¶110.14 MFN FOR ROMANIA

Mr. ROSTENKOWSKI moved to suspend the rules and pass the joint reso-

lution (H.J. Res. 512) to approve the extension of nondiscriminatory treatment with respect to the products of Romania.

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MAZZOLI, recognized Mr. ROSTENKOWSKI and Mr. LANTOS, each for 20 minutes.

Will the House suspend the rules and pass said joint resolution?

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MAZZOLI, announced that two-thirds of the Members present had voted in the affirmative.

Mr. LANTOS demanded that the vote be taken by the yeas and nays, which demand was supported by one-fifth of the Members present, so the yeas and nays were ordered.

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MAZZOLI, pursuant to clause 5, rule I, announced that further proceedings on the motion were postponed.

¶110.15 MFN WITHDRAWAL FROM YUGOSLAVIA

Mr. ROSTENKOWSKI moved to suspend the rules and pass the bill (H.R. 5258) to provide for the withdrawal of most favored nation status from the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia and to provide for the restoration of such status if certain conditions are fulfilled.

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MAZZOLI, recognized Mr. ROSTENKOWSKI and Mr. CRANE, each for 20 minutes.

¶110.16 FURTHER MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE

S. 3143. An Act to authorize transition assistance for members of the Armed Forces adversely affected by reductions in Federal Government spending for national security functions, and for other purposes.

The message also announced that the Senate agreed to the report of the committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on the amendments of the Senate to the bill (H.R. 12) "An Act to amend title VI of the Communications Act of 1934 to ensure carriage on cable television of local news and other programming and to re-

store the right of local regulatory authorities to regulate cable television rates, and for other purposes."

¶110.17 SUBMISSION OF CONFERENCE REPORT—H.R. 2194

Mr. ECKART submitted a conference report (Rept. No. 102-886) on the bill (H.R. 2194) to amend the Solid Waste Disposal Act to clarify provisions concerning the application of certain requirements and sanctions to Federal facilities; together with a statement thereon, for printing in the Record under the rule.

¶110.18 NATIONAL COMPETITIVENESS ACT

The SPEAKER pro tempore, Mr. MAZZOLI, pursuant to House Resolution 563 and rule XXIII, declared the House resolved into the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union for the further consideration of the bill (H.R. 5231) to amend the Stevenson-Wylder Technology Innovation Act of 1980 to enhance manufacturing technology development and transfer, to authorize appropriations for the Technology Administration of the Department of Commerce, including the National Institute of Standards and Technology, and for other purposes.
