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## UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

### S. 954 (ORDER NO. 73)

1.—*Ordered*, That following any Leader remarks on Thursday, June 6, 2013, the Senate resume consideration of S. 954, an original bill to reauthorize agricultural programs through 2018; provided, that at 10:00 a.m., the Senate vote on the motion to invoke cloture on S. 954; provided further, that upon conclusion of that vote and notwithstanding cloture being invoked, if invoked, the Senate vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1003; further, that upon conclusion of the cloture vote on the motion to proceed to S. 1003 and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked, if invoked, the Senate proceed to vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 953; further, that upon conclusion of the cloture vote on the motion to proceed to S. 953 and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked, if invoked, the Senate resume consideration of S. 954, post-cloture, if cloture was invoked on the bill.

*Ordered further*, That with respect to the cloture motion filed on S. 954, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived.

*Ordered further*, That notwithstanding the Senate not being in session, the filing deadline for first degree amendments to S. 954 be 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, June 5, 2013, and the filing deadline for second degree amendments be 9:45 a.m. on Thursday, June 6, 2013. (*June 4, 2013.*)

### S. 1003 (ORDER NO. 76)

2.—*Ordered*, That on Thursday, June 6, 2013, upon conclusion of the vote on the motion to invoke cloture on S. 954, and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked, if invoked, the Senate vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1003, a bill to amend the Higher Education Act of 1965 to reset interest rates for new student loans; provided, that upon conclusion of the cloture vote on the motion to proceed to S. 1003 and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked, if invoked, the Senate vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 953; provided further, that upon conclusion of the cloture vote on the motion to proceed to S. 953 and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked, if invoked, the Senate resume consideration of S. 954, post-cloture, if cloture was invoked on the bill.

*Ordered further*, That upon disposition of S. 954, if cloture was invoked on the motion to proceed to S. 1003, the Senate resume consideration of the motion to proceed post-cloture; provided, that if cloture was invoked on both motions to proceed, the Senate consider the motions post-cloture in the order in which cloture was invoked; provided further, that if the motion to proceed to S. 1003 is agreed to, and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked on the motion to proceed to S. 953, the Senate resume the motion to proceed to S. 953, post-cloture, upon disposition of S. 1003.

*Ordered further*, That with respect to the cloture motion filed on the motion to proceed to S. 1003, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (*June 4, 2013.*)

### S. 953 (ORDER NO. 74)

3.—*Ordered*, That on Thursday, June 6, 2013, upon conclusion of the vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 1003, and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked, if invoked, the Senate vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the motion to proceed to S. 953, a bill to amend the Higher Education Act of 1965 to extend the reduced interest rate for undergraduate Federal Direct Stafford Loans, to modify required distribution rules for pension plans, to limit earnings stripping by expatriated entities, to provide for modifications related to the Oil Spill Liability Trust Fund, and for other purposes; provided, that upon conclusion of the cloture vote on the motion to proceed to S. 953 and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked, if invoked, the Senate resume consideration of S. 954, post-cloture, if cloture was invoked on the bill.

*Ordered further*, That upon disposition of S. 954, if cloture was invoked on the motion to proceed to S. 953 but not on the motion to proceed to S. 1003, the Senate resume consideration of the motion to proceed to S. 953 post-cloture; provided, that if cloture was invoked on both motions to proceed, the Senate consider the motions post-cloture in the order in which cloture was invoked; provided further, that if the motion to proceed to S. 1003 is agreed to, and notwithstanding cloture having been invoked on the motion to proceed to S. 953, the Senate resume the motion to proceed to S. 953, post-cloture, upon disposition of S. 1003.

*Ordered further*, That with respect to the cloture motion filed on the motion to proceed to S. 953, the mandatory quorum required under Rule XXII be waived. (*June 4, 2013.*)

## H.R. 475

4.—*Ordered*, That if the Senate receives H.R. 475, to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to include vaccines against seasonal influenza within the definition of taxable vaccines, from the House of Representatives and the bill is identical to the text at the desk, then the bill be read three times and the Senate vote, at a time to be determined by the Majority Leader in consultation with the Republican Leader, with no intervening action or debate. (*Apr. 23, 2013.*)
