¶127.11 3000TH ANNIVERSARY OF JERUSALEM

On motion of Mr. THOMAS, by unanimous consent, the Committee on House Oversight was discharged from further consideration of the following concurrent resolution of the Senate (S. Con. Res. 29):

Whereas the Senate wishes to make the 3,000th anniversary of King David's establishment of Jerusalem as the capital of Israel;

Whereas Jerusalem, the City of David, has been the focal point of Jewish life;

Whereas Jerusalem, the City of Peace, has held a unique place and exerted a unique influence on the moral development of Western Civilization; and

Whereas no other city on Earth is today the capital of the same country, inhabited by the same people, speaking the same language, and worshipping the same God as it was 3,000 years ago: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives concurring), That the Architect is directed to make the necessary arrangements for a date in October to be mutually

agreed upon by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Majority Leader of the Senate, after consultation with the Minority Leaders of the two houses, for the use of the Rotunda for a celebration of the founding of the city of Jerusalem.

When said concurrent resolution was considered and agreed to.
