The Committee on Rules, having had under consideration House Resolution 1047, by a nonrecord vote, reports the same to the House with the recommendation that the resolution be adopted.

SUMMARY OF PROVISIONS OF THE RESOLUTION

The resolution provides for the consideration of H.R. 4772, the Private Property Rights Implementation Act of 2006, under a closed rule. The rule provides one hour of debate in the House equally divided and controlled by the Chairman and Ranking Minority Member of the Committee on the Judiciary.

The rule waives all points of order against consideration of the bill. The rule provides that the amendment in the nature of a substitute as reported by the Committee on the Judiciary shall be considered as adopted.

Finally, the rule provides one motion to recommit with or without instructions.

EXPLANATION OF WAIVERS

The waiver of all points of order includes a waiver of H. Res. 1000 (relating to a list of earmarks contained in the bill or report thereon). The Committee believes this waiver to be technical in nature as a review of the bill and report did not reveal any earmarks within the meaning of H. Res. 1000, and the Committee on the Judiciary failed to include a statement to that effect.
