and
2 (b)(3)(A)(iii). Such standards and guidelines
3 shall include—

4 (i) whether applicants have assembled
5 a group of high quality researchers suffi-
6 cient to achieve the mission of the center;

7 (ii) whether the proposed organiza-
8 tional structure and arrangements will fa-
9 cilitate achievement of the mission of the
10 center;

11 (iii) whether there is a substantial staff
12 commitment to the work of the center;

13 (iv) whether the directors and support
14 staff are full-time employees, to the extent
15 practicable;

16 (v) review of the contributions of the
17 applicant's primary researchers for the pur-
18 pose of evaluating the appropriateness of
19 such primary researchers' experiences and
20 expertise in the context of the proposed cen-
21 ter activities, and the adequacy of such pri-
22 mary researchers' time commitments to
23 achievement of the mission of the center;
24 and

1 (vi) *the manner in which the results of*
2 *education research will be disseminated for*
3 *further use.*

4 (5) *PUBLICATION.—The Assistant Secretary shall*
5 *publish proposed research priorities developed by each*
6 *director in the Federal Register every 2 years, not*
7 *later than October 1 of each year, and shall allow a*
8 *period of 60 days for public comments and sugges-*
9 *tions.*

10 (d) *NATIONAL DIRECTORATE ON CURRICULUM, IN-*
11 *STRUCTION, AND ASSESSMENT.—The Assistant Secretary*
12 *shall establish and operate the National Directorate on Cur-*
13 *riculum, Instruction, and Assessment. The directorate es-*
14 *tablished under this subsection is authorized to conduct re-*
15 *search on—*

16 (1) *methods to improve student learning;*

17 (2) *methods to improve the process of reading,*
18 *the craft of writing, the growth of reasoning skills,*
19 *and the development of information-finding skills;*

20 (3) *enabling students to develop higher order*
21 *thinking skills;*

22 (4) *methods to teach effectively all students in*
23 *mixed-ability classrooms;*

24 (5) *developing, identifying, or evaluating new*
25 *educational assessments, including performance-based*

1 *and portfolio assessments which demonstrate skill and*
2 *a command of knowledge;*

3 *(6) standards for what students should know and*
4 *be able to do, particularly standards of desired per-*
5 *formance set at internationally competitive levels;*

6 *(7) the use of testing in the classroom and its*
7 *impact on improving student achievement, including*
8 *an analysis of how testing affects what is taught;*

9 *(8) test bias as such bias affects historically un-*
10 *derserved girls, women, and minority populations;*

11 *(9) test security, accountability, validity, reli-*
12 *ability and objectivity;*

13 *(10) relevant teacher training and instruction in*
14 *giving a test, scoring a test and in the use of test re-*
15 *sults to improve student achievement;*

16 *(11) curriculum development designed to meet*
17 *challenging standards, including State efforts to de-*
18 *velop such curriculum;*

19 *(12) the need for, and methods of delivering,*
20 *teacher education, development, and inservice train-*
21 *ing;*

22 *(13) curriculum, instruction, and assessment in*
23 *vocational education and school-to-work transition;*

24 *(14) the use of technology in learning, teaching,*
25 *and testing;*

1 (15) *methods of involving parents in their chil-*
2 *dren's education and ways to involve business, indus-*
3 *try, and other community partners in promoting ex-*
4 *cellence in schools; and*

5 (16) *other topics relevant to the mission of the*
6 *directorate.*

7 (e) *NATIONAL DIRECTORATE ON THE EDUCATIONAL*
8 *ACHIEVEMENT OF HISTORICALLY UNDERSERVED POPU-*
9 *LATIONS.—The Assistant Secretary shall establish and op-*
10 *erate a National Directorate on the Educational Achieve-*
11 *ment of Historically Underserved Populations, the activi-*
12 *ties of which shall be closely coordinated with those of the*
13 *directorate described in subsection (d). The directorate es-*
14 *tablished under this subsection is authorized to conduct re-*
15 *search on—*

16 (1) *the quality of educational opportunities*
17 *afforded historically underserved populations, includ-*
18 *ing minority students, students with disabilities, eco-*
19 *nomically disadvantaged students, girls, women, lim-*
20 *ited-English proficient students, and Indian and*
21 *Alaska Native students, particularly the quality of*
22 *educational opportunities afforded such populations*
23 *in highly concentrated urban areas and sparsely pop-*
24 *ulated rural areas;*

1 (2) *effective institutional practices for expanding*
2 *opportunities for such groups;*

3 (3) *methods for overcoming the barriers to learn-*
4 *ing that may impede student achievement;*

5 (4) *innovative teacher training and professional*
6 *development methods to help the historically under-*
7 *served meet challenging standards;*

8 (5) *the use of technology to improve the edu-*
9 *cational opportunities and achievement of the histori-*
10 *cally underserved;*

11 (6) *the means by which parents, community re-*
12 *sources and institutions (including cultural institu-*
13 *tions) can be utilized to support and improve the*
14 *achievement of at-risk students;*

15 (7) *methods to improve the quality of the edu-*
16 *cation of American Indian and Alaska Native stu-*
17 *dents not only in schools funded by the Bureau of In-*
18 *dian Affairs, but also in public elementary and sec-*
19 *ondary schools located on or near Indian reservations,*
20 *including—*

21 (A) *research on mechanisms to facilitate the*
22 *establishment of tribal departments of education*
23 *that assume responsibility for all education pro-*
24 *grams of State educational agencies operating on*
25 *an Indian reservation and all education pro-*

1 *grams funded by the Bureau of Indian Affairs*
2 *on an Indian reservation;*

3 *(B) research on the development of cul-*
4 *turally appropriate curriculum for American In-*
5 *Indian and Alaska Native students, including*
6 *American Indian and Alaska Native culture,*
7 *language, geography, history and social studies,*
8 *and graduation requirements related to such cur-*
9 *riculum;*

10 *(C) research on methods for recruiting,*
11 *training and retraining qualified teachers from*
12 *American Indian and Alaska Native commu-*
13 *nities, including research to promote flexibility*
14 *in the criteria for certification of such teachers;*

15 *(D) research on techniques for improving*
16 *the educational achievement of American Indian*
17 *and Alaska Native students, including meth-*
18 *odologies to reduce dropout rates and increase*
19 *graduation by such students; and*

20 *(E) research concerning the performance by*
21 *American Indian and Alaska Native students of*
22 *limited-English proficiency on standardized*
23 *achievement tests, and related factors; and*

24 *(8) other topics relevant to the mission of the di-*
25 *rectorate.*

1 (f) NATIONAL DIRECTORATE ON EARLY CHILDHOOD
2 DEVELOPMENT AND EDUCATION.—The Assistant Secretary
3 shall establish and operate the National Directorate on
4 Early Childhood Development and Education. The direc-
5 torate established under this subsection is authorized to con-
6 duct research on—

7 (1) effective teaching and learning methods, and
8 curriculum;

9 (2) instruction that considers the cultural experi-
10 ences of children;

11 (3) access to current materials in libraries;

12 (4) family literacy and parental involvement in
13 student learning;

14 (5) the impact that outside influences have on
15 learning, including television, and drug and alcohol
16 abuse;

17 (6) methods for integrating learning in settings
18 other than the classroom, particularly within families
19 and communities;

20 (7) teacher training;

21 (8) readiness to learn, including topics such as
22 prenatal care, nutrition, and health services;

23 (9) the use of technology, including methods to
24 help parents instruct their children; and

1 (10) other topics relevant to the mission of the
2 directorate.

3 (g) NATIONAL DIRECTORATE ON ELEMENTARY AND
4 SECONDARY EDUCATIONAL GOVERNANCE, FINANCE, POL-
5 ICYMAKING, AND MANAGEMENT.—The Assistant Secretary
6 shall establish and operate a National Directorate on Ele-
7 mentary and Secondary Educational Governance, Finance,
8 Policymaking, and Management. The directorate estab-
9 lished under this subsection is authorized to conduct re-
10 search on—

11 (1) school-based management, shared decision-
12 making and other innovative school structures, and
13 State and local reforms and educational policies,
14 which show promise for improving student achieve-
15 ment;

16 (2) innovative school design, including lengthen-
17 ing the school day and the school year, reducing class
18 size and building professional development into the
19 weekly school schedule and, as appropriate, conduct-
20 ing such further research as may be recommended or
21 suggested by the report issued by the National Edu-
22 cation Commission on Time and Learning pursuant
23 to section 443 of the General Education Provisions
24 Act;

1 (3) *the social organization of schooling and the*
2 *inner-workings of schooling;*

3 (4) *policy decisions at all levels and the impact*
4 *of such decisions on school achievement and other stu-*
5 *dent outcomes;*

6 (5) *effective approaches to organizing learning;*

7 (6) *effective ways of grouping students for learn-*
8 *ing so that a student is not labeled or stigmatized in*
9 *ways that may impede such student's achievement;*

10 (7) *the amount of dollars allocated for education*
11 *that are actually spent on classroom instruction;*

12 (8) *the organization, structure, and finance of*
13 *vocational education;*

14 (9) *disparity in school financing among States,*
15 *school districts, and schools funded by the Bureau of*
16 *Indian Affairs;*

17 (10) *the use of technology in areas such as assist-*
18 *ing in school-based management or ameliorating the*
19 *effects of disparity in school financing among States,*
20 *school districts, and schools funded by the Bureau of*
21 *Indian Affairs;*

22 (11) *approaches to systemic reforms involving*
23 *the coordination of multiple policies at the local,*
24 *State, and Federal levels of government to promote*
25 *higher levels of student achievement;*

1 (12) *the special adult education needs of histori-*
2 *cally underserved and minority populations;*

3 (13) *the involvement of parents and families in*
4 *the management and governance of schools and the*
5 *education of their children; and*

6 (14) *other topics relevant to the mission of the*
7 *directorate.*

8 (h) *NATIONAL DIRECTORATE ON ADULT EDUCATION,*
9 *LITERACY AND LIFELONG LEARNING.—The Assistant Sec-*
10 *retary shall establish and operate a National Directorate*
11 *on Adult Education, Literacy and Lifelong Learning. The*
12 *directorate established under this subsection is authorized*
13 *to conduct research on—*

14 (1) *the most effective training methods for adults*
15 *to upgrade education and vocational skills;*

16 (2) *opportunities for adults to continue their*
17 *education beyond higher education and graduate*
18 *school, in the context of lifelong learning and infor-*
19 *mation-finding skills;*

20 (3) *adult literacy and effective methods, includ-*
21 *ing technology, to eliminate illiteracy;*

22 (4) *preparing students for a lifetime of work, the*
23 *ability to adapt through retraining to the changing*
24 *needs of the work force and the ability to learn new*
25 *tasks;*

1 (5) *the use of technology to develop and deliver*
2 *effective training methods for adults to upgrade their*
3 *education and their vocational skills; and*

4 (6) *other topics relevant to the mission of the di-*
5 *rectorate.*

6 (i) *PERSONNEL.*—

7 (1) *IN GENERAL.*—*The Assistant Secretary may*
8 *appoint, for terms not to exceed 3 years (without re-*
9 *gard to the provisions of title 5 of the United States*
10 *Code governing appointment in the competitive serv-*
11 *ice) and may compensate (without regard to the pro-*
12 *visions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53*
13 *of such title relating to classification and General*
14 *Schedule pay rates) such scientific or professional em-*
15 *ployees of the Office as the Assistant Secretary consid-*
16 *ers necessary to accomplish the functions of the Office.*
17 *Such employees shall not exceed one-fifth of the num-*
18 *ber of full-time, regular scientific or professional em-*
19 *ployees of the Office. The rate of basic pay for such*
20 *employees may not exceed the maximum annual rate*
21 *of pay for grade GS-15 under section 5332 of title 5*
22 *of the United States Code.*

23 (2) *REAPPOINTMENT.*—*The Assistant Secretary*
24 *may reappoint employees described in paragraph (1)*
25 *upon presentation of a clear and convincing justifica-*

1 *tion of need, for 1 additional term not to exceed 3*
2 *years. All such employees shall work on activities of*
3 *the Office and shall not be reassigned to other duties*
4 *outside the Office during their term.*

5 *(j) SELECTION PROCEDURES AND FELLOWSHIPS.—*

6 *(1) SELECTION PROCEDURES.—When making*
7 *competitive awards under this section, the Assistant*
8 *Secretary shall—*

9 *(A) solicit recommendations and advice re-*
10 *garding research priorities, opportunities, and*
11 *strategies from qualified experts, such as edu-*
12 *cation professionals and policymakers, librar-*
13 *ians, personnel of the regional educational lab-*
14 *oratories described in subsection (k) and of the*
15 *research and development centers assisted under*
16 *this section, and the Advisory Board, as well as*
17 *parents and other members of the general public;*

18 *(B) employ suitable selection procedures*
19 *using the procedures and principles of peer re-*
20 *view providing an appropriate balance between*
21 *expertise in research and practice for all propos-*
22 *als so that technical research merit is judged by*
23 *research experts and programmatic relevance is*
24 *judged by program experts, except where such*
25 *peer review procedures are clearly inappropriate*

1 *given such factors as the relatively small amount*
2 *of a grant or contract or the exigencies of the sit-*
3 *uation; and*

4 (C) *determine that the activities assisted*
5 *will be conducted efficiently, will be of high qual-*
6 *ity, and will meet priority research and develop-*
7 *ment needs under this section.*

8 (2) *FELLOWSHIPS.—*

9 (A) *PUBLICATION.—The Assistant Secretary*
10 *shall publish proposed research priorities for the*
11 *awarding of research fellowships under this*
12 *paragraph in the Federal Register every 2 years,*
13 *not later than October 1 of each year, and shall*
14 *allow a period of 60 days for public comments*
15 *and suggestions.*

16 (B) *COMPETITION.—Prior to awarding a*
17 *fellowship under this paragraph, the Assistant*
18 *Secretary shall invite applicants to compete for*
19 *such fellowships through notice published in the*
20 *Federal Register.*

21 (C) *AUTHORITY.—From amounts appro-*
22 *priated pursuant to the authority of subsection*
23 *(q)(1), the Assistant Secretary may establish and*
24 *maintain research fellowships in the Office, for*
25 *scholars, researchers, policymakers, education*

1 *practitioners, librarians, and statisticians en-*
2 *gaged in the use, collection, and dissemination of*
3 *information about education and educational re-*
4 *search. Subject to regulations published by the*
5 *Assistant Secretary, fellowships may include*
6 *such stipends and allowances, including travel*
7 *and subsistence expenses provided under title 5,*
8 *United States Code, as the Assistant Secretary*
9 *considers appropriate.*

10 (k) *REGIONAL EDUCATIONAL LABORATORIES FOR RE-*
11 *SEARCH, DISSEMINATION, AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—*

12 (1) *AUTHORITY.—*

13 (A) *IN GENERAL.—Subject to subparagraph*
14 *(B), the Assistant Secretary shall support at*
15 *least 10 but not more than 20 regional edu-*
16 *cational laboratories established by public agen-*
17 *cies or private nonprofit organizations.*

18 (B) *SPECIAL RULE.—In any fiscal year in*
19 *which the amount appropriated pursuant to the*
20 *authority of subsection (q)(2) exceeds*
21 *\$38,000,000, the Assistant Secretary may use the*
22 *amount in excess of \$38,000,000 to support a re-*
23 *gional educational laboratory serving a region*
24 *not in existence on the day preceding the date of*

1 enactment of this Act, if such amount is equal to
2 or exceeds \$2,000,000.

3 (C) *PRIORITY.*—The Assistant Secretary
4 shall give priority to supporting a regional edu-
5 cational laboratory that involves the combination
6 or subdivision of a region or regions, such that
7 States within a region in existence on the day
8 preceding the date of enactment of this Act may
9 be combined with States in another such region
10 to form a new region so long as such combina-
11 tion does not result in any region in existence on
12 such date permanently becoming part of a larger
13 region, nor of any such region permanently
14 subsuming another region.

15 (2) *DEFINITION.*—For purposes of this sub-
16 section, the term “regional educational laboratory”
17 means a public agency or institution or a private
18 nonprofit organization that—

19 (A) serves the education improvement needs
20 in a geographic region of the United States; and

21 (B) advances the National Education Goals.

22 (3) *DUTIES.*—Each regional educational labora-
23 tory shall—

24 (A) have as its central mission and pri-
25 mary function—

1 (i) to develop and disseminate edu-
2 cational research products and processes to
3 schools, teachers, local educational agencies,
4 State educational agencies, librarians, and
5 schools funded by the Bureau of Indian Af-
6 fairs; and

7 (ii) through such development and dis-
8 semination and the provision of technical
9 assistance, to help all students learn to chal-
10 lenging standards;

11 (B) provide technical assistance to State
12 and local educational agencies, school boards,
13 schools funded by the Bureau of Indian Affairs,
14 State boards of education, schools, and librarians
15 in accordance with the prioritization described
16 in paragraph (4)(B)(vi) and needs related to
17 standard-driven education reform;

18 (C) facilitate school restructuring at the in-
19 dividual school level, including technical assist-
20 ance for adapting model demonstration grant
21 programs to each school;

22 (D) serve the educational development needs
23 of the region by providing education research in
24 usable forms in order to promote school improve-

1 *ment and academic achievement and to correct*
2 *educational deficiencies;*

3 *(E) develop a plan for identifying and serv-*
4 *ing the needs of the region by conducting a con-*
5 *tinuing survey of the educational needs,*
6 *strengths, and weaknesses within the region, in-*
7 *cluding a process of open hearings to solicit the*
8 *views of schools, teachers, administrators, par-*
9 *ents, local educational agencies, librarians, and*
10 *State educational agencies within the region;*

11 *(F) use applied educational research to as-*
12 *sist in solving site-specific problems and to assist*
13 *in development activities;*

14 *(G) conduct applied research projects de-*
15 *signed to serve the particular needs of the region*
16 *only in the event that such quality applied re-*
17 *search does not exist as determined by the re-*
18 *gional education laboratory or the Department of*
19 *Education;*

20 *(H) facilitate communication between edu-*
21 *cational experts, school officials, and teachers,*
22 *parents, and librarians, to enable such individ-*
23 *uals to assist schools to develop a plan to meet*
24 *the National Education Goals;*

1 (I) bring teams of experts together to de-
2 velop and implement school improvement plans
3 and strategies;

4 (J) provide training in—

5 (i) the field of education research and
6 related areas;

7 (ii) the use of new educational meth-
8 ods; and

9 (iii) the use of information-finding
10 methods, practices, techniques, and products
11 developed in connection with such training
12 for which the regional educational labora-
13 tory may support internships and fellow-
14 ships and provide stipends;

15 (K) coordinate such laboratory's activities
16 with the directorates assisted under this section
17 in designing such laboratory's services and
18 projects, in order to—

19 (i) maximize the use of research con-
20 ducted through the directorates in the work
21 of such laboratory;

22 (ii) keep the directorates apprised of
23 the work of the regional educational labora-
24 tories in the field; and

1 (iii) inform the directorates about ad-
2 ditional research needs identified in the
3 field;

4 (L) develop with the State educational
5 agencies and library agencies in the region and
6 the Bureau of Indian Affairs a plan for serving
7 the region;

8 (M) collaborate and coordinate services with
9 other technical assistance funded by the Depart-
10 ment of Education; and

11 (N) cooperate with other regional labora-
12 tories to develop and maintain a national net-
13 work that addresses national education problems.

14 (4) GOVERNING BOARD.—

15 (A) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out the ac-
16 tivities described in paragraph (3), each regional
17 educational laboratory shall operate under the
18 direction of a governing board, the members of
19 which—

20 (i) are representative of that region;

21 and

22 (ii) include teachers and education re-
23 searchers.

24 (B) DUTIES.—Each such governing board
25 shall—

1 (i) determine, subject to the require-
2 ments of this section and in consultation
3 with the Assistant Secretary, the mission of
4 the regional educational laboratory;

5 (ii) ensure that the regional edu-
6 cational laboratory attains and maintains
7 a high level of quality in its work and prod-
8 ucts;

9 (iii) establish standards to ensure that
10 the regional educational laboratory has
11 strong and effective governance, organiza-
12 tion, management, and administration, and
13 employs qualified staff;

14 (iv) direct the regional educational lab-
15 oratory to carry out the regional edu-
16 cational laboratory's duties in a manner as
17 will make progress toward achieving the
18 National Education Goals and reforming
19 schools and educational systems;

20 (v) conduct a continuing survey of the
21 educational needs, strengths, and weaknesses
22 within the region, including a process of
23 open hearings to solicit the views of schools
24 and teachers; and

1 (vi) *prioritize the needs of economi-*
2 *cally disadvantaged urban and rural areas*
3 *within the region and ensure that such*
4 *needs are served by the regional educational*
5 *laboratory.*

6 (5) *APPLICATION.—Each entity desiring support*
7 *for a regional educational laboratory shall submit to*
8 *the Assistant Secretary an application that contains*
9 *such information as the Assistant Secretary may rea-*
10 *sonably require, including assurances that a regional*
11 *educational laboratory will address the activities de-*
12 *scribed in paragraph (3).*

13 (6) *ADDITIONAL PROJECTS.—In addition to ac-*
14 *tivities described in paragraph (3), the Assistant Sec-*
15 *retary, from amounts appropriated pursuant to sub-*
16 *section (q)(4), is authorized to enter into agreements*
17 *with a regional educational laboratory for the pur-*
18 *pose of carrying out additional projects to enable such*
19 *regional educational laboratory to assist in efforts to*
20 *achieve the National Education Goals and for other*
21 *purposes.*

22 (7) *SPECIAL RULE.—No regional educational*
23 *laboratory shall, by reason of receipt of assistance*
24 *under this section, be ineligible to receive any other*
25 *assistance from the Office authorized by law or be*

1 *prohibited from engaging in activities involving*
2 *international projects or endeavors.*

3 (8) *PLAN.*—*Not later than July 1 of each year,*
4 *each regional educational laboratory shall submit to*
5 *the Assistant Secretary a plan covering the succeeding*
6 *fiscal year, in which such laboratory's mission, ac-*
7 *tivities and scope of work are described, including a*
8 *general description of—*

9 (A) *the plans such laboratory expects to*
10 *submit in the 4 succeeding years; and*

11 (B) *an assessment of how well such labora-*
12 *tory is meeting the needs of the region.*

13 (9) *CONTRACT DURATION.*—*The Assistant Sec-*
14 *retary shall enter into a contract for the purpose of*
15 *supporting a regional educational laboratory under*
16 *this subsection for a minimum of 5 years. The Sec-*
17 *retary shall ensure that the recompetition cycles for*
18 *new contracts for regional educational laboratories*
19 *are carried out in such a manner that the expiration*
20 *of the laboratory contracts is consistent with the reau-*
21 *thorization cycle.*

22 (10) *REVIEW.*—*The Assistant Secretary shall re-*
23 *view the work of each regional educational laboratory*
24 *in the third year that such laboratory receives assist-*
25 *ance under this subsection, and shall evaluate the per-*

1 *formance of such laboratory's activities to determine*
 2 *if such activities are consistent with the duties de-*
 3 *scribed in paragraph (3).*

4 (11) *CONSTRUCTION.*—*Nothing in this subsection*
 5 *shall be construed to require any modifications in the*
 6 *regional educational laboratory contracts in effect on*
 7 *the day preceding the date of enactment of this Act.*

8 (12) *ADVANCE PAYMENT SYSTEM.*—*Each re-*
 9 *gional educational laboratory shall participate in the*
 10 *advance payment system of the Department of Edu-*
 11 *cation.*

12 (13) *COORDINATION.*—*The regional education*
 13 *laboratories shall work collaboratively, and coordinate*
 14 *the services such laboratories provide, with the tech-*
 15 *nical assistance centers authorized under the Elemen-*
 16 *tary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.*

17 (l) *TEACHER RESEARCH DISSEMINATION DEM-*
 18 *ONSTRATION PROGRAM.*—

19 (1) *FINDINGS.*—*The Congress finds that—*

20 (A) *education research, including research*
 21 *funded by the Office, is not having the impact on*
 22 *the Nation's schools that such research should;*

23 (B) *relevant education research and result-*
 24 *ing solutions are not being adequately dissemi-*

1 nated to and used by the teachers that need such
2 research and solutions;

3 (C) there are insufficient linkages between
4 the research and development centers assisted
5 under this section, the regional educational lab-
6 oratories described in subsection (k), the Na-
7 tional Diffusion Network State facilitators, the
8 Education Resources Information Clearing-
9 houses, the comprehensive technical assistance
10 centers assisted under the Elementary and Sec-
11 ondary Education Act of 1965, and the public
12 schools to ensure that research on effective prac-
13 tice is disseminated and technical assistance pro-
14 vided to all teachers;

15 (D) the average teacher has little time to
16 plan or engage in a professional dialogue with
17 peers about strategies for improved learning;

18 (E) teachers do not have direct access to in-
19 formation systems or networks;

20 (F) teachers have little control over what in-
21 service education teachers will be offered; and

22 (G) individual teachers are not encouraged
23 to move beyond the walls of their school buildings
24 to identify and use outside resources.

25 (2) ESTABLISHMENT.—

1 (A) *IN GENERAL.*—*The Secretary is author-*
2 *ized to make grants to, and enter into contracts*
3 *or cooperative agreements with, public and pri-*
4 *vate agencies and organizations, including insti-*
5 *tutions of higher education, the regional edu-*
6 *cation laboratories, and the research and devel-*
7 *opment centers, or consortia thereof—*

8 (i) *to develop and carry out projects*
9 *that demonstrate effective strategies for*
10 *helping elementary and secondary education*
11 *teachers, in both urban and rural areas, be-*
12 *come knowledgeable about, assist in the de-*
13 *sign and use of, and use, education re-*
14 *search, including education research carried*
15 *out under this Act; and*

16 (ii) *to develop, implement, and evalu-*
17 *ate models for creation of teacher research*
18 *dissemination networks.*

19 (B) *PRIORITY.*—*In awarding grants and*
20 *entering into contracts and cooperative agree-*
21 *ments under subparagraph (A) the Secretary*
22 *shall give priority to entities that have received*
23 *Federal funds for research and dissemination.*

24 (3) *APPLICATIONS.*—

1 (A) *IN GENERAL.*—An entity desiring to re-
2 ceive assistance under this subsection shall sub-
3 mit an application to the Secretary in such
4 form, at such time, and containing such infor-
5 mation and assurances as the Secretary may re-
6 quire.

7 (B) *CONTENTS.*—Each such application
8 shall describe how the project described in the
9 application—

10 (i) was developed with the active par-
11 ticipation of elementary and secondary
12 school teachers;

13 (ii) will include the continuing par-
14 ticipation of elementary and secondary
15 school teachers in the management of the
16 project;

17 (iii) is organized around one or more
18 significant research topics;

19 (iv) will involve collaboration with en-
20 tities that have received Federal funds for
21 research and dissemination; and

22 (v) will sustain over time teacher re-
23 search dissemination networks after Federal
24 funding for such networks terminates.

1 (4) *USE OF FUNDS.*—*Funds provided under this*
2 *section may be used—*

3 (A) *to train elementary and secondary edu-*
4 *cation teachers (particularly new teachers) about*
5 *the sources of education research findings, in-*
6 *cluding research findings available through ac-*
7 *tivities supported by the Office, and how to ac-*
8 *cess and use such findings to improve the quality*
9 *of instruction;*

10 (B) *to develop simple formats, both admin-*
11 *istrative and technological, that allow elemen-*
12 *tary and secondary education teachers easy ac-*
13 *cess to and use of education research findings;*

14 (C) *to share strategies and materials;*

15 (D) *to support professional networks;*

16 (E) *to survey teacher needs in the areas of*
17 *research and development; and*

18 (F) *for other activities designed to support*
19 *elementary and secondary education teachers in*
20 *becoming knowledgeable about, assisting in the*
21 *design of, and using, educational research.*

22 (5) *STIPENDS.*—*The Secretary may provide for*
23 *the payment of such stipends (including allowances*
24 *for subsistence and other expenses for elementary and*
25 *secondary teachers), as the Secretary determines to be*

1 *appropriate, to teachers participating in the projects*
2 *authorized under this subsection.*

3 (6) *COORDINATION.*—*Recipients of funds under*
4 *this section shall, to the greatest extent possible, co-*
5 *ordinate their activities with related activities under*
6 *the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of*
7 *1965.*

8 (7) *REPORT.*—*The Secretary shall, within 5*
9 *years of the date of enactment of this Act, submit to*
10 *the Congress a report on the effectiveness of activities*
11 *assisted under this subsection.*

12 (m) *OFFICE OF DISSEMINATION AND REFORM ASSIST-*
13 *ANCE.*—

14 (1) *IN GENERAL.*—*The Assistant Secretary shall*
15 *establish an Office of Dissemination and Reform As-*
16 *istance, which may include the Education Resources*
17 *Information Clearinghouses, the regional educational*
18 *laboratories, the National Clearinghouse for Science*
19 *and Mathematics Resources, the National Diffusion*
20 *Network, the National Education Library, and such*
21 *other programs and activities as the Assistant Sec-*
22 *retary deems appropriate. The Office of Dissemina-*
23 *tion and Reform Assistance shall be headed by a Di-*
24 *rector who shall be appointed by the Assistant Sec-*

1 *retary and have a demonstrated expertise and experi-*
2 *ence in dissemination.*

3 (2) *DUTIES.—In carrying out its dissemination*
4 *activities, the Office of Dissemination and Reform As-*
5 *sistance shall—*

6 (A) *operate a depository for all Department*
7 *of Education publications and products and*
8 *make available for reproduction such publica-*
9 *tions and products;*

10 (B) *coordinate the dissemination efforts of*
11 *all Office of Educational Research and Improve-*
12 *ment program offices, the regional educational*
13 *laboratories, the directorates assisted under this*
14 *section, the National Diffusion Network, and the*
15 *Education Resources Information Clearing-*
16 *houses;*

17 (C) *disseminate relevant and useful re-*
18 *search, information, products, and publications*
19 *developed through or supported by the Depart-*
20 *ment of Education to schools throughout the Na-*
21 *tion;*

22 (D) *develop the capacity to connect schools*
23 *and teachers seeking information with the rel-*
24 *evant regional educational laboratories assisted*
25 *under subsection (k), the National Diffusion Net-*

1 *work, the directorates assisted under this section,*
2 *and the Education Resources Information Clear-*
3 *inghouses; and*

4 *(E) provide an annual report to the Sec-*
5 *retary regarding the types of information, prod-*
6 *ucts, and services that teachers, schools, and*
7 *school districts have requested and have deter-*
8 *mined to be most useful, and describe future*
9 *plans to adapt Department of Education prod-*
10 *ucts and services to address the needs of the users*
11 *of such information, products, and services.*

12 (3) *ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES.*—*In addition, the*
13 *Office of Dissemination and Reform Assistance*
14 *may—*

15 *(A) use media and other educational tech-*
16 *nology to carry out dissemination activities, in-*
17 *cluding program development;*

18 *(B) establish and maintain a database on*
19 *all research and improvement efforts funded*
20 *through the Department of Education;*

21 *(C) actively encourage cooperative publish-*
22 *ing of significant publications;*

23 *(D) disseminate information on successful*
24 *models and educational methods which have been*
25 *recommended to the Office of Dissemination and*

1 *Reform Assistance by educators, educational or-*
2 *ganizations, nonprofit organizations, businesses,*
3 *and foundations, and disseminate such models*
4 *by including, with any such information, an*
5 *identification of the entity or entities that have*
6 *recommended the program; and*

7 *(E) engage in such other dissemination ac-*
8 *tivities as the Assistant Secretary determines*
9 *necessary.*

10 *(n) NATIONAL DIFFUSION NETWORK STATE*
11 *FACILITATORS.—The National Diffusion Network described*
12 *in section 1562 of the Elementary and Secondary Edu-*
13 *cation Act of 1965 is authorized to provide information*
14 *through National Diffusion Network State facilitators on*
15 *model or demonstration projects funded by the Department*
16 *of Education. For purposes of carrying out this paragraph,*
17 *information on such model projects does not have to be ap-*
18 *proved through the program effectiveness panel, but may*
19 *be provided directly through the State facilitators. In addi-*
20 *tion, the National Diffusion Network may disseminate other*
21 *information available through the Office of Education Dis-*
22 *semination and Reform Assistance established under sub-*
23 *section (m) through the National Diffusion Network.*

24 *(o) NATIONAL EDUCATION LIBRARY.—*

1 (1) *ESTABLISHMENT.*—*There shall be established*
2 *a National Library of Education at the Department*
3 *of Education (hereafter in this subsection referred to*
4 *as the “Library”)* which shall—

5 (A) *be a national resource center for teach-*
6 *ers, scholars, librarians, State, local, and Indian*
7 *tribal education officials, parents, and other in-*
8 *terested individuals; and*

9 (B) *provide resources to assist in the—*

10 (i) *advancement of research on edu-*
11 *cation;*

12 (ii) *dissemination and exchange of sci-*
13 *entific and other information important to*
14 *the improvement of education at all levels;*
15 *and*

16 (iii) *improvement of educational*
17 *achievement.*

18 (2) *MISSION.*—*The mission of the Library shall*
19 *be to—*

20 (A) *become a principal center for the collec-*
21 *tion, preservation, and effective utilization of the*
22 *research and other information related to edu-*
23 *cation and to the improvement of educational*
24 *achievement;*

1 (B) strive to ensure widespread access to the
2 Library's facilities and materials, coverage of all
3 education issues and subjects, and quality con-
4 trol;

5 (C) have an expert library staff; and

6 (D) use modern information technology that
7 holds the potential to link major libraries,
8 schools, and educational centers across the Unit-
9 ed States into a network of national education
10 resources.

11 (3) FUNCTIONS.—The Library shall—

12 (A) establish a policy to acquire and pre-
13 serve books, periodicals, data, prints, films, re-
14 cordings, and other library materials related to
15 education;

16 (B) establish a policy to disseminate infor-
17 mation about the materials available in the Li-
18 brary;

19 (C) make available through loans, photo-

6 *among political, educational and private*

8 *tries; and*

9 *(v) provide support for—*

10 *(I) research and evaluation to de-*
11 *termine the effects of educational pro-*
12 *grams on students' development of the*
13 *knowledge, skills and traits of char-*
14 *acter essential for the preservation and*
15 *improvement of constitutional democ-*
16 *racy; and*

17 *(II) effective participation in and*
18 *the preservation and improvement of*
19 *an efficient market economy.*

20 *(B) RESERVATIONS.—In carrying out the*
21 *program described in subparagraph (A), the Sec-*
22 *retary shall reserve in each fiscal year—*

23 *(i) 50 percent of the amount available*
24 *to carry out this subsection for civics and*
25 *government education activities; and*

1 (ii) 50 percent of such amount for eco-

3 (2) CONTRACT AUTHORIZED.—

22 *national seminars on the goals and ob-*
23 *jectives of civics and government edu-*
24 *cation or economic education in con-*
25 *stitutional democracies (including the*

1 *sharing of curricular materials) for*
2 *educational leaders, teacher trainers,*
3 *scholars in related disciplines, and*
4 *educational policymakers; and*

5 (V) *the evaluation of civics and*
6 *government education or economic edu-*
7 *cation programs; and*

8 (ii) *have the authority to subcontract*
9 *with other organizations to carry out the*
10 *provisions of this subsection.*

11 (3) *ACTIVITIES.—The international education*
12 *program described in this subsection shall—*

13 (A) *provide eligible countries with—*

14 (i) *seminars on the basic principles of*
15 *United States constitutional democracy and*
16 *economics, including seminars on the major*
17 *governmental and economic institutions*
18 *and systems in the United States, and visits*
19 *to such institutions;*

20 (ii) *visits to school systems, institu-*
21 *tions of higher learning, and nonprofit or-*
22 *ganizations conducting exemplary programs*
23 *in civics and government education and*
24 *economic education in the United States;*

1 (iii) home stays in United States com-

1 **PART C—ELEMENTARY SCIENCE EQUIPMENT**

2 **PROGRAM**

3 **SEC. 231. SHORT TITLE.**

4 *This part may be cited as the “Elementary Mathe-*
5 *matics and Science Equipment Act”.*

6 **SEC. 232. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE.**

7 *It is the purpose of this part to raise the quality of*
8 *instruction in mathematics and science in the Nation’s ele-*
9 *mentary schools by providing equipment and materials nec-*
10 *essary for hands-on instruction through assistance to State*
11 *and local educational agencies.*

12 **SEC. 233. PROGRAM AUTHORIZED.**

13 *The Secretary is authorized to make allotments to*
14 *State educational agencies under section 234 to enable such*
15 *agencies to award grants to local educational agencies for*
16 *the purpose of providing equipment and materials to ele-*
17 *mentary schools to improve mathematics and science edu-*
18 *cation in such schools.*

19 **SEC. 234. ALLOTMENTS OF FUNDS.**

20 *(a) IN GENERAL.—From the amount appropriated*
21 *under section 240 for any fiscal year, the Secretary shall*
22 *reserve—*

23 *(1) not more than one-half of 1 percent for allot-*
24 *ment among Guam, American Samoa, the Virgin Is-*
25 *lands, the Northern Mariana Islands, the Republic of*
26 *the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Microne-*

1 *sia, and the Republic of Palau according to their re-*
2 *spective needs for assistance under this part; and*

3 *(2) one-half of 1 percent for programs for Indian*
4 *students served by schools funded by the Secretary of*
5 *the Interior which are consistent with the purposes of*
6 *this part.*

7 *(b) ALLOTMENT.—The remainder of the amount so ap-*
8 *propriated (after meeting requirements in subsection (a))*
9 *shall be allotted among State educational agencies so that—*

10 *(1) one-half of such remainder shall be distrib-*
11 *uted by allotting to each State educational agency an*
12 *amount which bears the same ratio to such one-half*
13 *of such remainder as the number of children aged 5*
14 *to 17, inclusive, in the State bears to the number of*
15 *such children in all States; and*

16 *(2) one-half of such remainder shall be distrib-*
17 *uted according to each State's share of allocations*
18 *under chapter 1 of title I of the Elementary and Sec-*
19 *ondary Education Act of 1965,*

20 *except that no State educational agency shall receive less*
21 *than one-half of 1 percent of the amount available under*
22 *this subsection in any fiscal year or less than the amount*
23 *allotted to such State for fiscal year 1988 under title II*
24 *of the Education for Economic Security Act.*

1 (c) *REALLOTMENT OF UNUSED FUNDS.*—The amount
2 of any State educational agency's allotment under sub-
3 section (b) for any fiscal year to carry out this part which
4 the Secretary determines will not be required for that fiscal
5 year to carry out this part shall be available for reallocation
6 from time to time, on such dates during that year as the
7 Secretary may determine, to other State educational agen-
8 cies in proportion to the original allotments to those State
9 educational agencies under subsection (b) for that year but
10 with such proportionate amount for any of those other State
11 educational agencies being reduced to the extent it exceeds
12 the sum the Secretary estimates that the State educational
13 agency needs and will be able to use for that year, and the
14 total of those reductions shall be similarly reallocated among
15 the State educational agencies whose proportionate amounts
16 were not so reduced. Any amounts reallocated to a State edu-
17 cational agency under this subsection during a year shall
18 be deemed a subpart of the State educational agency's allot-
19 ment under subsection (b) for that year.

20 (d) *DEFINITION.*—For the purposes of this part the
21 term "State" means each of the 50 States, the District of
22 Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.

23 (e) *DATA.*—The number of children aged 5 to 11, in-
24 clusive, in the State and in all States shall be determined

1 *by the Secretary on the basis of the most recent satisfactory*
2 *data available to the Secretary.*

3 **SEC. 235. STATE APPLICATION.**

4 (a) *APPLICATION.*—*Each State educational agency de-*
5 *siring to receive an allotment under this part shall file an*
6 *application with the Secretary which covers a period of 5*
7 *fiscal years. Such application shall be filed at such time,*
8 *in such manner, and containing or accompanied by such*
9 *information as the Secretary may reasonably require.*

10 (b) *CONTENTS OF APPLICATION.*—*Each application*
11 *described in subsection (a) shall—*

12 (1) *provide assurances that—*

13 (A) *the State educational agency shall use*
14 *the allotment provided under this part to award*
15 *grants to local educational agencies within the*
16 *State to enable such local educational agencies to*
17 *provide assistance to schools served by such agen-*
18 *cy to carry out the purpose of this part;*

19 (B) *the State educational agency will pro-*
20 *vide such fiscal control and funds accounting as*
21 *the Secretary may require;*

22 (C) *every public elementary school in the*
23 *State is eligible to receive assistance under this*
24 *part once over the 5-year duration of the pro-*
25 *gram assisted under this part;*

1 (D) funds provided under this part will
2 supplement, not supplant, State and local funds
3 made available for activities authorized under
4 this part;

5 (E) during the 5-year period described in
6 the application, the State educational agency
7 will evaluate its standards and programs for
8 teacher preparation and inservice professional
9 development for elementary mathematics and
10 science;

11 (F) the State educational agency will take
12 into account the needs for greater access to and
13 participation in mathematics and science by stu-
14 dents and teachers from historically
15 underrepresented groups, including females, mi-
16 norities, individuals with limited-English pro-
17 ficiency, the economically disadvantaged, and in-
18 dividuals with disabilities; and

19 (G) that the needs of teachers and students
20 in areas with high concentrations of low-income
21 students and sparsely populated areas will be
22 given priority in awarding assistance under this
23 part;

24 (2) provide, if appropriate, a description of how
25 funds paid under this part will be coordinated with

1 *State and local funds and other Federal resources,*
2 *particularly with respect to programs for the profes-*
3 *sional development and inservice training of elemen-*
4 *tary school teachers in science and mathematics; and*

5 *(3) describe procedures—*

6 *(A) for submitting applications for pro-*
7 *grams described in sections 236 and 237 for dis-*
8 *tribution of assistance under this part within the*
9 *State; and*

10 *(B) for approval of applications by the*
11 *State educational agency, including appropriate*
12 *procedures to assure that such agency will not*
13 *disapprove an application without notice and*
14 *opportunity for a hearing.*

15 *(c) STATE ADMINISTRATION.—Not more than 5 per-*
16 *cent of the funds allotted to each State educational agency*
17 *under this part shall be used for the administrative costs*
18 *of such agency associated with carrying out the program*
19 *assisted under this part.*

20 **SEC. 236. LOCAL APPLICATION.**

21 *(a) APPLICATION.—A local educational agency that de-*
22 *sires to receive a grant under this part shall submit an ap-*
23 *plication to the State educational agency. Each such appli-*
24 *cation shall contain assurances that each school served by*

1 *the local educational agency shall be eligible for assistance*
2 *under this part only once.*

3 (b) *CONTENTS OF APPLICATION.*—*Each application*
4 *described in subsection (a) shall—*

5 (1) *describe how the local educational agency*
6 *plans to set priorities on the use and distribution*
7 *among schools of grant funds received under this part*
8 *to meet the purpose of this part;*

9 (2) *include assurances that the local educational*
10 *agency has made every effort to match on a dollar-*
11 *for-dollar basis from private or public sources the*
12 *funds received under this part, except that no such*
13 *application shall be penalized or denied assistance*
14 *under this part based on failure to provide such*
15 *matching funds;*

16 (3) *describe, if applicable, how funds under this*
17 *part will be coordinated with State, local, and other*
18 *Federal resources, especially with respect to programs*
19 *for the professional development and inservice train-*
20 *ing of elementary school teachers in science and math-*
21 *ematics; and*

22 (4) *describe the process which will be used to de-*
23 *termine different levels of assistance to be awarded to*
24 *schools with different needs.*

1 (c) *PRIORITY.*—In awarding grants under this part,
2 the State educational agency shall give priority to applica-
3 tions that—

4 (1) assign highest priority to providing assist-
5 ance to schools which—

6 (A) are most seriously underequipped; or

7 (B) serve large concentrations or large num-
8 bers of economically disadvantaged students;

9 (2) are attentive to the needs of underrepresented
10 groups in science and mathematics;

11 (3) demonstrate how science and mathematics
12 equipment will be part of a comprehensive plan of
13 curriculum planning or implementation and teacher
14 training supporting hands-on laboratory activities;
15 and

16 (4) assign priority to providing equipment and
17 materials for students in grades 1 through 6.

18 **SEC. 237. PARTICIPATION OF PRIVATE SCHOOLS.**

19 (a) *PARTICIPATION OF PRIVATE SCHOOLS.*—To the ex-
20 tent consistent with the number of children in the State or
21 in the school district of each local educational agency who
22 are enrolled in private nonprofit elementary schools, such
23 State educational agency shall, after consultation with ap-
24 propriate private school representatives, make provision for
25 including services and arrangements for the benefit of such

1 *children as will assure the equitable participation of such*
2 *children in the purposes and benefits of this part.*

3 (b) *WAIVER.*—*If by reason of any provision of State*
4 *law a local educational agency is prohibited from providing*
5 *for the participation of children or teachers from private*
6 *nonprofit schools as required by subsection (a), or if the*
7 *Secretary determines that a State or local educational agen-*
8 *cy has substantially failed or is unwilling to provide for*
9 *such participation on an equitable basis, the Secretary shall*
10 *waive such requirements and shall arrange for the provision*
11 *of services to such children or teachers subject to the require-*
12 *ment of this section. Such waivers shall be subject to con-*
13 *sultation, withholding, notice, and judicial review require-*
14 *ments described in section 1017 of the Elementary and Sec-*
15 *ondary Education Act of 1965.*

16 ***SEC. 238. PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS.***

17 (a) *COORDINATION.*—*Each State educational agency*
18 *receiving an allotment under this part shall—*

19 (1) *disseminate information to school districts*
20 *and schools, including private nonprofit elementary*
21 *schools, regarding the program assisted under this*
22 *part;*

23 (2) *evaluate applications of local educational*
24 *agencies;*

1 (3) award grants to local educational agencies
2 based on the priorities described in section 236(c);
3 and

4 (4) evaluate local educational agencies' end-of-
5 year summaries and submit such evaluation to the
6 Secretary.

7 (b) LIMITATIONS ON USE OF FUNDS.—

8 (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para-
9 graph (2), grant funds and matching funds under
10 this part only shall be used to purchase science equip-
11 ment, science materials, or mathematical manipula-
12 tive materials and shall not be used for computers,
13 computer peripherals, software, textbooks, or staff de-
14 velopment costs.

15 (2) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS.—Grant funds
16 under this part may not be used for capital improve-
17 ments. Not more than 50 percent of any matching
18 funds provided by the local educational agency may
19 be used for capital improvements of classroom science
20 facilities to support the hands-on instruction that this
21 part is intended to support, such as the installation
22 of electrical outlets, plumbing, lab tables or counters,
23 or ventilation mechanisms.

1 **SEC. 239. FEDERAL ADMINISTRATION.**

2 (a) *TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND EVALUATION PROCEDURE*.—The Secretary shall provide technical assistance
3 and, in consultation with State and local representatives
4 of the program assisted under this part, shall develop procedures for State and local evaluations of the programs as-
5 sisted under this part.
6
7

8 (b) *REPORT*.—The Secretary shall report to the Con-
9 gress each year on the program assisted under this part.

10 **SEC. 240. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

11 There are authorized to be appropriated \$10,000,000
12 for fiscal year 1995, and such sums as may be necessary
13 for each of the fiscal years 1996 through 1999, to carry out
14 this part.

15 **PART D—MEDIA INSTRUCTION**

16 **SEC. 241. MEDIA INSTRUCTION.**

17 (a) *GRANTS AUTHORIZED*.—The Secretary shall enter
18 into a contract with an independent nonprofit organization
19 described in subsection (b) for the establishment of a na-
20 tional multimedia television-based project directed to
21 homes, schools and after-school programs that is designed
22 to motivate and improve the reading comprehension and
23 writing coherence of elementary school-age children.

24 (b) *DEMONSTRATED EFFECTIVENESS*.—The Secretary
25 shall award the contract described in subsection (a) to an
26 independent nonprofit organization that has demonstrated

1 *effectiveness in educational programming and development*
 2 *on a nationwide basis.*

3 (c) *AUTHORIZATION AND APPROPRIATIONS.*—*There*
 4 *are authorized to be appropriated \$5,000,000 for fiscal year*
 5 *1995, and such sums as may be necessary for fiscal year*
 6 *1996 and fiscal year 1997, to carry out this section.*

7 ***PART E—STAR SCHOOLS***

8 ***SEC. 251. STAR SCHOOLS.***

9 *Subsection (a) of section 908 of the Star Schools Assist-*
 10 *ance Act (20 U.S.C. 4085b(a)) is amended by striking*
 11 *“greater” and inserting “lesser”.*

12 ***PART F—OFFICE OF COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL***

13 ***HEALTH EDUCATION***

14 ***SEC. 261. OFFICE OF COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL HEALTH***
 15 ***EDUCATION.***

16 (a) *IN GENERAL.*—*Subsection (c) of section 4605 of*
 17 *the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20*
 18 *U.S.C. 3155(c)) is amended—*

19 (1) *in the matter preceding paragraph (1), by*
 20 *striking “Office of the Secretary” and inserting “Of-*
 21 *fice of Elementary and Secondary Education”;* and

22 (2) *by adding at the end the following new para-*
 23 *graph:*

24 “(4) *To act as a liaison office for the coordina-*
 25 *tion of the activities undertaken by the Office under*

1 *this section with related activities of the Department*
2 *of Health and Human Services and to expand school*
3 *health education research grant programs under this*
4 *section.”.*

5 (b) *TRANSITION.—The Secretary shall take all appro-*
6 *priate actions to facilitate the transfer of the Office of Com-*
7 *prehensive School Health Education pursuant to the*
8 *amendment made by subsection (a).*

9 **PART G—MINORITY-FOCUSED CIVICS EDUCATION**

10 **SEC. 271. SHORT TITLE.**

11 *This part may be cited as the “Minority-Focused*
12 *Civics Education Act of 1993”.*

13 **SEC. 272. PURPOSES.**

14 *It is the purpose of this part—*

15 (1) *to encourage improved instruction for mi-*
16 *norities and Native Americans in American govern-*
17 *ment and civics through a national program of ac-*
18 *credited summer teacher training and staff develop-*
19 *ment seminars or institutes followed by academic*
20 *year inservice training programs conducted on college*
21 *and university campuses or other appropriate sites,*
22 *for—*

23 (A) *social studies and other teachers respon-*
24 *sible for American history, government, and*
25 *civics classes; and*

1 (B) other educators who work with minority
2 and Native American youth; and
3 (2) through such improved instruction to im-
4 prove minority and Native American student knowl-
5 edge and understanding of the American system of
6 government.

7 **SEC. 273. GRANTS AUTHORIZED; AUTHORIZATION OF AP-**
8 **PROPRIATIONS.**

9 (a) *GRANTS AUTHORIZED.*—

10 (1) *IN GENERAL.*—The Secretary is authorized to
11 make grants to eligible entities for the development
12 and implementation of seminars in American govern-
13 ment and civics for elementary and secondary school
14 teachers and other educators who work with minority
15 and Native American students.

16 (2) *AWARD RULE.*—In awarding grants under
17 this part, the Secretary shall ensure that there is wide
18 geographic distribution of such grants.

19 (b) *AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.*—There are
20 authorized to be appropriated \$5,000,000 for fiscal 1995,
21 and such sums as may be necessary for each of the fiscal
22 years 1996, 1997, and 1998, to carry out this part.

23 **SEC. 274. DEFINITIONS.**

24 For purposes of this part—

1 (1) the term “eligible entity” means a State edu-
2 cational agency, an institution of higher education or
3 a State higher education agency, or a public or pri-
4 vate nonprofit organization, with experience in co-
5 ordinating or conducting teacher training seminars
6 in American government and civics education, or a
7 consortium thereof; and

8 (2) the term “State higher education agency”
9 means the officer or agency primarily responsible for
10 the State supervision of higher education.

11 **SEC. 275. APPLICATIONS.**

12 (a) *APPLICATION REQUIRED.*—Each eligible entity de-
13 siring a grant under this part shall submit an application
14 to the Secretary, at such time, in such manner and contain-
15 ing or accompanied by such information as the Secretary
16 may reasonably require.

17 (b) *CONTENTS OF APPLICATION.*—Each application
18 submitted pursuant to subsection (a) shall—

19 (1) define the learning objectives and course con-
20 tent of each seminar to be held and describe the man-
21 ner in which seminar participants shall receive sub-
22 stantive academic instruction in the principles, insti-
23 tutions and processes of American government;

24 (2) provide assurances that educators successfully
25 participating in each seminar will qualify for either

1 *graduate credit or professional development or ad-*
2 *vancement credit according to the criteria established*
3 *by a State or local educational agency;*

4 (3) *describe the manner in which seminar par-*
5 *ticipants shall receive exposure to a broad array of*
6 *individuals who are actively involved in the political*
7 *process, including political party representatives*
8 *drawn equally from the major political parties, as*
9 *well as representatives of other organizations involved*
10 *in the political process;*

11 (4) *provide assurances that the seminars will be*
12 *conducted on a nonpartisan basis;*

13 (5) *describe the manner in which the seminars*
14 *will address the role of minorities or Native Ameri-*
15 *cans in the American political process, including such*
16 *topics as—*

17 (A) *the history and current political state of*
18 *minorities or Native Americans;*

19 (B) *recent research on minority or Native*
20 *American political socialization patterns and*
21 *cognitive learning styles; and*

22 (C) *studies of political participation pat-*
23 *terns of minorities or Native Americans;*

24 (6) *describe the pedagogical elements for teachers*
25 *that will enable teachers to develop effective strategies*

1 *and lesson plans for teaching minorities or Native*
2 *American students at the elementary and secondary*
3 *school levels;*

4 *(7) identify the eligible entities which will con-*
5 *duct the seminars for which assistance is sought;*

6 *(8) in the case that the eligible entity is an insti-*
7 *tution of higher education, describe the plans for col-*
8 *laborating with national organizations in American*
9 *government and civics education;*

10 *(9) provide assurances that during the academic*
11 *year educators participating in the summer seminars*
12 *will provide inservice training programs based upon*
13 *what such educators have learned and the curricular*
14 *materials such educators have developed or acquired*
15 *for their peers in their school systems with the ap-*
16 *proval and support of their school administrators;*
17 *and*

18 *(10) describe the activities or services for which*
19 *assistance is sought, including activities and services*
20 *such as—*

21 *(A) development of seminar curricula;*

22 *(B) development and distribution of in-*
23 *structional materials;*

24 *(C) scholarships for participating teachers;*

25 *and*

1 (D) *program assessment and evaluation.*

2 (c) *PRIORITY.—The Secretary, in approving applica-*
3 *tions for assistance under this part, shall give priority to*
4 *applications which demonstrate that—*

5 (1) *the applicant will serve teachers who teach in*
6 *schools with a large number or concentration of eco-*
7 *nomically disadvantaged students;*

8 (2) *the applicant has demonstrated national ex-*
9 *perience in conducting or coordinating accredited*
10 *summer seminars in American government or civics*
11 *education for elementary and secondary school teach-*
12 *ers;*

13 (3) *the applicant will coordinate or conduct sem-*
14 *inars on a national or multistate basis through a col-*
15 *laboration with an institution of higher education,*
16 *State higher education agency or a public or private*
17 *nonprofit organization, with experience in coordinat-*
18 *ing or conducting teacher training programs in*
19 *American government and civics education;*

20 (4) *the applicant will coordinate or conduct sem-*
21 *inars designed for more than one minority student*
22 *population and for Native Americans; and*

23 (5) *the applicant will coordinate or conduct sem-*
24 *inars that offer a combination of academic instruc-*
25 *tion in American government, exposure to the prac-*

1 *tical workings of the political system, and training in*
2 *appropriate pedagogical techniques for working with*
3 *minority and Native American students.*

4 **TITLE III—DEFINITIONS**

5 **SEC. 301. DEFINITIONS.**

6 *For the purpose of this Act—*

7 (1) *the term “elementary school” has the same*
8 *meaning given to such term by section 1471(8) of the*
9 *Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965;*

10 (2) *the term “institution of higher education”*
11 *has the same meaning given to such term by section*
12 *1201(a) of the Higher Education Act of 1965;*

13 (3) *the term “local educational agency” has the*
14 *same meaning given to such term by section 1471(12)*
15 *of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of*
16 *1965;*

17 (4) *the term “secondary school” has the same*
18 *meaning given to such term by section 1471(21) of the*
19 *Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965;*

20 (5) *the term “Secretary” means the Secretary of*
21 *Education; and*

22 (6) *the term “State educational agency” has the*
23 *same meaning given such term by section 1471(23) of*
24 *the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of*
25 *1965.*
