CHAPTER 238

AN ACT

For the relief of Kimberly Ann Cibulski, also known as Belle Lee.

April 18, 1952
[H.R. 5920]

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, for the purposes of sections 4 (a) and 9 of the Immigration Act of 1924, as amended, the minor child, Kimberly Ann Cibulski, also known as Belle Lee, shall be held and considered to be the natural-born alien child of Mr. and Mrs. Fred C. Cibulski, citizens of the United States.

CHAPTER 239

AN ACT

For the relief of Joseph Yukio.

April 18, 1952
[H.R. 6026]

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, solely for the purpose of section 4 (a) and section 9 of the Immigration Act of 1924, and notwithstanding any provisions excluding from admission to the United States persons of races ineligible to citizenship, Joseph Yukio, a minor half-Japanese child, shall be considered the alien natural-born child of Technical Sergeant and Mrs. Eugene Sanders, citizens of the United States.

CHAPTER 240

AN ACT

For the relief of Thomas A. Trulove, postmaster, and Nolen J. Salyards, assistant postmaster, at Inglewood, California.

April 18, 1952
[H.R. 745]

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That Thomas A. Trulove, postmaster, and Nolen J. Salyards, assistant postmaster, at Inglewood, California, are hereby relieved of all liability to refund to the United States any funds over and above the amount of money collected from Andrew O. Benson, Junior, or his sureties because of his embezzlements of Government funds while a clerk in the Inglewood, California, post office. The sureties of the said postmaster and assistant postmaster are released from any liability to refund to the United States the whole or any part of the amount of the embezzlements not collected from Andrew O. Benson, Junior, or his sureties and the Comptroller General is authorized and directed to credit the account of the postmaster with this sum.
