

Upon the granting of permanent residence to such alien as provided for in this Act, the Secretary of State shall instruct the proper quota-control officer to deduct one number from the appropriate quota for the first year that such quota is available.

For the relief of Mrs. Gladys M. Ellison.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the provisions of the Act entitled "An Act providing for the barring of claims against the United States", approved October 9, 1940 (31 U.S.C. 71a), are hereby waived in favor of Mrs. Gladys M. Ellison, of Creve Coeur, Illinois, if her claim for retroactive adjustment of compensation for services rendered the United States Post Office, Peoria, Illinois, during the period July 1, 1945, through May 1, 1948, both dates inclusive, is filed with the General Accounting Office within one year after the date of enactment of this Act, since such claim is now barred solely by reason of the failure of the responsible governmental agency to forward it to the General Accounting Office within the allowable period of time.

For the relief of Agnes Lorraine Pank.

September 21, 1959

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, for the purposes of the Immigration and Nationality Act, Agnes Lorraine Pank shall be held and considered to have been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence as of the date of the enactment of this Act, upon payment of the required visa fee: *Provided,* That, unless the beneficiary is entitled to care under chapter 55, title 10, United States Code, a suitable and proper bond or undertaking, approved by the Attorney General, be deposited as prescribed by section 213 of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

For the relief of the Inter-County Telephone and Telegraph Company, Fort Myers, Florida.

September 21, 1959
[H. R. 2695]

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury is authorized and directed to pay, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to the Inter-County Telephone and Telegraph Company, Fort Myers, Florida, the sum of \$22,390.28. The payment of such sum shall be in full satisfaction of

all claims of such Inter-County Telephone and Telegraph Company against the United States for compensation for expenses and obligations incurred in connection with the construction of the Buckingham Weapons Center project, Fort Myers, Florida, which project was abandoned by the United States Air Force subsequent to the time such expenditures and obligations were incurred: *Provided*, That no part of the amount appropriated in this Act in excess of 10 per centum thereof shall be paid or delivered to or received by any agent or attorney on account of services rendered in connection with this claim, and the same shall be unlawful, any contract to the contrary notwithstanding. Any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$1,000.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That sections 15 to 20, inclusive, of the Federal Employees' Compensation Act are hereby waived in favor of Rachel Nethery, Seattle, Washington, and her claim for compensation benefits arising out of the death of her daughter, Maud L. Nethery, who was fatally injured on March 29, 1919, while employed at the United States Navy Yard, Puget Sound, Washington, shall be acted upon under the remaining provisions of such Act if she files such claim with the Bureau of Employees' Compensation, Department of Labor, within the six-month period which commences on the date of enactment of this Act. No benefits shall accrue by reason of the enactment of this Act for any period prior to the date of its enactment.
