S. 1311, to amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act to expand and strengthen cooperative efforts to monitor, restore, and protect the resource productivity, water quality, and marine ecosystems of the Gulf of Mexico, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. (S. Rept. No. 111–241)

S. 3515, to authorize and enhance the programs of the Department of the Interior relating to the detection of, response to, and mitigation and cleanup of oil spills on Federal land managed by the Department, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. (S. Rept. No. 111–242)

S. 3686, making appropriations for the Department of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011. (S. Rept. No. 111–243)

H.R. 3978, to amend the Implementing Recommendations of the 9/11 Commission Act of 2007 to authorize the Secretary of Homeland Security to accept and use gifts for otherwise authorized activities of the Center for Domestic Preparedness that are related to preparedness for and response to terrorism, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

Kagan Nomination—Agreement: A unanimous-consent-time agreement was reached providing that at approximately 9:30 a.m., on Tuesday, August 3, 2010, Senate begin consideration of the nomination of Elena Kagan, of Massachusetts, to be an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, and that during Tuesday's session, the time be divided as follows: Chairman Leahy—first 30 minutes; Ranking member Sessions—second 30 minutes; with the time from 10:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. equally divided and controlled between the two Leaders, or their designees; the time from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. equally divided and controlled, with the Majority controlling the first 45 minutes; the time from 2:15 p.m. to 8:15 p.m., divided in one hour alternating blocks, with the Majority controlling the first block; with any additional time beyond 8:15 p.m., continuing to be divided in one hour alternating blocks of time. **Page S6593**
