

¶73.4 MEDICARE SELECT POLICIES

On motion of Mr. BLILEY, by unanimous consent, the bill (H.R. 483) to amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to permit medicare select policies to be offered in all States, and for other purposes; together with the amendment of the Senate thereto, was taken from the Speaker's table.

When on motion of Mr. BLILEY, it was,

Resolved, That the House disagree to the amendment of the Senate and ask a conference with the Senate on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses thereon.

¶73.5 MOTION TO INSTRUCT CONFEREES—
H.R. 483

Mr. DOGGETT moved that the managers on the part of the House at the conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on H.R. 483, be instructed to resolve the differences between the House's eight and one-half year program and the Senate's 5 year program of medicare select policies, within the scope of the conference, in light of the changes in Medicare (the program that medicare select policies supplement) to increase beneficiary cost-sharing and to limit choice of provider as contemplated in this year's budget process.
