A BILL

To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2010 for military
construction, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Military Construction
5 Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2010”.

6 STRUCTION AUTHORIZA-
7 TIONS**

8 SEC. 2001. SHORT TITLE.

9 This division may be cited as the “Military Construc-
10 tion Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2010”.

**11 SEC. 2002. EXPIRATION OF AUTHORIZATIONS AND
12 AMOUNTS REQUIRED TO BE SPECIFIED BY
13 LAW.**

14 (a) EXPIRATION OF AUTHORIZATIONS AFTER THREE
15 YEARS.—Except as provided in subsection (b), all author-
16 izations contained in titles XXI through XXVII for mili-
17 tary construction projects, land acquisition, family housing
18 projects and facilities, and contributions to the North At-
19 lantic Treaty Organization Security Investment Program
20 (and authorizations of appropriations therefor) shall ex-
21 pire on the later of—

22 (1) October 1, 2012; or

1 (2) the date of the enactment of an Act author-
2 izing funds for military construction for fiscal year
3 2013.

4 (b) EXCEPTION.—Subsection (a) shall not apply to
5 authorizations for military construction projects, land ac-
6 quisition, family housing projects and facilities, and con-
7 tributions to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Se-
8 curity Investment Program (and authorizations of appro-
9 priations therefor), for which appropriated funds have
10 been obligated before the later of—

11 (1) October 1, 2012; or

12 (2) the date of the enactment of an Act author-
13 izing funds for fiscal year 2013 for military con-
14 struction projects, land acquisition, family housing
15 projects and facilities, or contributions to the North
16 Atlantic Treaty Organization Security Investment
17 Program.

18 **SEC. 2003. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

19 Titles XXI through XXVII shall take effect on the
20 later of—

21 (1) October 1, 2009; or

22 (2) the date of the enactment of this Act.

23 **SEC. 2004. FUNDING TABLES.**

24 (a) IN GENERAL.—The amounts authorized to be ap-
25 propriated by sections 2104, 2204, 2304, 2404, 2411,

1 2502, and 2606 shall be available, in accordance with the
2 requirements of section 4001, for projects, programs, and
3 activities, and in the amounts, specified in the funding
4 table in section 4501.

5 (b) BASE CLOSURE AND REALIGNMENT ACTIVITIES.—The amounts authorized to be appropriated by sec-
6 tion 2703 shall be available, in accordance with the re-
7 quirements of section 4001, for projects, programs, and
8 activities, and in the amounts, specified in the funding
9 table in section 4502.

11 (c) PROJECTS FUNDED BY AMERICAN RECOVERY
12 AND REINVESTMENT ACT OF 2009.—The amounts au-
13 thorized by section 2801 shall be available, in accordance
14 with the requirements of section 4001, for projects, pro-
15 grams, and activities, and in the amounts, specified in the
16 funding table in section 4503.

17 (d) OVERSEAS CONTINGENCY OPERATIONS.—The
18 amounts authorized to be appropriated by sections 2901
19 and 2902 shall be available, in accordance with the re-
20 quirements of section 4001, for projects, programs, and
21 activities, and in the amounts, specified in the funding
22 table in section 4504.

TITLE XXI—ARMY

SEC. 2101. AUTHORIZED ARMY CONSTRUCTION AND LAND ACQUISITION PROJECTS.

(a) INSIDE THE UNITED STATES.—Using amounts appropriated pursuant to the authorization of appropriations in section 2104(a)(1), the Secretary of the Army may acquire real property and carry out military construction projects for the installations or locations inside the United States, and in the amounts, set forth in the following table:

 12 Army may construct or acquire family housing units (in-
 13 cluding land acquisition and supporting facilities) at the
 14 installations or locations, in the number of units, and in
 15 the amounts set forth in the following table:

16 (b) PLANNING AND DESIGN.—Using amounts appro-

3 or improvement of family housing units in an amount not
4 to exceed \$3,936,000.

5 **SEC. 2103. IMPROVEMENTS TO MILITARY FAMILY HOUSING**
6 **UNITS.**

7 Subject to section 2825 of title 10, United States
8 Code, and using amounts appropriated pursuant to the
9 authorization of appropriations in section 2104(a)(5)(A),
10 the Secretary of the Army may improve existing military
11 family housing units in an amount not to exceed
12 \$219,300,000.

13 **SEC. 2104. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS, ARMY.**

14 (a) IN GENERAL.—Funds are hereby authorized to
15 be appropriated for fiscal years beginning after September
16 30, 2009, for military construction, land acquisition, and
17 military family housing functions of the Department of the
18 Army in the total amount of \$4,262,800,000 as follows:

19 (1) For military construction projects inside the
20 United States authorized by section 2101(a),
21 \$2,619,217,000.

22 (2) For military construction projects outside
23 the United States authorized by section 2101(b),
24 \$302,500,000.

1 (3) For unspecified minor military construction
2 projects authorized by section 2805 of title 10,
3 United States Code, \$23,000,000.

4 (4) For architectural and engineering services
5 and construction design under section 2807 of title
6 10, United States Code, \$178,029,000.

7 (5) For military family housing functions:

8 (A) For construction and acquisition, plan-
9 ning and design, and improvement of military
10 family housing and facilities, \$241,236,000.

11 (B) For support of military family housing
12 (including the functions described in section
13 2833 of title 10, United States Code),
14 \$523,418,000.

15 (6) For the construction of increment 4 of a
16 brigade complex at Fort Lewis, Washington, author-
17 ized by section 2101(a) of the Military Construction

5 of all projects carried out under section 2101 of this Act
6 may not exceed the sum of the following:

7 (1) The total amount authorized to be appro-
8 priated under paragraphs (1) and (2) of subsection
9 (a).

10 (2) \$25,000,000 (the balance of the amount au-
11 thORIZED under section 2101(b) of the Military Con-
12 struction Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008
13 (division B of Public Law 110–181; 122 Stat. 505)
14 for construction of a brigade complex operations
15 support facility at Vicenza, Italy.

16 (3) \$26,000,000 (the balance of the amount au-
17 thORIZED under section 2101(b) of the Military Con-
18 struction Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008
19 (division B of Public Law 110–181; 122 Stat. 505)
20 for construction of a brigade complex operations
21 support facility at Vicenza, Italy.

22 **SEC. 2105. EXTENSION OF AUTHORIZATIONS OF CERTAIN**
23 **FISCAL YEAR 2006 PROJECTS.**

24 (a) EXTENSION.—Notwithstanding section 2701 of
25 the Military Construction Authorization Act for Fiscal

1 Year 2006 (division B of Public Law 109–163; 119 Stat.
 2 3501), the authorizations set forth in the table in sub-
 3 section (b), as provided in section 2101 of that Act (119
 4 Stat. 3485), shall remain in effect until October 1, 2010,
 5 or the date of the enactment of an Act authorizing funds
 6 for military construction for fiscal year 2011, whichever
 7 is later.

9 **SEC. 2204. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS, NAVY.**

10 (a) IN GENERAL.—Funds are hereby authorized to
11 be appropriated for fiscal years beginning after September
12 30, 2009, for military construction, land acquisition, and
13 military family housing functions of the Department of the
14 Navy in the total amount of \$4,053,880,000, as follows:

16 United States authorized by section 2201(a),
17 \$2,756,105,000.

18 (2) For military construction projects outside
19 the United States authorized by section 2201(b),
20 \$229,445,000.

21 (3) For unspecified minor military construction

5 including administrative transfer to another Federal
6 agency, public benefit conveyances, homeless housing
7 assistance, economic development conveyances, nego-
8 tiated sales, or public sales.

9 (4) The Department of Defense is authorized to
10 convey property to local redevelopment agencies rep-
11 resenting communities affected by base closures and
12 realignments for the purpose of economic develop-
13 ment.

14 (5) The Department of Defense is authorized to
15 assess the needs of the local community and the in-
16 tended use of the property in determining the
17 amount of compensation to be received in exchange
18 for the economic development conveyance.

19 (6) The Department of Defense is authorized to
20 receive an amount for the economic development
21 conveyance that may range from fair market value
22 to an amount less than fair market, to no cost to the
23 conveyee, depending on the local economic condi-
24 tions.

1 (7) The Department of Defense is required to
2 use any monetary proceeds gained from the disposal
3 of BRAC property to fund environmental clean-up,
4 remediation, and compliance actions required to
5 safely dispose of BRAC property.

6 (8) Any revenue foregone as a result of a deci-
7 sion not to seek fair market value for disposed prop-
8 erty must be compensated with appropriated funds
9 requested by the Department of Defense in annual
10 budget submissions to Congress.

12 (1) PAYMENT REQUIRED.—The Secretary shall
13 require the City to cover costs to be incurred by the
14 Secretary, or to reimburse the Secretary for costs in-
15 curred by the Secretary, to carry out the conveyance
16 under this section, including survey costs related to
17 the conveyance. If amounts are collected from the
18 City in advance of the Secretary incurring the actual
19 costs, and the amount collected exceeds the costs ac-
20 tually incurred by the Secretary to carry out the
21 conveyance, the Secretary shall refund the excess
22 amount to the City.

23 (2) TREATMENT OF AMOUNTS RECEIVED.—
24 Amounts received under paragraph (1) as reim-
25 bursement for costs incurred by the Secretary to

1 carry out the conveyance under this section shall be
2 credited to the fund or account that was used to
3 cover the costs incurred by the Secretary in carrying
4 out the conveyance. Amounts so credited shall be
5 merged with amounts in such fund or account and
6 shall be available for the same purposes, and subject
7 to the same conditions and limitations, as amounts
8 in such fund or account.
