Mr. DECONCINI (for himself and Mr. SIMPSON) submitted the following
resolution; which was considered and agreed to

RESOLUTION

Increasing the efficiency of the deportation process and the
removal of deportable aliens.

1 *Resolved*, That (a) it is the sense of the Senate that—
2 (1) the Attorney General should consider imple-
3 menting, through awarding start-up administrative
4 grants to appropriate not-for-profit organizations, a
5 pilot program at processing centers of the Immigra-
6 tion and Naturalization Service for the purpose of
7 increasing efficiency and cost savings in the process-
8 ing and removal of aliens held in custody by assur-
9 ing orientation and representation for such aliens;

1 (2) these pilot projects should be developed in
2 consultation with the Commissioner of the Immigra-
3 tion and Naturalization Service, the Executive Office
4 of Immigration Review (EOIR), and appropriate
5 not-for-profit organizations having relevant experi-
6 ence;

7 (3) one such project currently operating in Ari-
8 zona at the Florence Service Processing Center is a
9 good model for implementing such a pilot program
10 because of its working relationship with the Immi-
11 gration and Naturalization Service, the Executive
12 Office of Immigration Review, and a not-for-profit
13 organization; and

14 (4) an evaluation component should be included
15 in any such pilot program to test the efficiency, the
16 cost effectiveness, the services provided, and the
17 replicability in future years to additional processing
18 centers of the Immigration and Naturalization Serv-
19 ice.

20 (b) It is further the sense of the Senate that nothing
21 in this resolution should be construed as creating a right
22 to be represented at the expense of the Government.

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
