**Notification to the President:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 1, providing that a committee consisting of two Senators be appointed by the Vice President to join such committee as may be appointed by the House of Representatives to inform the President of the United States that a quorum of each House is assembled. Subsequently, Senators Mitchell and Dole were appointed by the Vice President.

**Authority to Receive Reports:** Senate agreed that, during the 103d Congress, it be in order for the Secretary of the Senate to receive reports at the desk when presented by a Senator at any time during the day of the session of the Senate.

**Recognition of Leadership:** Senate agreed that the majority and minority leaders may daily have up to 10 minutes on each calendar day following the prayer and disposition of the reading, or the approval of, the Journal.

**House Parliamentarian Floor Privileges:** Senate agreed that the Parliamentarian of the House of Representatives and his three assistants be given the privilege of the floor during the 103d Congress.

**Printing of Conference Reports:** Senate agreed that, notwithstanding the provisions of rule XXVIII, conference reports and statements accompanying them not be printed as Senate reports when such conference reports and statements have been printed as a House report unless specific request is made in the Senate in each instance to have such a report printed.

**Authority for Appropriations Committee:** Senate agreed that the Committee on Appropriations be authorized during the 103d Congress to file reports during adjournments or recesses of the Senate on appropriation bills, including joint resolutions, together with any accompanying notices of motions to suspend Rule XVI, pursuant to Rule V, for the purpose of offering certain amendments to such bills or joint resolutions, which proposed amendment shall be printed.

**Authority for Corrections in Engrossment:** Senate agreed that, for the duration of the 103d Congress, the Secretary of the Senate be authorized to make technical and clerical corrections in the engrossment of all Senate-passed bills and resolutions, Senate amendments to House bills and resolutions, Senate amendments to House amendments to Senate bills and resolutions, and Senate amendments to House amendments to Senate amendments to House bills or resolutions.

**Authority to Receive Messages and Sign Enrolled Measures:** Senate agreed that, for the duration of the 103d Congress, when the Senate is in recess or adjournment, the Secretary of the Senate be authorized to receive messages from the President of the United States, and with the exception of House bills, joint resolutions, and concurrent resolutions—messages from the House of Representatives, that they be appropriately, and that the President of the Senate, the President pro tempore, and the Acting President pro tempore be authorized sign duly enrolled bills and joint resolutions.

**Privileges of the Floor:** Senate agreed that, for the duration of the 103d Congress, Senators be allowed to leave at the desk with the Journal Clerk the names of two staff members who will be granted the privilege of the floor during the consideration of the specific matter noted, and that the Sergeant at Arms be instructed to rotate such staff members as space allows.

**Referral of Treaties and Nominations:** Senate agreed that for the duration of the 103d Congress, it be in order

to refer treaties and nominations on the day when they are received from the President, even when the Senate has no executive session that day.

Subsequently, a point of order that the amendment was in violation of the Congressional Budget Act was sustained, and the amendment thus fell.

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**Expedited Rescissions:** By a recorded vote of 258 ayes to 157 noes, Roll No. 150, the House passed H.R. 1578, to amend the Congressional Budget and Impoundment Control Act of 1974 to provide for the expedited consideration of certain proposed rescissions of budget authority.

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Rejected the Clinger motion to recommit the bill to the Committee on Rules with instructions that the Committee report the bill back to the House forthwith containing an amendment requiring that the provisions may only be changed or suspended by a vote of three-fifths of the Members of the House; and that no vote on any rescission bill may be taken under a suspension of the rules or under a special rule (rejected by a recorded vote of 182 ayes to 233 noes, Roll No. 149).

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On a demand for a separate vote, agreed to the Rules Committee amendment in the nature of a substitute (agreed to by a yea-and-nay vote of 248 yeas to 163 nays, Roll No. 148). This amendment was agreed to earlier in the Committee of the Whole by a recorded vote of 247 ayes to 168 noes, Roll No. 147.

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Rejected the Castle amendment in the nature of a substitute, as modified by the Michel amendment (agreed to by a recorded vote of 257 ayes to 157 noes, Roll No. 145) that sought to provide for the automatic adoption of the President's rescission package unless both the House and the Senate disapprove the proposal; to provide that the President would have 20 calendar days to send to the Congress his rescission package, and that the Congress would then have 20 legislative days to adopt a joint resolution rejecting the proposal; and to give the President additional authority to repeal targeted tax benefits in revenue measures (rejected by a recorded vote of 198 ayes to 219 noes, Roll No. 146).

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**Committee Election:** House agreed to H. Res. 161, electing Representative Thompson of Mississippi to the Committee on Agriculture and to the Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries.

The en bloc amendments may include germane modifications, including changing a motion to strike into a germane perfecting amendment. The en bloc amendments are debatable for 10 minutes. The original proponent of the amendment is authorized to insert a statement in the Congressional Record. The rule provides one motion to recommit H.R. 2333 with or without instructions. Section 2 of the rule provides for the further consideration of H.R. 2404. No amendments are in order to H.R. 2404 except the en bloc amendments as described and the amendments printed in part 3 of the report. All of the amendments to H.R. 2404 made in order under the resolution are not subject to amendment except as specified and are not subject to a demand for a division of the question. All points of order are waived against the amendments made in order. Amendments in part 3 of the report will be considered in the order and manner specified in the report, with debate time specified in the report. The rule provides one motion to recommit H.R. 2404. Finally, in section 3 of the rule, the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole is authorized to postpone recorded votes to a time during further consideration and to provide for series of votes starting with a 15-minute vote and followed by 5-minute votes.

The rule provides for an additional period of 40 minutes of general debate on the subject of Ballistic Missile Defense, an additional period of 30 minutes of general debate on the subject of the Trident II missile, an additional period of 20 minutes of general debate on the subject of Burdensharing, and an additional period of 30 minutes of general debate on the subject of Economic Conversion. The rule provides that the amendments printed in part 1 of the report (relating to Ballistic Missile Defense funding) will be considered under the king-of-the-hill procedures. The rule provides that after the disposition of the amendments in part 4 of the report (relating to Economic Conversion) or any other amendment on which further proceedings were postponed, the committee shall rise without motion. Finally, the rule provides that no further consideration of the bill shall be in order except as subsequently ordered by the House.

### NATIONAL DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION ACT

The rule makes in order only the amendments printed in the report to accompany this rule, certain amendments en bloc, and pro forma amendments if offered by the chairman or ranking minority member of the Armed Services Committee. Except as specified in sections 2 and 3 of the rule, the amendments are to be considered in the order printed in the report, may be offered only by a Member designated in the report, and shall be considered as read. Each amendment is debatable for 10 minutes and is not subject to amendment nor to a demand for a division of the question. All points of order against the amendments in the report are waived. The rule authorizes the Chairman of the Armed Services Committee or his designee to offer amendments en bloc consisting of amendments printed in the report and germane modifications thereto. The amendments en bloc shall be considered as read except that the modifications shall be reported. The rule provides that amendments en bloc are debatable for 20 minutes equally divided and controlled by the Chairman and ranking minority member of the Armed Services Committee and are not subject to amendment nor a demand for a division of the question. Original proponents of the amendments included in the en bloc are permitted to insert statements in the Record. All points of order against the amendments en bloc are waived. The rule permits the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole to

postpone consideration of a request for a recorded vote on any amendment and to reduce to 5 minutes the time for voting after the first of a series of votes. Also, the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole is authorized to recognize for consideration of amendments printed in the report out of the order in which they are printed, but not sooner than one hour after the Chairman of the Armed Services Committee or a designee announces from the floor a request to that effect. Finally, the rule provides that no further consideration of the bill shall be in order except as subsequently ordered by the House.

#### NATIONAL DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION ACT

The rule provides that unless otherwise specified in the report, each amendment is debatable for 10 minutes equally divided and controlled by the proponent and an opponent and is not subject to amendment. The amendments are not subject to a demand for a division of the question. All points

of order against the amendments in the report are waived. The rule provides that the amendments in part 1 of the report may be considered at any time but only in the order printed. The rule provides for an additional period of one hour of general debate on section 575 of the committee substitute and the amendments printed in part 1 of the report, equally divided and controlled among the chairman of the Armed Services Committee, the ranking minority member of the Armed Services Committee, and Representative Skelton. The rule provides that part 1 amendments will be considered under the king-of-the-hill procedures. The rule authorizes the Chairman of the Armed Services Committee or his designee to offer amendments en bloc consisting of amendments printed in part 4 of the report to accompany this resolution or in House Report 103-236 or germane modifications thereto. The amendments en bloc shall be considered as read except that modifications shall be reported. The amendments en bloc are debatable for 20 minutes equally divided and controlled by the Chairman and ranking minority member of the Armed Services Committee and are not subject to amendment nor a demand for a division of the question. Original proponents of the amendments are permitted to insert statements in the Record. All points of order against the amendments en bloc are waived. The rule permits the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole to postpone consideration of a request for a recorded vote on any amendment and to reduce to 5 minutes the time for voting after the first of a series of votes. The Chairman of the Committee of the Whole is authorized to recognize for consideration of amendments printed in parts 2 through 4 of the report out of the order in which they are printed, but not sooner than one hour after the Chairman of the Armed Services Committee or a designee announces from the floor a request to that effect. The rule provides for one motion to recommit with or without instructions.

The rule provides for one hour of debate on each motion, equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Appropriations Committee. Each motion shall be considered as read. The rule provides that the previous question shall be considered as ordered on each motion without intervening motion. #### TREASURY, POSTAL SERVICE AND GENERAL GOVERNMENT APPROPRIATIONS

*Committee on Rules:* Granted a rule waiving all points of order against the conference report on H.R. 2403, making appropriations for the Treasury Department, the United States Postal Service, the Executive Office of the President, and certain Independent Agencies, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1994, and against its consideration. #### NATIONAL BIOLOGICAL SURVEY ACT OF 1993

*Committee on Rules:* Granted an open rule on H.R. 1845, to establish the Biological Survey in the Department of the Interior, providing one hour and fifteen minutes of general debate, with 30 minutes equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Merchant Marine and Fisheries committee, 30 minutes equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Natural Resources committee, and 15 minutes equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Science, Space and Technology committee. Sections 302(f), 308(a), and 401(b) of the Congressional Budget Act are waived against consideration of the bill. The rule makes in order the amendment in the nature of a substitute printed in the report to accompany the rule as an original bill for the purpose of amendment. Each section of the substitute shall be considered as read. Clause 5(a) of Rule 21 is waived against the substitute printed in the

report. Finally, the rule provides one motion to recommit with or without instructions.

#### DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE APPROPRIATIONS

*Committee on Rules:* Granted an open rule on H.R. 3116, making appropriations for the Department of Defense for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1994, waiving clause 7 of Rule 21 against consideration of the bill. The rule waives clauses 2 and 6 of Rule 21 against all provisions in the bill with certain exceptions. The rule provides that if only a portion of a paragraph is protected, a point of order may lie only against the balance of the paragraph, and not against the entire paragraph. Clause 2 of Rule 21 is waived against the amendment printed in the report to accompany the rule.

#### NATIONAL FOUNDATION ON THE ARTS AND HUMANITIES ACT AND THE MUSEUM SERVICES ACT AUTHORIZATION

### GOALS 2000: EDUCATE AMERICA ACT

*Committee on Rules:* Granted a rule on H.R. 1804, to improve learning and teaching by providing a national framework for education reform; to promote the research, consensus building, and systemic changes needed to en-

sure equitable educational opportunities and high levels of educational achievement for all American students; to provide a framework for reauthorization of all Federal education programs; and to promote the development and adoption of a voluntary national system of skill standards and certifications, providing eighty minutes of general debate, equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Education and Labor Committee. The rule makes in order as original text, an amendment in the nature of a substitute consisting of the text of H.R. 3210. The substitute shall be considered as read. The rule makes in order only those amendments printed in the report to accompany the rule and amendments en bloc described in section 2 of the rule, to be considered in the order and manner specified in the report or in section 2 of the rule, with debate time also specified in the report. The amendments are to be considered as read and are not subject to a demand for a division of the question. The amendments are not subject to amendment except that the Chairman and the ranking minority member of the Education and Labor Committee may offer pro forma amendments for the purpose of debate. The rule provides that the Chairman of the Education and Labor Committee may offer amendments en bloc consisting of the text of the amendments printed in the report, with germane modifications.
