Terrorism Deterrence: The House passed H.R. 2975, to deter and punish terrorist acts in the United States and around the world and to enhance law enforcement investigatory tools by a yea-and-nay vote of 337 yeas to 79 nays with 1 voting “present”, Roll No. 386. Agreed to amend the title.

Page H6776

The House agreed to H. Res. 264, the rule that provided for consideration of the bill by a recorded vote of 214 yeas to 208 noes, Roll No. 384. Agreed to order the previous question by a yea-and-nay vote of 215 yeas to 207 nays, Roll No. 383.

The online database is updated each day the Congressional Record is published. The database includes both text and graphics from the beginning of the 103d Congress, 2d session (January 1994) forward.
