By unanimous consent, the title was amended so as to read: "An Act to provide for the minting of commemorative coins to support the 1996 Atlanta Centennial Olympic Games and the programs of the United States Olympic Committee, to reauthorize and reform the United States Mint, and for other purposes."

A motion to reconsider the votes whereby the rules were suspended and said bill, as amended, was passed and the title was amended was, by unanimous consent, laid on the table.

*Ordered.* That the Clerk request the concurrence of the Senate in said bill.

¶80.33 CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS MODIFICATION

Mr. DE LA GARZA moved to suspend the rules and pass the bill of the Senate (S. 2780) to amend the Food Security Act of 1985 to remove certain easement requirements under the Conservation Reserve Program, and for other purposes.

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MCDERMOTT, recognized Mr. DE LA GARZA and Mr. COLEMAN of Missouri, each for 20 minutes.

¶80.35 MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT—U.S.-INDONESIA NUCLEAR ENERGY AGREEMENT

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MCDERMOTT, laid before the House a message from the President, which was read as follows:

*To the Congress of the United States:*

I am pleased to transmit to the Congress, pursuant to sections 123 b. and 123 d. of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended (42 U.S.C. 2153 (b), (d)), the text of an exchange of diplomatic notes between the United States and Indonesia dated August 23, 1991, constituting an agreement to extend for 10 years the Agreement for Cooperation Between the United States of America and the Republic of Indonesia Concerning Peaceful Uses of Nuclear Energy signed at Washington, June 30, 1980. I am also pleased to transmit my written approval, authorization, and determination concerning the extension and a memorandum by the Director of the United States Arms Control and Disarmament Agency including a Nuclear
