Ms. OAKAR, pursuant to House Resolution 591, called up the following conference report (Rept. No. 102-1010):

The committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on the amendment of the Senate to the bill (H.R. 5739), To reauthorize the Export-Import Bank of the United States, having met, after full and free conference, have agreed to recommend and do recommend to their respective Houses as follows:
