"HOW OUR LAWS ARE MADE"

Zinn, law revision counsel of the Committee on the Judiciary, to be prorated to the Members of the House of Representatives for a period of ninety days after which time the unused balance shall revert to the Committee on the Judiciary.

"OUR AMERICAN GOVERNMENT: WHAT IS IT? HOW DOES IT FUNCTION?"

Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate concurring), That the author of the pamphlet entitled "Our American Government, What Is It? How Does It Function?", as set out in House Document Numbered 465, Seventy-ninth Congress, and subsequent editions thereof, revise the same, bring it up to date, and that it be printed as a public document.

SEC. 2. Such revised pamphlet shall be printed as a House document, and there shall be printed three hundred five thousand two hundred and fifty additional copies, of which thirty thousand copies shall be for the use of the Senate; two hundred sixty-six thousand one hundred and fifty for the use of the House of Representatives; three thousand and one hundred for the Senate Document Room; and six thousand for the House Document Room.
