Providing for consideration of the bill (H.R. 3671) to amend the Acts popularly known as the Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act and the Dingell-Johnson Sport Fish Restoration Act to enhance the funds available for grants to States for fish and wildlife conservation projects and increase opportunities for recreational hunting, bow hunting, trapping, archery, and fishing, by eliminating opportunities for waste, fraud, abuse, maladministration, and unauthorized expenditures for administration and execution of those Acts, and for other purposes.

Mr. HASTINGS of Washington, from the Committee on Rules, reported the following resolution; which was referred to the House Calendar and ordered to be printed

RESOLUTION

Providing for consideration of the bill (H.R. 3671) to amend the Acts popularly known as the Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act and the Dingell-Johnson Sport Fish Restoration Act to enhance the funds available for grants to States for fish and wildlife conservation projects and increase opportunities for recreational hunting, bow hunting, trapping, archery, and fishing, by eliminating opportunities for waste, fraud, abuse, mal-

administration, and unauthorized expenditures for administration and execution of those Acts, and for other purposes.

1 *Resolved*, That at any time after the adoption of this
2 resolution the Speaker may, pursuant to clause 2(b) of
3 rule XVIII, declare the House resolved into the Committee
4 of the Whole House on the state of the Union for consider-
5 ation of the bill (H.R. 3671) to amend the Acts popularly
6 known as the Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act
7 and the Dingell-Johnson Sport Fish Restoration Act to
8 enhance the funds available for grants to states for fish
9 and wildlife conservation projects and increase opportuni-
10 ties for recreational hunting, bow hunting, trapping, arch-
11 ery, and fishing, by eliminating opportunities for waste,
12 fraud, abuse, maladministration, and unauthorized ex-
13 penditures for opportunities for recreational hunting, how
14 hunting, trapping, archery, and fishing, by eliminating op-
15 portunities for waste, fraud, abuse, maladministration,
16 and unauthorized expenditures for administration and exe-
17 cution of those acts, and for other purposes. The first
18 reading of the bill shall be dispensed with. Points of order
19 against consideration of the bill for failure to comply with
20 clause 4(a) of rule XIII are waived. General debate shall
21 be confined to the bill and shall not exceed one hour equal-
22 ly divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking mi-
23 nority member of the Committee on Resources. After gen-

1 eral debate the bill shall be considered for amendment
2 under the five-minute rule. It shall be in order to consider
3 as an original bill for the purpose of amendment under
4 the five-minute rule the amendment in the nature of a sub-
5 stitute recommended by the Committee on Resources now
6 printed in the bill. The committee amendment in the na-
7 ture of a substitute shall be considered as read. Points
8 of order against the committee amendment in the nature
9 of a substitute for failure to comply with clause 4 of rule
10 XXI are waived. The amendment printed in the report of
11 the Committee on Rules accompanying this resolution
12 shall be considered as read, shall not be subject to amend-
13 ment, and shall not be subject to a demand for division
14 of the question in the House or in the Committee of the
15 Whole. All points of order against the amendment printed
16 in the report are waived. During consideration of the bill
17 for amendment, the Chairman of the Committee of the
18 Whole may accord priority in recognition on the basis of
19 whether the Member offering an amendment has caused
20 it to be printed in the portion of the Congressional Record
21 designated for that purpose in clause 8 of rule XVIII.
22 Amendments so printed shall be considered as read. The
23 Chairman of the Committee of the Whole may: (1) post-
24 pone until a time during further consideration in the Com-
25 mittee of the Whole a request for a recorded vote on any

1 amendment; and (2) reduce to five minutes the minimum
2 time for electronic voting on any postponed question that
3 follows another electronic vote without intervening busi-
4 ness, provided that the minimum time for electronic voting
5 on the first in any series of questions shall be 15 minutes.
6 At the conclusion of consideration of the bill for amend-
7 ment the Committee shall rise and report the bill to the
8 House with such amendments as may have been adopted.
9 Any Member may demand a separate vote in the House
10 on any amendment adopted in the Committee of the Whole
11 to the bill or to the committee amendment in the nature
12 of a substitute. The previous question shall be considered
13 as ordered on the bill and amendments thereto to final
14 passage without intervening motion except one motion to
15 recommit with or without instructions.

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
